Veteran. What do you think about and picture when you hear this word? Do you think about the military, their sacrifice, or a family member? Last month, I had a wonderful experience that made me reflect on what it means to me.

As a new member of PRW, I was introduced to "Wreaths Across America," at our November meeting, where flyers for the event were handed out. At first I thought, "December is already such a busy month, how will I fit one more thing in between Christmas shopping, decorating, baking, and family time?" But when I looked at the literature, three words jumped out at me and grabbed my attention—remember, honor, and teach. These are the words that led me to my experience.

Wreaths Across America was begun by Morrill Worcester, owner of <u>Worcester Wreath Company</u> of Harrington, Maine. When he was 12 years old, he won an unforgettable trip to Washington D.C., and Arlington National Cemetery made a huge impression on him. So, when in 1992, his company found itself with a surplus of wreaths, he arranged to have them donated to an older section of Arlington which didn't have many visitors. Many individuals and organizations stepped up to help with the effort, from trucking to bow-tiers to volunteers, to laying the wreaths.

It became an annual tribute, although a quiet one, until 2005, a photo taken at Arlington circulated around the internet. It received national attention and thousands of people from around the country requested a way to help further this great cause, wanting to emulate it locally, and to thank Morrill for honoring our fallen heroes.

What started as a grass-roots effort to remember those willing to serve our country and make the ultimate sacrifice, has become a national phenomenon. Each year, like-minded people, companies, and industry donors, want to be a part of honoring our veterans, at both Arlington and at over 1,100 communities across our country.

The wreath-laying is held annually, on the second or third Saturday of December, with ceremonies at sea, and at each of the national cemeteries on foreign soil. Wreaths Across America also has programs throughout the year, including the "Thanks a Million" campaign, which sends cards to veterans all over the country to give them a simple "thank you" for their service. "Remembrance Trees" are also dedicated to our lost servicemen and women, connecting with their families and friends, to keep their memories alive all year long. The organization also offers many learning tools and opportunities for our youth to participate in events to teach them about our freedom and those who protect it. They also work to create opportunities to connect "the Greatest Generation" with the "Generation of Hope," passing on inspirational stories from World War II veterans to the leaders of the future.

I was very enthusiastic to attend the ceremony, after learning about its founding and history. As a history buff and genealogist, I was anxious to participate in something meaningful, to celebrate the lives and sacrifices of our country's finest, including my own ancestors. Just as important, was to offer it as a learning experience for my 11-year-old son. My husband, John, is a Navy veteran, and our middle son is currently serving in the Navy. I asked my husband what he thought about the event and he said, "I enjoyed participating, because, as a veteran, I appreciate the respectful observance of those who have served. It teaches our youth about the importance of God and country, above self. I was pleased to see the number of people participating, young and old."

Tyler, our youngest son, is learning about the military from both his father and brother. We want him to grow up being a part of honoring and remembering those who have died while he learns about those who continue to serve. When asked, Tyler said, "I liked the guy who played "Taps" because I play the trumpet, too. I liked reading the names of the servicemen and the years on the graves. I hope that someone puts a wreath on for me after I die." His comments make me certain that participating in this type of community service and educating our children about patriotism can't begin too early!

We attended the ceremony, closest to our home, at Pecan Grove Cemetery in McKinney. Pecan Grove Cemetery sits at the corner of State Highway 5 and Industrial Boulevard and was founded on part of the 57-acre land grant made by the Republic of Texas in 1845. The event began with a moment of silence, presentation of the colors, and the Pledge of Allegiance. This was followed by honored Veterans laying of the ceremonial wreaths, representing each branch of service. The young cadet who spoke throughout was very eloquent, and told the group they we were joining a nationwide day of remembrance. It made me feel very proud to be participating and of my community, with such a large turnout of families representing McKinney and Collin County. Then the attendees each took wreaths and scattered throughout the cemetery, laying them on the graves, while reciting their names in remembrance.

It made me reflect at how each day can be an opportunity to show our respect in honoring those who serve, while bringing together different generations of Americans. This same experience must've followed Morrill Worcester throughout his life and successful career. It surely reminded him that his good fortune was due, in large part, to the values of this nation and the veterans who made the ultimate sacrifice for their country.

In closing, I'd like you to consider doing two things. First, the next time you see or hear a Veteran mentioned, try and share in Morrill's experience. Think of your own good fortune, along with thanks for our incredible nation, it's values, our men and women's sacrifices, and how lucky we all are to live in the greatest nation in the world. Second, participate in a Wreaths Across America event, ceremony or educational opportunity this year, by sponsoring a wreath at a cemetery near you, volunteering at the December event or donating to a local Veteran's group.

Oh, and don't forget to thank a serviceman or veteran each and every time you meet one and truly participate in the mission—to <u>remember</u> our veterans, <u>honor</u> their service, and <u>teach</u> our children --the ultimate mission of remembrance and appreciation.

Legislative Report



TFRW Legislative Brief - Michele Samuelson, TFRW VP of Legislation

The 85th Texas Legislature is underway, and there is already a lot for us to be paying attention to! Please make sure everyone in your club sees this information. If you have any questions about what you're seeing, email me at vplegislation@tfrw.org, and I'll do my best to answer.

A reminder - you can follow the Legislature at: http://www.capitol.state.tx.us/. This website allows you to follow legislation, look up contact information, search for House and Senate journals, and lots more. You should have it bookmarked and use it frequently!

The day before session began; Comptroller Glenn Hegar released the Biennial Revenue Estimate (BRE), a report that tells the legislature how much money they can expect for the budget. The Texas Constitution requires this action. You can review the BRE yourself <a href="https://example.com/here/bears/based-en-like/based-en-l

The 85th Legislature was gaveled in on Tuesday, January 10. Senators and representatives were duly sworn in, and the House of Representatives took their first vote, electing a speaker for the session. Rep. Joe Straus (R-San Antonio) was elected speaker by a vote of 150-0. This will be Speaker Straus' fifth session in that role. If you missed the festivities in Austin, you can watch video from the House here and the Senate here.

State Senator Jane Nelson has filed SB1, also known as the General Appropriations Bill, or the state budget bill. You can view it here. The House and Senate have different proposals; the Austin American-Statesman published a detailed article about the differences, which I recommend as a starting point for understanding the budget debate in Austin.

Remember to sign up for Legislative Day - April 6 is going to be a great day in Austin with all of our red jackets flooding the Capitol!

Friday, January 20th, 2017

Chief Justice Roberts, President Carter, President Clinton, President Bush, President Obama, fellow Americans, and people of the world: thank you.

We, the citizens of America, are now joined in a great national effort to rebuild our country and to restore its promise for all of our people.

We've defended other nation's borders while refusing to defend our own;

And spent trillions of dollars overseas while America's infrastructure has fallen into disrepair and decay.

We've made other countries rich while the wealth, strength, and confidence of our country has disappeared over the horizon.

One by one, the factories shuttered and left our shores, with not even a thought about the millions upon millions of American workers left behind.

The wealth of our middle class has been ripped from their homes and then redistributed across the entire world.



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
