Zeenat Shahzadi – Kidnapped Female Journalist of Pakistan	

Zeenat is not home to celebrate Eid with her family and the family yet to know her whereabouts and don't know when they will see Zeenat again?

Zeenat Shahzadi, kidnapped on 19 August 2015 while on her way to work. Armed gunmen grabbed her off Rickshaw and threw her in the waiting car. She was working as a freelance reporter for the

local newspaper Daily Nai Khabar and Metro News Lahore.

Brazen day-light kidnapping of a 24-year-old female journalist on a busy street of Lahore metropolis is the first of its kind in perilous Pakistan. She is the victim of two nuclear armed traditionally hostile countries, India and Pakistan's spy agencies unfounded blame game.

Zeenat's family suffered another tragedy in March 2016 when her teenaged brother succumbed to the tragedy and hanged himself to death.

Security agencies denying their part in the kidnapping but Zeenat's family, the Human Rights Commission of Pakistan, the story she was on and the mystery shrouding her kidnapping hold the country's security agencies responsible of her kidnapping.

Commission on Enforced Disappearances is now investigating Zeenat's kidnapping is not independent and works under the jurisdictions of the Federal Government. Ridiculously, the Commission has no authority over the rampant security agencies; however, also investigating 1,300 missing people's cases out of 3.000.

International Federation of Journalists - IFJ and the Pakistan Federal Union of Journalists - PFUJ were not aware of Zeenat's kidnapping until October 2015 and didn't let the case go public as requested by the family because there are many cases where missing and kidnapped people were found dead with bullet riddled mutilated bodies after media and public attention.

Zeenat was working to find Hamid Ansari, an Indian citizen disappeared in Pakistan in 2012. He was supposedly in love with a Pakistani girl from Kohat, whom he had met on Face Book. He was in a rush to get in to Pakistan after the girl had told him that her parents pushing her to marry with someone else.

The 28-year-old engineer Ansari failed to obtain visa and entered Pakistan illegally via Kabul – Afghanistan. He was picked up from a hotel in Kohat and the authorities refused to register a case of his arrest.

Zeenat had approached the Supreme Court of Pakistan, Peshawar High Court and the Commission of Inquiry on Enforced Disappearances for Ansari on behalf of Ansari's mother Fauzia, who granted special Power of Attorney to Zeenat from Mumbai, India. The Commission of Inquiry ordered the registration of the First Information Report, known as FIR for missing Ansari in 2014.

In January 2016, ensuing the efforts of Zeenat, the Peshawar High Court was informed by the Deputy Attorney General of Pakistan that Ministry of Defense has confessed the custody of Ansari and his impending trial in the military courts. It was later reported that a military court sentenced Ansari for three years on the charges of espionage and illegally entering Pakistan.

According to Zeenat's brother Latif, Zeenat was repeatedly interrogated and threatened to withdraw from Hamid Ansari's case but remained steadfast to help Ansari on human grounds. Zeenat was due to appear in the court on 24 August, 2015 for testimony in missing people. There is no warrant or FIR filed for her kidnapping.

On the intervention of the court, kidnapping of Zeenat had been officially included in the missing people's case and the Joint Investigation Team – JIT set to probe the case. The JIT is now meeting with Zeenat's family. Such meetings may be the new tactics to intimidate the family as the traditional method of investigation in Pakistan. Still, there is no warrant or FIR filed for her kidnapping.

Pakistani security forces are equipped with enormous and unchecked powers. There are more than five thousand missing people in the country who believed to be picked up largely by the security agencies and remotely by the terrorist groups, local insurgents or armed wings of the political parties.

Law enforcement agencies exercise unrestricted powers under Pakistan Protection Act of 2014. Those powers further strengthen in 2015 by the Pakistan Protection Ordinance (PPO) which offers greater impunity to the police, intelligence, law enforcement authorities and military for heinous acts like forced kidnapping, torture and extrajudicial killings.

The government and the judiciary are aware of forced abductions and disappearances. On number of occasions, The Supreme Court of Pakistan has found security, intelligence agencies and paramilitary forces directly involved in forced abductions. Despite repeated orders from the courts, tainted incumbents and inefficient establishment are impotent to enforce the rule of law. The arrest orders of the Supreme Court of Pakistan for an Army Brigadier who was directly involved in disappearances were never executed.

Mother of Zeenat, Kaneez Bibi frequently visits the grave of her son as the only way to find solace and keeps the belongings of Zeenat in order; hoping her return.

Zeenat's family has appealed to the Chief of Army staff, Chief Justice, Prime Minister, Minister of Interior and Chief Minister of Punjab for her safe recovery. They haven't heard anything back from them.

Pakistan ranks 6th in the list of the 20 Deadliest Countries for journalists in the world.

Novo Nordisk seeks to expand collaboration with Government of

Pakistan on diabetes care June 24, 2016

The Danish pharma company, Novo Nordisk is actively engaged in national and institutional initiatives to improve the quality of life for diabetic patients in Pakistan.

To further discuss expanding Novo Nordisk's contribution in Pakistan, a Danish delegation consisting of Mr. Jakob Jakobsen, Charge d'Affaires, Mr. Assar Qureshi, Commercial Counselor of the Embassy, Mr. Peter Soelberg, Corporate Vice President Novo Nordisk and Mr. Rana Azfar Zafar, Country Manager, Novo Nordisk Pakistan called on Mr. Syed Moazzam Ali, Joint Secretary and Mr. Asad Hafeez, Director General at the Ministry of National Health Services Regulations & Coordination, Islamabad (NHSRC).

During the meeting, Mr. Soelberg said that Novo Nordisk's collaboration with NHSRC is not only focused on providing the treatment options but also long term goals to change diabetes and ensure a close to normal life for people with diabetes.

The Government of Denmark has contributed around USD three million to UNHCR for 2016. The Danish funds _her support the implementation of Solutions Strategy for Afghan Refugees, UNHCR's activities towards voluntary repatriation of Afghan refugees in Pakistan and efforts to empower refugee youth in Pakistan through provision of vocational training and technical skills.

Mr. Jakobsen said that empowering the #Afghan #refugee youth in Pakistan is an important initiative to bolster the human capital of Afghan refugees and allow them to contribute to the reconstruction and development processes upon return to Afghanistan

Mr. Ratwatte highlighted that Pakistan constitutes one of largest protracted refugee situation worldwide and continues to generously host over 1.5 million Afghan refugee Proof of Registration (PoR) cardholders. He thanked Denmark and other donors for their generous support, which has also enabled UNHCR to implement a five-year Health transition strategy (2014-2018) that aims at implementing the progressive disengagement of UNHCR from the existing parallel system of Basic Health Unit (BHUs) exiting in the Rural Villages (RVs).

Denmark is among the biggest contributors to UNHCR, the UN Refugee Agency regional program in South West Asia and has contributed a total of USD 13.2 million since 2013 to date towards UNHCR programme in Pakistan.

Flowers were laid down and the official flag of Denmark was set at half-mast. Ms. Nielsen announced "one minute silence" in the memory of the victims of the June 2 bomb blast at the Embassy in Islamabad, where eight people were killed.

Denmark supports 8th batch of Youth Parliament Pakistan June 1, 2016

Today the 8th batch of the YouthParliamentPakistan (YPP) was inaugurated under the presence of Honorable Senator Mian Raza Rabbani, Chairman Senate of Pakistan and Mr. Jakob Jakobsen, Deputy Head of Mission of the Embassy along with members from the political sphere and media.

The YPP program is an initiative by PILDAT and has been supported by the Government of Denmark since 2010. The program aims to give young members a fast-paced comprehensive orientation and training on democratic and political affairs of Pakistan, legislative processes and leadership skills. Addressing the inaugural ceremony, Mr. Jakob Jakobsen said that although the future was always uncertain, what was certain was that it will be the young people of Pakistan who determine what the future of Pakistan will be. Speaking to the young members, Mr. Jakobsen said "The Youth Parliament program is a great opportunity for you to learn about civic responsibility, team work, tolerance and respect for other people's opinion. This is where democracy starts from."

The 8th Youth Parliament Pakistan comprises of 240 young Members, who have been selected from across the country.

Today, the program is the longest running nationally representative Youth Parliament.

Launch of Status Report on Women's Economic Participation & Empowerment

Today, Ms. Helle Nielsen, Chargé d'Affaires participated in the launch ceremony of the Status Report on women's economic participation and empowerment in Pakistan, which was organized by UN Women in collaboration with the National Commission on the Status of Women (NCSW). The 'Status Report', produced with support from the Governments of Norway and Denmark, presented the social and economic vulnerabilities that keep the Pakistani woman underpaid and overworked, even when she has overcome structural and social barriers to seek employment.

Speaking as one of the key speakers, Ms. Nielsen said that investing in girls and women was not only the right thing to do but also a smart thing to do, as research shows that investing in girls and women

is the most effective investment in development, reaching far beyond the individual women. Ms. Nielsen gave the example about how women spend 90 percent of their salary on their children and the health, education and well-being of their family, while men only spend 30 to 40 percent. She also highlighted that by removing the barriers that prevent women from entering the labour market, a country's productivity can increase significantly.

Key experts, who participated in a panel discussion, applauded the report for being imperative to establish the reality on the ground and for giving direction for appropriate policies and action. They specially appreciated the report for developing the Women Economic Empowerment (WEE) Index for the first time in Pakistan, which would help in ranking the WEE status by districts and provide a mechanism to measure progress and pinpoint areas that require more concerted attention.

According to the World Economic Forum's Global Gender Gap Report 2015, Pakistan ranks 143 out of 145 countries in economic participation and opportunities and 135 in educational attainment.

Celebrating Europe Day

Today is Europe Day, which is held every year on May 9 to celebrate peace and unity in Europe. To celebrate Europe Day this year, Ms. Helle Nielsen, Chargé d'Affaires, Colonel Thor Aron Hilton, Defence Attache and Mr. Assar Qureshi, Commercial Counsellor of the Embassy attended the EU Day's special ceremony which was organized by the European Union in Pakistan. Together with colleagues from other EU countries and friends in Pakistan, they celebrated the day in the true spirit of Europe Day, which is promoting peace and sustainable development based on balanced economic growth and social justice for its citizens.

9th May marks the anniversary of the historical 'Schuman declaration'. At a speech in Paris in 1950, Robert Schuman, the then French foreign minister, set out his idea for a new form of political cooperation in Europe, which would make war between Europe's nations unthinkable. His vision was to create a European institution that would pool and manage coal and steel production. A treaty creating such a body was signed just under a year later. Schuman's proposal is considered to be the beginning of what is now the European Union.

EDUCATION - The Right of Every Child May 4, 2016

Did you know that it is estimated that if all children in developing countries could read, global poverty would drop by 12%?

In addition to other social and economic challenges in Pakistan, education is widely regarded as a major area for investment given the damage that has been done to educational infrastructure in areas affected by conflict. It has led to a low level of education attainment and increasing gender disparities.

We are therefore proud to share with you that through Denmark's support, Unicef Pakistan has successfully concluded its education programme (2010–2015) in KPK and FATA, which ensures access to quality education for the most vulnerable children affected by conflict. Through this program, we have rehabilitated more than 600 schools and supported more than 160,000 students in KPK and FATA, including IDP camps, where children were displaced from Bara and North Waziristan agencies.

The project focused on strengthening and enhancing primary and middle schools' service delivery through improved and child friendly schools, to increase enrollment and attendance and reaching marginalized and vulnerable children, especially to girls.

Denmark is continuing its support to UNICEF because we believe that it is the right of every child to have access to good health services, clean water and especially to EDUCATION.

We hope that one day all of the children of Pakistan can enjoy their fundamental right for a better life.

Today is World Press Freedom Day May 3, 2016

World Press Freedom Day marks the global commitment to nurture and protect an independent and free media around the world.

Together with our international and local partners, Denmark is supporting a media development program in Pakistan. The program aims to improve the media environment with better regulatory framework and professional codes for journalists as well as build the capacity of media workers to improve reporting on complex socio-economic and political issues. It also includes training on safety for journalists reporting from conflict affected areas.

Speaking at the ceremony, Ms. Nielsen emphasized that Art and culture are fundamental needs for the survival of societies and symbolized some of the fundamental qualities of being human – such as creativity, freedom of expression, and innovation. Ms. Nielsen said she was deeply impressed by the art work displayed by the students and saw great potential among the youth of Pakistan.

Prior to the award ceremony, Ms. Nielsen also spent time with many of the participating students painting and sharing her experiences as a child and her passion for Art.

The Government of Denmark in collaboration with The Little Art are implementing a two year program aimed promoting education and positive social values through use of innovative learning

opportunities among children and youth, such as media and art.

April 10 To support UN's International Day of Sports for Development and

Peace, Ms. Helle Nielsen, Charge d'Affaires participated in an exclusive football match today to show how football is a powerful vehicle for social inclusion, gender equality and youth empowerment.

The football tournament was between four teams, consisting of a blend of players from the diplomatic core and the women and girls from Pakistan's National Football Team and Rawalpindi's Young Rising Stars.

The event gave a chance to young females and participating players to get together in a spirit of commemoration and hope. The event gave the uplifting message that football is no longer a game dominated by boys and men.

The event was co-organised by UN Women and Serena Hotels.

April 9 Outreach in Lahore

Mr. Jakob Jakobsen, Deputy Head of Mission and Mr. Jan Riemer, Development Counselor visited Lahore to reach out to key stakeholders, politicians, development partners and Danish commercial companies.

They both visited LUMS, where they held a meeting with the Faculty and also gave a presentation to students on Denmark's engagement in Pakistan. The program concluded with a very interactive Q&A session.

To further boost trade relations between Denmark and Pakistan, Mr. Jakob visited the office of VESTAS Pakistan to discuss and support them in their 1,000 MW wind energy project in South-west Punjab.

He also visited the Chen-One outlet, which stores the Danish clothing line 'Pre End' and had a dinner meeting with Mr. Mian Khashif Ashfaq to discuss future opportunities for collaborations. Concluding his visit, Mr. Jakob also met with key members of Punjab Union of Journalists to discuss the Danish interventions in Pakistan and how Denmark can assist in other ways.

April 8 Denmark supports nationwide 'Journalist Safety' training program

More than 1500 journalists from across the country will be trained on how to adopt safety measures while reporting from difficult areas. The nationwide journalist safety program is being funded by the Government of Denmark and was launched today by Mr. Jakob Jakobsen, Deputy Head of Mission at the inaugural session of the 'Training of Trainers' held in Islamabad.

While addressing the participants, Mr. Jakobsen applauded the media in Pakistan for playing a crucial role in the evolving socioeconomic and political discourse in Pakistan. Mr. Jakobsen however also raised the challenges being faced by many journalists, especially those reporting from conflict-affected areas, and expressed hope that through such safety trainings, many journalists would be better equipped to manage situations, where there would be underlying risk factors.

The training program is being implemented by the International Media Support (IMS) in collaboration with Center for Peace and Development Initiative (CPDI). It is part of a two year project which aims to improve the skills and safety of journalists in Pakistan's provinces and enable media stakeholders to produce a consensus code of conduct for the entire sector.

April7 Memorial Service held for the world's victims of terrorism

The Copenhagen Cathedral held a memorial service for all the victims, who lost their lives in the recent terror attacks around the world.

The memorial service was attended by many prominent people, including Denmark's Minister for Justice Mr. Søren Pind, the Ambassador of Pakistan in Denmark, Mr. Masroor Ahmed Junejo, the Ambassador of the USA in Denmark, Mr. Rufus Gifford and also the ambassadors from Belgium, Turkey, Israel and the Ivory Coast in Denmark.

The organisers said that terrorism was a global threat and they were all gathered to condemn all sorts of terrorism around the world. The ceremony aimed to mark the unity to stand together in mourning the victims and in solidarity with anyone affected by terror anywhere in the world.

Participants wrote down a short prayer or thought and lit candles in the memory of the victims.

April 4 'Accountability and Justice' are key to building up corruption free, fair and peaceful societies'

Today, Mr. Jakob Jakobsen, Deputy Head of Mission paid a visit to Mr. Salman Faruqui, the Honorable Federal Ombudsman of Pakistan. They discussed the various services offered by the Federal Ombudsmen to Pakistanis and how it is easily accessible for individuals who cannot afford to pursue their complaints through courts.

Mr. Jakob praised their commitment to address the grievances and most importantly, provide protection where there is a substantial imbalance of power between the citizen and state. In Denmark, the Ombudsman receives around 4,000 complaints every year from people who believe that authorities have committed errors.

Due to strong and effective accountability mechanisms in Denmark in which the Ombudsman of the

Danish Parliament has an important role to play, Denmark has been ranked the least corrupt country in the world for three consecutive years. This ranking has been based on how the rule of law is experienced by citizens.

Did you know that in Denmark, you can submit your complaint in different languages other than Danish? Urdu is actually one of them

April 1 'State of Human Rights 2015' Report launched

Today the Human Rights Commission of Pakistan (HRCP) launched the 'State of Human Rights in 2015' report at a ceremony held in Islamabad. Mr. Jakob Jakobsen, Deputy Head of Mission, Mr. Jan Riemer, Development Counsellor and Ms. Juwairia Sultan, Development Officer of the Embassy participated in the event.

Presenting the report, HRCP shared that 2015 was seen as a year where a range of legislative changes took place at the provincial level to strengthen rights of women. For the first time in the history of Pakistan, Balochistan and KP assemblies elected women as their speakers. 2015 was also a year, where violence related deaths decreased by 40% and suicide attacks in Pakistan decreased by 31% compared to the previous year.

However, with more than 25 million children out of school, Pakistan continues to face grave difficulties in education and also in reducing child mortality. The national labor force participation also remains one of the lowest in the world with wide gender disparity. Pakistan is also one of the top 10 countries in the world threatened by climate change and has lost almost six percent of GDP per year due to health costs of environmental degradation.

The aim of Denmark's development cooperation is to reduce poverty through the promotion of human rights and economic growth. In Pakistan, Denmark is collaborating with several civil society organisations, including HRCP to promote human rights for strengthening democracy, peace and prosperity in the country.

France

Ambassador of France visits the Warsak Dam Hydropower Plant (23rd April 2016)



On April 23rd 2016, H.E. Mrs. Martine DORANCE, Ambassador of France, along with H.E. Mrs. Ina LEPEL, Ambassador of Germany and H.E. Jean-François CAUTAIN, Ambassador of European Union, visited the Warsak Dam and hydro power plant built on Kabul River in Khyber Agency near Peshawar. The 243MW power house operated by WAPDA will be rehabilitated in 2017 with the financial support of France, Germany, the European Union, the European Investment Bank and WAPDA for a total amount of 162.5 million euros.

For this purpose, the French Agency for Development has arranged a 40 M€ loan and an additional 4.5 M€ grant delegated by the European Union / Asia Investment Facility (EU/AIF).

France at the 4th Islamabad Literature Festival (15-17 April, 2016)



The Embassy of France in Pakistan is proud to have contributed to the 4th Islamabad Literature Festival, by inviting one of the leading French scholars on South Asia, Christophe Jaffrelot.

The Ambassador of France, participating to the opening ceremony for the second year, saluted the festival, which showed the lively culture of debate in Pakistan. She notably paid tribute to the great Urdu writer Intizar Hussain, who passed away a few months back and was a great friend of France. The Embassy is a regular contributor to the Festival and Christophe Jaffrelot's presence this year helped offer a solid and critical take on Pakistani politics, both past and present.

As part of a panel discussion with Pakistani authors, Christophe Jaffrelot presented his previous and recently published books, the *Pakistan Paradox*. *Instability and Resilience* (Hurst, 2015, translation of the French version published in 2013) and *Pakistan at Crossroads – Domestic Dynamics and External Pressures*. He also intervened in the closure keynote on the topic of "Correlations between the domestic and foreign policies of Pakistan."

Christophe Jaffrelot teaches primarily at the Paris Institute of Political Studies, known as "Sciences Po" where is associated with the Centre of International Research as Senior Research Fellow. He is also Global Scholar at Princeton University, New Jersey as well as professor of Indian politics and sociology at the King's India Institute and King's College, London.

Jaffrelot regularly contributes to the press with his analysis on events related to his areas of research and was awarded the 2014 Ramnath Goenka Award for Excellence in Journalism.

French Senators visit Pakistan (11-15 April 2016)

A delegation of the France-Pakistan Friendship group of the French Senate visited Pakistan from 11 to 15 of April. Led by Senator Pascal Allizard, elected from the region of Calvados, it also included Senator Françoise Cartron, Vice-President of the Senate and Senator of Gironde, and Senator Patricia Morhet Richaud, elected from Hautes Alpes, together with the administrator of the friendship group, Mr Pierre-Michel Vauthelin.

French Senators followed a dense program of meetings with their counterparts as well as with the business community and the civil society in Islmabad, Lahore and Karachi, aimed at reinforcing bilateral relations between France and Pakistan in all domains, especially economic, cultural and university and scientific exchanges.

Among others, they were received by the President of the Senate of Pakistan, by the convener of the France-Pakistan friesndhip group in the Pakistani Senate, by the Minister of State, Chairman of BISP, and by the Chief Minister of Punjab.

They also interacted with members from the business community in Lahore and Karachi, particularly with the Pakistan Business Council and the Pakistan France Business Alliance.

They also met the Chairman of the HEC, in order to strengthen university and scientific ties between the two countries

Public lecture « Study in France » at University of Agriculture Faisalabad

University of Agriculture Faisalabad (UAF) is the second best university of Pakistan according to the ranking of the Higher Education Commission. Approximately 30 professors of UAF have completed their PhD in France.

These members of the "Pak-France Alumni Network" have contributed to the organization of a public lecture "Study in France" by the Director of "Alliance Française Lahore" and the Higher Education and Scientific Attaché of the Embassy of France. The lecture took place on May 31, 2016, in front of more than 200 students and faculty.

This lecture was followed by a visit of the university.

Lahore attack – Statement by the President of the Republic of France (27 March 2016)

The attack perpetrated today in Lahore, Pakistan, claimed more than 60 lives and injured many, according to a first assessment, unfortunately still temporary.

The Chief of State expresses the full solidarity of France to the authorities and the people of Pakistan in these painful moments and reiterates the inflexible will of our country to continue to fight against terrorism.

France Pakistan Joint Security Commission (24 March 2016)

Joint communiqué

- 1. Fourth Round of Pakistan France Joint Security Commission Talks was held in Ministry of Defence, Rawalpindi on 24th March 2016. Lt Gen (Retd) Muhammad Alam Khtaak, Secretary Defence led Pakistan delegation while French delegation was led by Mr. Louis GAUTIER, Secretary General for Defence and National Security.
- 2. Prior to the holding of the Plenary Session Mr. Louis GAUTIER called on Lt Gen (Retd) Muhammad Alam Khttak in his office during which issues relating to bilateral security cooperation and counter terrorism were discussed. Both the leaders also share sympathies on tragic terrorist attacks in France and Pakistan.
- 3. During the Plenary Session, both sides deliberated upon various areas of mutual interest including security matters, counter terrorism and prevailing regional environment. In addition, the delegations took stock of the actions that have been undertaken since last Joint Security Commission meeting held in France in January 2014. Both sides discussed the successes achieved by Government of

Pakistan through Operation Zarb-e-Azb and National Action Plan. The discussion also focused on possible academic exchanges between the institutions of the two countries on security issues and benefit from each others experiences and capabilities to counter the common threat of terrorism and extremism. French side also offered to share its expertise and best practices on crises management procedures such as natural catastrophe or plane crashes etc. Both sides agreed to deliberate the issue further in upcoming months in Paris.

- 4. One of the salient features of the Session was the signing of Bilateral Agreement between France and Pakistan which stipulates that France will assist Pakistan in strengthening the capabilities of its Police Force in the area of counter terrorism. This will be implemented through a three-year programme aimed at developing specific police skills, such as scientific and technical assistance; expertise in identifying forged documents; in cybercrime; in civil defence etc.
- 5. Talks of Joint Security Commission were held in a cordial atmosphere. Delegation leaders shared their resolve to work together for enhanced co-operation in the field of defence and capacity building of Law enforcement agencies. They also agreed that the 5th Round of Pakistan-France Joint Security Commission Talks will take place in France in early 2017.

"Women and Climate Change": French Embassy holds special event for International Women's Day



"Women and Climate Change"

The Ambassador of France to Pakistan, H.E. Mrs. Martine Dorance, hosted an event on the 14th of March, 2016, to mark International Women's Day, after weeklong celebrations.

The debate, which focused on "Women and Climate Change", gathered almost a hundred

representatives from the political world, Parliamentarians, government officials, prominent activists and members of the civil society, journalists, diplomats and UN representatives, as well as women representing the voices of the mountain communities.

More than 100 days after the historical achievement of a universal agreement on climate change in Paris, the Ambassador made a call to sustain the momentum terming 2016 as the "year of action and implementation".

Emphasizing the fact that women were "primary victims of climate change, but also often the main source of solutions", Ambassador underlined the need to "place women at the core of national and local climate strategies and at the heart of international climate negotiations".

Apart from raising awareness on this subject, the event, she said, was aiming at presenting an often forgotten face of the Women of Pakistan, women who fought for their ideas, women who were carpenters, women who climbed the Everest at the age of 21, referring to the special participants in the audience.

Among many outstanding Pakistani voices, like Dr. Shoaib Sultan Khan or Mr. Malik Amin Aslam, the keynote speakers shared their comments on these issues:



Senator Sherry Rehman appreciated the "call for action" initiated by the Embassy of France on this fundamental topic which was not a "niche subject" but would impact the lives of all Pakistanis. She underlined the enormous risks climate change was posing in terms of daily security and resilience in Pakistan, "incubat[ing] exclusion, sharpen[ing] gender inequalities and reduc[ing] access to education as well as affecting production", when the "producers of the country [were] primarily for women".

She emphasized the need for a "national conversation" at the political and parliamentarian level on climate change, which would need to include women.



Major General Asghar Nawaz, Chairman of the National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA), underlined the sheerness of the impacts climate change was having in Pakistan and its high vulnerability, as "75% of disasters were linked to meteorological causes" throughout the country ("floods, droughts, heat waves, glacier's melting, avalanches and landslides, new tropical cyclonic activities in the Arabian Sea"). He insisted on the need to focus on the most vulnerable groups, particularly women, and on the importance of awareness and education. NDMA was strongly committed in that sense, was now conducting surveys with disaggregated data and had set up a special Gender and Child Cell.

Mrs. Aisha Khan, CEO of the Mountain and Glaciers Protection Organization (MGPO), called for the strengthening of a new "civil society platform" aimed at helping the government to tackle climate change in Pakistan, taking forward a broad-based dynamic started last year. She called to expand the outreach, build alliances, consolidate gains and accelerate the momentum to sensitize all stakeholders about climate change. She underlined that "climate risk management can never be successful without social equity, equitable distribution of resources and proportionate representation of women in decision making."



Mrs. Aqeela Bano and Farman Ali, two young women who have been trained in a skill development project of carpentry, masonry and electrification, developed in Hunza and Chitral by the Aga Khan Cultural Service (AKCS) with the support of the Embassy of France in Pakistan, also talked of their experience during COP21 as they represented Pakistani feminine voices in the Paris Conference. Ms. Aqeela Bano, Surveyor of the project spoke about the challenges and success of young entrepreneurs from her area and how their participation to the COP21 Climate Conference had given them new ideas of wooden house construction. She said "women can achieve anything they want".

Mrs. Samina Baig, famous alpinist, first Pakistani woman to climb all seven summits in the world, climbing the Everest at the age of 21, made a strong and inspiring speech. She termed climate change "a bigger threat than terrorism". She gave her fist hand testimony of glacier melting all over the world and in the summits of Pakistan, saying she got surprised last year while climbing the K2, seeing that "snow had barely frozen at 6000m". She called for action in face of this alarming situation.

Mr. Ali Tauqeer Sheikh, CEO of LEAD Pakistan, termed the COP21 "another French Revolution" and "regret[ted] this debate was not happening in the national and provincial Parliaments". He insisted on the importance of tackling climate change, one of the three most important challenges for Pakistan and the world, and underlined the need to include gender approaches to the policies. He called the Parliaments to give budgets to mitigate and adapt to climate change and asked media to engage in raising awareness on the subject.



OPENING SPEECH OF H.E. MARTINE DORANCE, AMBASSADOR OF FRANCE TO PAKISTAN DEBATE ON "WOMEN AND CLIMATE CHANGE"

14TH MARCH 2016, RESIDENCE OF FRANCE

Honorable Members of Parliament,
Dear Chairman of the National Disaster Management Authority,
Excellencies.

Dear Colleagues,
Ladies and Gentlemen,

We are today gathered on the occasion of Women's International Day, whose celebration, given the importance of the topic, extends now to several days, or even weeks.

When talking about gender, we often think of women's empowerment and opportunities, be it through education, in the economy, in the political or media world. More and more also, and this is something new, new in Pakistan but also in most countries in the world including mine, when talking about gender, we need to talk about the links between women and climate change and environment. In the past few months, I am very pleased to have seen a raising awareness and action regarding climate change in Pakistan. Your presence here today confirms it and honours us. Through the actions of many of you gathered today, and, I want to underline, especially women, things are moving: an exceptional civil society mobilization during and after the COP 21; Parliamentarian debates and initiatives such as the complete solarisation of the Parliament in Islamabad, the first in the world; the recent tree planting campaign launched by the government; the raising awareness within the media which now reports on climate change on a very constant basis.

Who else but you can better talk about this topic? I also think of the women on the ground, the women who live in the mountains and are here today, in direct contact with nature and the impacts of climate change.

Women and gender held a crucial role during the COP21, the Conference on Climate Change which was held in Paris in December last. As you know, the event was inaugurated by a great number of heads of state and government, among them the Prime minister of Pakistan, Mr. Nawaz Sharif. During this 10 days Conference, there was even a day dedicated only to Gender.

The Paris agreement itself in its recitals underlines that, "when taking action to address climate change, [countries will commit] to respect, promote and consider gender equality and empowerment of women".

Why is this so important? Firstly, women are the primary victims of climate change, for it is poor communities that are the most vulnerable and suffer the worst of its impacts, and women make up 70% of those in poverty throughout the world.

According to the UN, when a natural disaster strikes a region, the risk of death is 14 times higher for women, mainly because they are not targeted as a priority by disaster warning and prevention programmes.

Climate change also increases the number of constraints on women, who are responsible, in many regions, for providing food, water and fuel for their families. Another worrying fact is that these constraints result in too much household work, which often leads to girls dropping out of school. It also entails consequences on health, and reproductive health especially.

As the primary victims of climate change, women are also often the main source of solutions. As development experts duly highlight, a climate change programme designed without taking women into account is less effective than the same programme planned with them.

In light of these facts, one thing is certain: women must be placed at the core of national and local climate strategies and at the heart of international climate negotiations.

As France is currently holding the presidency of COP21, it will ensure that.

Since the historical achievement of a universal agreement on climate change, in Paris, about a 100 days ago, we now need to sustain the momentum.

While 2015 was the year of negotiation and mobilization, this 2016 should be that of action and implementation.

In Pakistan, France will stay committed and expand its actions of cooperation and will continue to organize a series of events to raise awareness:

- ▶ the French Agency for Development, AFD, which currently focuses mainly on green energy, especially on hydroelectricity, will expand the scope of its projects particularly in climate change mitigation and adaption throughout the year;
- ► France is supporting the creation of a civil society platform, "a"climate change coalition","to gather forces and expertise in the subject, and I am happy to see many of its members present today;
- France is also helping to build scientific bridges, between, for example, the Pakistan Meteorological Department and Meteo France, and is in the process of helping to create a "Pakistani IPCC" (Intergovernmental Panel for Climate Change), a scientists platform working exclusively on Climate change.
- ▶ Several events will be organized during the course of the year to raise awareness:
- Among others, a second big moot on climate change will be organized as a follow up to the Climate Change Lahore Forum, before the COP22, which will take stock of the Paris conclusions and look at the new commitments of Pakistan, which has promised a new INDC (intended nationally determined contribution);
- Awareness in schools will be continued, especially through the painting competitions organized by the government in the whole of Pakistan;
- ▶ Trainings sessions on climate change for a diverse public will be prolonged.
- I am sure the debate today will be of high quality. Its aim is to raise awareness on the subject, be it from a more political and institutional perspective, in the first part of this event, as eminent speakers, Senator Sherry Rehman and the Chairman of the National Disaster Management Authority, General Asghar Nawaz, will share their expertise and ideas with us.

Or be it from a civil society perspective, starting with the CEO of Mountain and Glaciers Protection Organisation, Mrs. Aisha Khan, who was in Paris during the COP21, or Mrs. Aqeela Bano and Farman Ali, both from Hunza, who lead the carpentry program supported by France together with the Aga Khan Foundation, and also went to Paris to represent the feminine voices of Pakistan. I am glad also to have among us Mr. Ali Tauqeer Sheikh, CEO of LEAD Pakistan, who will conclude the session today, as a follow up to a first workshop held on the same topic three weeks back at LEAD.

Finally, let me conclude by saying this event is also aimed at presenting another face of the Women of Pakistan: women who fight for their ideas, women who are carpenters, women who climb the

Everest at the age of 21 and the seven summits in the world. Let me here give a special thank you to Mrs Samina Baig for her presence and voice among us.

Germany

German Grant worth 6 Mio Euros for establishing Pakistan Glacial Monitoring Network

Germany through the KfW Development Bank has provided a grant of 6 Mio EUR to monitor over 5 000 melting glaciers in the northern parts of Pakistan which contribute about 80 per cent of river flow. The grant will be provided to the Water & Power Development Authority (WAPDA) for the Project "Glacial Monitoring for Energy and Water Security in Pakistan" for telemetric equipment in the lower stretches of the glaciated areas. Pakistan is one of the most vulnerable countries to vagaries of climate change, experiencing recurring floods.

Secretary Economic Affairs Division, Mr. Tariq Bajwa, Member Water WAPDA Mr. Shoeib Iqbal and KfW Country Director Mr. Wolfgang Moellers signed the Grant Financing Agreement today, in the presence of First Secretary Sebastian Ernst from the German Embassy and WAPDA. Speaking on the occasion, both EAD and WAPDA appreciated the long term development partnership with KfW. Mr. Moellers said that "b"ing the custodian of the largest number of glaciers outside the arctic, Pakistan can surely assume global leadership in addressing a critical aspect of Climate Change through this Project."

"he Solar power equipment will transmit glacial melt data for processing in Lahore. The data will be used to regulate hydropower generation, dam protection, and other reservoir management operations. The Federal Flood Commission, the Flood Forecasting Division of the Pakistan

Meteorological Department and the Indus River Systems Authority will benefit from this information. Two state-of-the-art energy efficient buildings will be constructed in Lahore and Skardu for housing the staff and the sophisticated equipment.

Germany supports girls' 'ducation: 900 female students of the Daag

Behsud Government Girls Primary School in Nowshera, among them 120 refugee girls from Afghanistan, benefit from largely improved conditions for their school education. The project was funded by Germany within the framework of the UNHCR-led Refugee Affected and Hosting Areas Project (RAHA).

The UN High Commissioner for Refugees Filippo Grandi handed over the extensively rehabilitated and reconstructed school building to Muhammad Atif, Minister for Education of Khyber-Pakhtunkhwa. On the inauguration ceremony, German Chargé d'Affaires a.i. Peter Felten stated: "This project is a fine example of cooperation between the authorities of Pakistan, the United

Nations and international partners. I can assure you that neither the plight of Afghan refugees nor the immense generosity of the Pakistani people in welcoming and hosting the refugees over three decades, has been forgotten by the international community.

We will continue to support the Pakistani federal and provincial Governments in their efforts to provide Afghan refugees with services like education and health that they so urgently need. Our common goal is that the refugees can return to their homeland as soon as possible. Therefore, all national, regional and international partners who have the possibility to do so must make their contribution to bring the bloodshed and terror in Afghanistan to an end immediately, to promote peace and stability in Afghanistan and to create an environment in which the refugees can return voluntarily and in dignity, and find livelihood opportunities that enable them to restore their lives at home in a sustainable manner."

Germany has been one of the major contributors to the UN Refugee Agency's global budget and to the Government of Pakistan's efforts to support Afghan refugees and their hosting areas in Pakistan.

On this occasion GPCCI signed an MoU with the Pakistani-German Renewable Energies Forum (PGREF). The ceremony was attended by high-ranking guests from Germany, Ambassador Lepel, CG Schmiedchen, members of the diplomatic corps, the business community and the media.





Federal Foreign Minister Steinmeier on the beginning of the fasting month of Ramadan



Speaking in Mexico City on 5 June, Foreign Minister Steinmeier issued the following statement to mark the beginning of the fasting month of Ramadan:

I wish all Muslims a peaceful and blessed Ramadan in the company of their families.

This year, once again, millions of people will celebrate this special month in Germany and throughout the world.

For Muslims, Ramadan is an important time for reflection, contemplation and fellowship. I was able to experience this first hand last year, when I was privileged to celebrate Ramadan with Syrian families in Brandenburg. Despite the difficult journey these people had endured, the time spent together with their families gave them strength and optimism.

My desire is that in view of the many crises and conflicts in the Islamic world in particular, this festival will send a message of hope and peace, of respect and tolerance.

May 29 Children are our future

We internationally protect their rights with the Convention on the Rights of the Child – Pakistan, like Germany, is a state party to all major international human rights treaties, i.e. the provisions of these treaties are legally binding on Pakistan.

One of these human rights treaties is the Convention on the Rights of the Child. States party to the Convention are obliged to regularly report on progress made in the implementation of the Convention. Recently Pakistan's fifth periodic report on the implementation of the Convention was examined by the Committee on the Rights of the Child, which is composed of internationally renowned independent child rights experts.

May 28 German Ambassador Ina Lepel spoke at the 8th PowerGen

Conference on Thursday, together with Mohammad Younus Dagha, Federal Secretary Ministry of Water & Power, and a number of other distinguished representatives from the government and the energy sector. Ambassador Lepel shared Germany's lessons learnt from the "Energiewende" – Germany's energy revolution for secure, sustainable and affordable energy. She also highlighted the potential of renewable energy in Pakistan and the expertise of German companies in this field: "Renewables have the potential to play a significant role to end load shedding in Pakistan. We hope that they will continue to receive the attention from public and private stakeholders they deserve."

May 27 The textile and garment industry is the backbone of

Pakistan's'economy. We support the All Pakistan Textile Mill Association (APTMA) in establishing a Sustainable Production Center, which helps members of the association and beyond to increase energy efficiency, water efficiency and labour standards in their production. GIZ country director signed a Declaration of Intend with APTMA for German support to the Sustainable

Production Center yesterday.

about TVET in Pakistan. First they visited the Punjab Vocational Training Council hosted by its Chairman Faisal Ijaz Khan, to find out more about competency based training. Afterwards the delegation went to the premises of the Government Apprentices Training Center in which DB Schenker as one partner from the corporate sector offers Cooperative Vocational Training.

The aim is to create a network between the two countries industries, public sectors and innovation networks in the Renewable Energy (RE) and Energy Efficiency (EE) field. The German Government has been supporting the energy sector in Pakistan through GIZ's Renewable Energy and Energy Efficiency project (REEE) since 2005. With the aim to reducing the power shortage in Pakistan and moving towards an optimal energy mix by incorporating more renewable energy sources, the PGREF intends to promote cooperation and knowledge transfer in the fields of renewable energy and energy efficiency in Pakistan.

May 26

A high level German delegation led by the Head of Division Afghanistan/Pakistan of the Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development, Dr. Stefan Oswald, is visiting Lahore today to

The purpose of the project in cooperation with four NGOs is to help the poor and vulnerable groups in Pakistan to get better access to maternal and child health services. It should be more affordable, accessible and acceptable. The NGOs are the Aga Khan Foundation, DKT, the Family Planning Association of Pakistan and Greenstar Social Marketing. This grant will focus on maternal and child health in the Federally Administered Tribal Area (FATA), Gilgit Baltistan, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and Northern Punjab.

May 17

Germany supports **vocational training for young Pakistanis**: The Ambassadors of Germany, the EU and the Netherlands distributed awards to the winners of the TVET Skills Mela at

Peshawar last week. Young people from all provinces of Pakistan, who have successfully completed a vocational training course, were invited to attend the Skills Mela in Peshawar. Our Ambassador Ina Lepel was impressed by the variety and quality of skills of the participants.

May 16

Two of our colleagues were in Quetta last week for project visits and **political consultations**. They were delighted to attend the groundbreaking of a practice site for young cricketers next to Ayub Stadium and to visit a government school for girls rehabilitated through German funding. In addition to discussions with H.E. Dr. Hamid Khan Achakzai, Minister of Planning and Development Balochistan, and Mr Anwaar-ul-Haq Kakar, Spokesperson of the Government of Balochistan, they also looked at a Registration Card Modification Centre for Afghan refugees. We will continue our efforts to support refugee hosting areas and to contribute to the economic development of Balochistan!

May 13

"E"rope Day" "brought a series of events: All EU embassies send their ambassadors to Pakistani universities to talk about the EU and their country. Our ambassador Ina Lepel gave a lecture at Fatima Jinnah Women University, while the head of our press and cultural section, Dr. Dan Tidten, did so at the National University of Modern Languages (NUML). Both lectures were well received - —e thank the students for their active participation!

May 12

This week representatives of the German Embassy travelled to a Small village of UC Komi

Kot in AJK, to visit the agriculture project of our partner Crescent Development Foundation. With German funds the Pakistani NGO trained marginalized women of several villages in modern farming techniques such as tunnel farming and the use of glass houses.

Beneficiaries told us, that after the trainings and with the new tools their production of vegetables increased between 50-100%! The women also founded Female Farmer Organizations, which contact the local markets to sell any excess vegetables. What a great way to contribute to the family income and start small enterprises! We were impressed by the achievements of these strong women living in a remote area!

Germany supports the **rehabilitation and reintegration of IDPs** to FATA through a 10-Million-Euro project, which will be implemented by SRSP. 





Strengthening Institutional and Community Resilience in the Hazardous Areas of Pakistan

On June 2nd, 2016, a knowledge dissemination seminar of the Norwegian-supported project "Strengthening Institutional and Community Resilience in the Hazardous Areas of Pakistan" was arranged at Islamabad Hotel. The event was attended by the project beneficiaries, civil society institutions, government officials and others. Ambassador of Norway, Mr Tore Nedrebø, was the chief guest.

First secretary of the embassy, Mr. Tom Jørgen Martinussen, also participated in the event. Ms. Nusrat Nasab, Chief Executive Officer of FOCUS Pakistan in her opening remarks appreciated the support of Norway to the Aga Khan Development Network's development and humanitarian programme over the last several years. She particularly lauded the support extended for the disaster preparedness activities, which has benefited thousands of community members, government officials and others. This support and activities of disaster preparedness activities have also contributed to

saving many lives. She noted that climate change has adverse impact on the lives of the people of Gilgit-Baltistan and Chitral through an increase in frequency and intensity of disasters.

Ambassador Nedrebø appreciated the work of AKDN and FOCUS in the development as well as humanitarian sectors. He appreciated the disaster preparedness work gained through the project and shared his impressions from a recent visit in the north, where he witnessed a disaster simulation which was followed by a quick response to a real-life car accident by FOCUS team in Hunza. He stressed the need to build more synergies and coordination among DRR actors, government authorities and donors.

The project "Strengthening Institutional and Community Resilience in the Hazardous Areas of Pakistan" funded by Royal Norwegian Embassy (RNE) was initiated in January 2015 and will phase out in June 2016. The total funding made available was about USD 400.000. The project was built on lessons learned from the phase 1 implemented during 2012-2014.

The aim of the project has been to strengthen community resilience through the implementation of integrated DRR activities and building the capacity of government and community institutions. More specifically, the project had three main goals:

Improved risk anticipation and Early Warning Mechanisms through strengthening institutional and local capacity and information sharing practices

Enhanced and sustained community and institutional preparedness to DRR through community awareness and training sessions for community members including women, DRR planning, stockpiling and school based interventions

Develop and strengthen linkages among DRR practitioners including government officials through capacity building sessions and formation of networks in Gilgit-Baltistan

The project has benefitted over 38,000 individuals from the communities, government departments and other sectors. Through the project over 40 hazard and risk maps were prepared, 37 villages based disaster risk management training sessions and disaster risk management plans were prepared. Also, 7 comprehensive disaster management training sessions were arranged for local support organizations were arranged and stockpiles of basic response equipment including tents, blankets, basic search tools and first aid boxes. This helped locals in building resilience to disasters.

Additionally, sessions on basic swift water rescue were arranged in the areas, where water hazard

remains dominant.

To improve early warning system, a center of early warning was established in Gilgit, which is equipped with necessary skills and resources for flood, snow avalanches, debris flow and landslides. The center is also linked with the extensive meter based early warning system installed at Mayoon village in Hunza. The system has been procured from Taiwan and would help local communities in monitoring the landslide cracks and also warn in timely manner in case of any major changes happening at the landslide.

The project also contributed in improving coordination and linkages among disaster risk reduction (DRR) actors in Gilgit-Baltistan and Chitral with creation of DRR forums. Also, over 200 policemen and women were trained in first aid and mass casualty as first responders.





May 26

Opening of Leif Larsen Music Centre at Altit

On 26th May 2016, Norwegian ambassador Tore Nedrebø opened the Leif Larsen Music Centre at Altit in the Hunza valley of Pakistan's mountainous Gilgit- Baltistan northern region. The Centre is dedicated to the memory of the late previous Norwegian ambassador to Pakistan, Leif H. Larsen, who tragically expired in a helicopter accident in nearby Naltar in May 2015.

The purpose of the centre is to provide facilities for traditional musicians and performers of Gilgit-Baltistan and Chitral to train youth in different traditions and genres of mountain music. The centre will follow the *Ustaad-Shagird* (teacher-apprentice) model of music education, which the Aga Khan Music Initiative has previously implemented in central Asian countries. An internationally renowned music educator and music events expert, Mr. Will Ramsay, visited Hunza last year and to help develop the community-based music education and out-reach programme that is now based at the Leif Larsen Music Centre.

The Centre will provide short residencies for visiting artists, writers, historians and environmentalists during summer and music education and production during autumn and winter. It will also help local communities organise different festivals and music events. Currently, 32 young students (18 female and 14 male) are enrolled in two months' basic training in seven local music instruments short courses, supported by five local musicians.

The Leif Larsen Music Centre was constructed by the Ciqam social women entreprise, using local materials and vernacular architecture. It was jointly funded by the Royal Norwegian Embassy in Islamabad (47%) and the Aga Khan Music Initiative (53%) at a total cost of about USD 150.000.

At the opening ceremony also the ambassadors of the European Union, Mr. Jean-François Cautain and his wife, of Switzerland, Mr. Marc George, and of the acting high commissioner of Canada, Mr. Andrew Turner, were present. So were representatives of the Aga Khan Cultural Services in Pakistan, the Aga Khan Planning and Building Services in Pakistan, FOCUS Humanitarian Assistance, the Aga Khan Foundation Pakistan and Aga Khan Rural Support Programme as well as representatives of the local community and residents at the centre.

Sweden

June 2

Carl Bildt in Islamabad: "India and Pakistan can use EU as an example"

"EU could serve as an example to India and Pakistan" former Swedish Prime Minister and Foreign Minister, Carl Bildt, stated in a public speech in Islamabad on Wednesday, 1st June. He continued "Inter-regional cooperation is critical to solve contemporary geopolitical challenges, and this line of thinking applies not only to the EU but to any international region".

Mr Bildt's speech titled "Global Security Challenges in the Era of New Geo-Political Realignments: European Responses", covered a wide spectrum of global events over the past decades, which have led the world to where it stands today. The issues ranged from the crucial role of trade relations and political dialogue to the propaganda apparatus of Daesh and Bildt the return of European politics to those of decades past due to the deteriorating relationship with Russia in the wake of the annexation of Crimea. On the latter, Carl Bildt laconically quipped that "Invading another country, usually does not end with them becoming friends".

A veritable all-rounder in the field of global issues and international relations, Mr Bildt is a much consulted analysts on a broad spectrum of topics. Among a multitude of other appointments he is one of the Special Representatives of the Swedish Prime Minister for Sweden's Candidacy to the United Nations Security Council. He visited Pakistan in that capacity.

H.E Tariq Fatemi, Special Advisor to the Prime Minister of Pakistan, was a chief guest to the event and delivered gave his remarks followed by a vivid and engaging question-and-answer session with the audience. The event was co-hosted by co-hosted by the Embassy of Sweden in Islamabad and the Center for Research and Security Studies (CRSS).

UK aid supports new motorway construction in Pakistan

UK's Department for International Development (DFID) will assist Government of Pakistan for upgrading sections of Motorway in Punjab.

The United Kingdom's Department for International Development (DFID) attended the signing of an agreement between the Asian Development Bank (ADB) and the Government of Pakistan for a \$34 million grant to build the remaining 64-kilometre section of the motorway (M-4) connecting Shorkot and Khanewal in Punjab province.

The Asian Development Bank (ADB) will administer the UK's \$34 million grant and the additional \$100 million loan by the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank (AIIB).

The agreement was signed between Pakistan's Secretary for Economic Affairs Tariq Bajwa and ADB Country Director for Pakistan Werner E. Liepach, in a ceremony attended by Pakistan's Finance Minister Senator Mohammad Ishaq Dar, ADB Vice President Wencai Zhang and the Head of UK's Department for International Development (DFID) Joanna Reid.

Speaking at the signing ceremony, the Head of UK's Department for International Development (DFID) Joanna Reid said:

DFID and ADB are supporting the government of Pakistan to create regional connectivity, economic growth and stability in Pakistan. The agreement signed today is an important step in this direction. The UK's collaboration will support Pakistan to improve road safety and to create an environment that will transform roads into economic corridors. This partnership will not only help Pakistan promote and expand trade with regional partners, but also to create more jobs and sustainable livelihoods.

This partnership is a unique moment, as this will be one of the very first AIIB investments as a new institution. The UK is supporting the Government of Pakistan three times over through this project – as an investor in the ADB, as an investor in the AIIB and through a grant directly from DFID.

ADB will administer both the DFID grant and the AIIB loan to assist Pakistan to upgrade key sections of primary north-south highways and motorways through its transport sector projects. This project is part of a 1,800 kilometres Central Asia Regional Economic Cooperation (CAREC) transport corridor. Once completed, the transport project will help substantially cut travel time between Karachi and Peshawar and link up Pakistan with the Central Asian countries boosting regional trade and commerce.

Notes to editors

The Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank (AIIB) is a multilateral development bank (MDB). Chinese President Xi Jinping and Premier Li Keqiang announced the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank (AIIB) initiative during their respective visits to Southeast Asian countries in October 2013. The Bank was envisaged to promote interconnectivity and economic integration in the region and cooperate with existing multilateral development banks.

Following this announcement, bilateral and multilateral discussions and consultations commenced on core principles and key elements for establishing the AIIB. In October, 2014, 22 Asian countries gathered in Beijing to sign Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to establish the AIIB. At a Special Ministerial Meeting following the signing of the MOU, Mr. Jin Liqun was appointed as the Secretary General of the Multilateral Interim Secretariat.

Joined by the PCB's Chairman, Mr Shaharyar Khan, and Chairman Executive Committee, Mr Najam Sethi, Thomas Drew extended his best wishes to both England and Pakistan and said:

I am delighted to be hosting this Iftar dinner for the Pakistan Cricket Team on the eve of your

departure for the United Kingdom to play England.

This is a significant event for me - not just because I like a good game of cricket. It is also because of the power of sport to achieve all the things that I, as a diplomat, try to do to bring our two countries together. Our respective cricket teams – Men and Women's – have ambassadorial powers that I can only dream of.

Sport is particularly powerful in reaching out to the young, who represent the future of our two countries – and are the focus of so much of the UK's work here. Indeed, alongside our education work, this magnificent British Council library, which I opened only two weeks ago is another important example of that.

I haven't forgotten who pays my salary, fond though I am of Pakistan, so I won't pretend that I will be supporting anyone other than the home team. But my biggest hope is for a great summer of sport, where the cricket does the talking. And I wish Pakistan's teams a fabulous stay in Britain.

Speaking on the occasion, Chairman PCB, Mr Shaharyar Khan, said:

It is indeed most thoughtful of the British High Commissioner HE Thomas Drew to have hosted the Pakistan team immediately prior to its departure for England.

Cricketing relations between England and Pakistan have always been characterized by great and highly entertaining rivalry. From its first tour after its recognition, Pakistan's most memorable Test victory at the Oval gave the nascent nation its first cricketing super star in Fazal Mahmood.

The upstart babe of cricket then not only held its own by drawing the maiden Test rubber but also became the only nation until now to have bested England in the mother country on its first tour! Manager Intikhab Alam, who having skippered Pakistan on 1971 and 1974 tours and having represented Surrey for decades on end, is no stranger to England. The team is indeed backed by a support staff second to none.

I am positive that the squad assembled here tonight under Misbah-ul-Haq shall give a good account of itself on the forthcoming tour, not only on the field of play but also in terms of winning friends through impeccable display of grace and sportsmanship

To Misbah and his charges, I would say, play hard, giving no quarter to England, for under Alastair Cook they are too good an outfit to not make you regret it. That said, I would also exhort to you all to follow the best traditions of the game.

At the conclusion, I again thank HE Thomas Drew and the staff of the British High Commission for their hospitality and thoughtfulness.

British mountaineers arrive in Pakistan to break records while tackling K2

15 June 2016

The seven member expedition is led by Di Gilbert, from the Highlands, who could become one of the first British women to get the 'gold medal of mountaineering'. The group also includes Captain Jake Meyer, from Gloucestershire, who could become the youngest Brit to reach the top of K2, which is the world's second highest mountain. Nepalese Sherpa Mingma Dorchi could also become the first person to climb the mountain three times.

The group is completed by fellow Brits Pete Brittleton from the Lake District and Paul Etheridge from Ipswich, as well as Canadian Jean-Bernard Charron and Nepalese Sherpa Phurba Ongel. They also met the head of the DFID Pakistan Joanna Reid, British Consul Jon Ryan and Islamabad-based diplomat Richard Oldfield, who is also planning to climb to K2's basecamp.

Only eight other Brits who have reached the summit of the "Savage Mountain", three of whom died on the descent.

Speaking to the mountaineers, the Acting British High Commissioner to Pakistan, Patrick Moody said: It is a complete honour to meet such an incredible group of people. K2 is the second highest mountain in the world, but its inaccessibility, the technical requirements and the danger it presents, makes it the most prized trophy for the world's best mountaineers. The team's bravery, good humour and attitude before taking on this enormous challenge, is truly humbling.

I am also very happy to see the re-emergence of Pakistan as a destination for the best mountain climbers in the world. With five mountains over 8000 meters, Pakistan has more high mountains than anywhere else in the world, and expeditions like this are important for the local economy and to showcase the incredible natural beauty of Pakistan.

I extend my warmest wishes to all the participants.

Joanna Reid, Head of DFID Pakistan, added:

As a woman, I am particularly proud to wish the group led by Di, the very best of luck. Pakistan is a hard place to be a woman, and her courage and leadership should be an inspiration for many others

I was very sad when the British Council library stopped and I always felt it was a part of my childhood that I would want to have again. British High Commissioner Thomas Drew CMG today joined British champion boxer Amir Khan to

open the Amir Khan Academy at the Islamabad Sports Complex in Islamabad, Pakistan. The new venue is Amir Khan's first boxing academy in Pakistan.

Speaking at the launch, Thomas Drew said:

You came here to see a boxer not an Ambassador, so I will keep it short.

But what Amir Khan is doing here is about more than just boxing, so I do want to say a couple of things.

When I heard the news of the death this morning of one of the world's greatest boxers, I knew exactly what I wanted to say. Mohammed Ali was a great boxer, like Amir, but he was also more than that. He was an inspiration to millions throughout the world. He touched everyone, but had a particular impact on the young. He inspired not just through the grace of his boxing, but also through the sense of purpose he instilled – a desire and a determination to achieve in life.

This is what tonight is about. Through his academies, Amir Khan is inspiring the next generation – in Pakistan and in the UK – themselves to achieve in life. I too therefore am very proud to be taking part in the opening of his academy in Islamabad – the first in Pakistan.

As I said at the beginning, boxers and Ambassadors are very different beasts. What we do, however, have in common is our desire to help Pakistan, the 6th biggest country in the world, unleash its full potential. And we both recognise that in this fast growing country – where nearly 60% of the population is under 23 – that means investing in its youth. The British Government's biggest development programme anywhere in the world is in Pakistan. And the biggest bit of that is in education. Only yesterday I opened a new British Council library for young people in Lahore and a new digital library for others across Pakistan. And we, like Amir, recognise through our programmes the power of sport – though I won't claim to have anything like the pulling (or punching) power that he has.

So, to return to where I started, this is a sad day for the world of boxing. But I take comfort too in the knowledge that an element of Mohammed Ali's power to inspire future generations lives on in initiatives such as this.

It is a city full of energy, entrepreneurship and creativity and we are all looking forward to watching the city's growth over the coming decades.

The international delegation included senior military and civilian officials from around the world. As part of the tour agenda, the RCDS delegation had planned a series of meetings with Government as well as non-government officials and institutions in Islamabad, Lahore and Karachi.

British High Commissioner visits Mardan to review UK's Education and Health support

27 May 2016

The British High Commissioner to Pakistan, Thomas Drew CMG, visited Mardan where he toured two schools and a Basic Health Unit.

The schools are being supported through the UK's education sector programme in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa. The programme comprises both financial support to the Elementary and Secondary Education Department in the Government of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and a school reconstruction and rehabilitation programme carried out by an international construction firm, IMC.

The boys' Government Higher Secondary School in Mayar has been revamped by IMC to include 13 classrooms, new offices for the Principal and for administration, and a new toilet block with 11

washrooms, including one for children with disabilities.

The girls' Government Higher Secondary School in Par Hoti will have 19 new classrooms which will allow many more girls to attend school. When fully functional, the two schools will help educate more than 2,100 students, including 1,260 girls.

The High Commissioner also visited the Basic Health Unit in Sheikh Maltoon, supported by UK aid. The unit provides basic out-patient and preventive health services, including nutrition, family planning and routine immunisation for under-privileged local communities in the area. He met a community group that plays an important role in helping services to better reflect local needs. The British High Commissioner met the Provincial Minister of Education, Mr. Muhammad Atif Khan and the Provincial Health Minister, Mr. Shahram Khan Tarakai, and discussed provincial public service priorities and the UK's on-going support programmes in the education and health sectors. Talking about his second visit to Khyber Pakhtunkhwa in two weeks, the British High Commissioner Thomas Drew said:

I was delighted to visit Mardan today to see for myself how the UK is working with local schools and healthcare providers to improve education and health in the province. I was able to discuss with the Provincial Ministers for Education and Health their priorities in these areas and how we work together to maximise the impact of UK aid.

While visiting the two schools, I was able to see for myself how our support for construction work is allowing more young people to go to school and have a better learning environment; and how our support to the Government of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa is improving the quality of teaching and learning. It was a pleasure to meet children who are getting a better education thanks to UK aid, including the boys of the Higher Secondary School in Mayyar and the girls of the Higher Secondary School in Par Hoti.

I was also pleased to visit the Basic Health Unit in Mohabatabad to see how UK aid is helping to tackle the health challenges in the province by increasing access to medicines and vaccines, and care for expectant and new mothers. It was good to see how local communities are working to promote improvements in primary health services.

Members of the Royal College of Defence studies UK visiting Pakistan 27 May 2016

A delegation of students from the British Royal College of Defence Studies (RCDS), led by Maj Gen (R) Simon Porter, are visiting Pakistan this week for an overseas study tour to learn about issues of global

and regional importance, including the security situation in the region.

The international delegation includes senior military and civilian officials in the armed forces from around the world.

As part of the tour agenda, the RCDS delegation will have a series of meetings with government as well as non-government official and institutions.

They met with Pakistan's Chief of Army Staff, General Raheel Sharif, who is an alumnus of RCDS, the Chief Minister of Punjab, Mian Shahbaz Sharif, the Chairman of the Senate Standing Committee on Defence Lt Gen (R) Abdul Qayyum, President of Foreign Service Academy (FSA), Lt Gen Nazir Ahmed Butt; and the Institute for Strategic Studies, Research & Analysis in Islamabad and the National School of Public Policy (NSPP) in Lahore.

Speaking during the visit, British Maj Gen (R) Simon Porter said:

The Royal College of Defence Studies' visit to Pakistan provides our students the opportunity to examine in detail an important region of the world. It was particularly valuable to meet some of Pakistan's most important figures – including General Raheel Sharif, Shahbaz Sharif and Lt Gen (R) Abdul Qayyum.

It was particularly valuable to hear about Pakistan's counter extremism work. Pakistan's efforts to eradicate militancy and extremism are difficult and important and our thoughts are with those members of the Pakistani army who paid the ultimate sacrifice for their country.

Improved UK visa application system launches in Pakistan 26 May 2016

As part of a global rollout, 'Access UK' (previously known as the Online Application Service) has launched in Pakistan yesterday, making it easier for customers to apply for a visa to visit the UK. The UK has introduced an improved online application service for individuals wishing to apply for a visa to visit to the United Kingdom (UK).

The UK is committed to making it more convenient, quicker and easier for applicants to apply for UK visas, and the new system offers a more simple and intuitive customer experience. In response to feedback from customers around the world, 'Access UK' will provide a number of benefits for visa applicants:

The application form is shorter, with questions logically ordered based on customer feedback. The service will be available in a number of languages, including Urdu. However customers will need

to supply their answers in English.

The form is dynamic and asks relevant questions based on a customer's previous answers Customers can review, edit and download their partially completed application at any point before submission

The application fee is displayed in the appropriate currency Customers can apply, book their Visa Application Centre (VAC) appointment, and pay for the relevant service standard seamlessly.

The service is available on mobile devices, enabling application forms to be completed on smartphones or tablets

The service also offers additional convenience to customers who plan to make a separate application for a Schengen Visa. The system will partially auto-complete a Schengen application form, which is then made available to customers to download and print.

Following the success of Access UK in mainland China, UKVI is rolling out the service globally to customers applying for a Standard Visitor Visa, Visitor (Marriage & Civil Partnership), or Visitor (Permitted Paid Engagement) Visa.

Customers can now use Access UK to apply, book an appointment and pay for their application through the standard, priority or super-priority visa service (where applicable). Over 330,000 applicants have already used Access UK and feedback is really positive.

The service is offered in parallel with Visa4UK. Customers wishing to apply for visa routes not yet supported by Access UK (such as Tier 4 student visas) should continue to use Visa4UK.

New British High Commissioner says "it is great to be back" in Pakistan 26 May 2016

The British High Commissioner to Pakistan, Thomas Drew CMG, spoke to a media reception that he hosted at his residence at the British High Commission in Islamabad. Following is the full text of his speech:

Ladies and gentlemen, thank you for coming. This is not really a press conference or a big policy speech. What I really want to do is to say thank you for welcoming me to Pakistan – and to meet as many you as possible who work closely with my press team here.

I will, though, take the opportunity to say a couple of things. I have now been here three months; and I presented my credentials as High Commissioner to the President three weeks ago. It is great to be back. On a personal level, I have being enjoying being out and about rediscovering the things that I so liked about Pakistan when I served here as Political Counsellor 10 years ago.

From the freshness and beauty of the Margalla Hills to the history of Peshawar Old City, the cultural vibe of Lahore or the commercial buzz of Karachi;

To the food – which I am determined to use my time here to learn how to cook

To, finally and most importantly, seeing old friends and meeting new ones.

But on a professional level too, this is a fabulous place for a British diplomat. Most importantly, because what we do matters – for the UK and Pakistan. Secondly – and this makes things easier – because our interests are aligned: what is good for Pakistan is good for the UK and vice versa. And thirdly because working together, we can actually make a difference. I am lucky enough too to have the resources to support it. It is a mark of our commitment that the British mission to Pakistan is our second largest in the world; our bilateral development programme here is our biggest anywhere in the world; and there is huge interest and support for the country at the highest levels of our government.

My job here is to make sure I use my privileged position here to good effect – for our mutual security, for regional stability, and to help promote the economic and political development of the country in a way which enhances the prosperity and well being of both our countries. The most exciting part of my challenge is helping Pakistan unleash its potential.

And 3 months in, I am even more convinced that that potential is huge. You just need to look at the map, or at the young and growing population. It is easy to forget that Pakistan is the 6th largest country in the world. But there is also a lot to do to make the most of that potential. And that is what we would like to do. Because it is good for Pakistan. But because it is good for us too.

A final word on another important part of my job. People to people links are important to all countries. But there really is something special about those between the UK and Pakistan. It is partly about our history. But now it is also about that more than 2% of the population of the UK are of Pakistani origin. And nothing demonstrates that better than our new mayor of London. Sadiq Khan, the Muslim son of bus driver whose parents were born in Karachi, received more individual votes than any other Briton in the UK's history. But he is joined by successful sportsmen and women,

entertainers, journalist, businessmen and many more. Building further on the links that bind us will be another big part of my job.

In short, it is great to be back. Thank you.

British High Commission reaffirms commitment to the people of the Punjab

20 May 2016

The Government of Punjab and the UK Department for International Development (DFID) met to coordinate and review UK Aid's support for the people of Punjab.

The UK's Department for International Development Pakistan office, which is part of the British High Commission, met with the Planning and Development Department of the Government of Punjab on 18th May 2016 for high level discussions to review implementation of key programmes of support to the people of the Punjab in areas such as education, health, economic growth, and governance. Joanna Reid, Head of DFID Pakistan, co-chaired the session with Mohammad Jehanzeb Khan, Chairman of the Planning and Development Department, Government of the Punjab.

Both sides reviewed key programmes and priorities under the 2016-17 provincial budget and looked at ways to link UK Aid's work to the growth strategy of the provincial government. They also discussed the joint commitment to provide basic services to the people of Punjab.

Joanna Reid, Head of the Department for International Development in Pakistan, who co-chaired the meeting, said:

Pakistan is one of the UK's top development priorities. At today's meeting with the Government of Punjab, we reviewed the positive progress made in the last six months. We focused on linking DFID's plans with the Provincial Government's strategy to drive growth and provide basic services to the population. I am delighted to be able to reaffirm our commitment to continue the UK's support to the most marginalised communities and vulnerable people across the province of Punjab. Since 2011, UK Aid in Pakistan has benefited more than 6.3 million children in primary school education; provided training in new skills for 102,000 people; helped 1.54 million more people access micro-finance loans, including 965,000 women; ensured nearly a million births involved nurses, midwives or doctors; and provided over 4.1 million flood-affected individuals with humanitarian assistance.

British High Commissioner's visit to Peshawar 13 May 2016

The British High Commissioner, Thomas Drew CMG, met Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Chief Minister Pervaiz Khattak and other senior politicians during his first visit to Peshawar for 9 years, and his first as High Commissioner.

The High Commissioner and the Chief Minister discussed the provincial government's top priorities – education, health, security and tackling corruption. The Chief Minister highlighted his focus on delivering services for the poor and vulnerable in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa.

Before his visit, the High Commissioner met Governor Iqbal Zafar Jhagra to discuss the future of FATA.

During the visit the British High Commissioner also met parliamentarians and members of civil society to discuss their priorities and the challenges they faced.

Thomas Drew CMG, British High Commissioner to Pakistan, said:

It is a real pleasure for me to visit the capital of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, especially as the UK works so closely with the provincial government. The UK is directly supporting the province in areas such as health and education, which have a daily impact on the lives of the population of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa. We have also provided support to initiatives such as the Chief Minister's Delivery Unit to ensure improved delivery of the government's top priorities.

Over the past two years, the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa government has had a strong focus on improving the delivery of services in the province with tangible results. The Khyber Pakhtunkhwa government has taken welcome steps to improve accountability and transparency in the province through landmark legislation such as the Right to Information Act.

The British High Commissioner hosted a party in Lahore to celebrate Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II's 90th birthday, alongside Chief Guest, the Chief Minister of Punjab, Mian Shehbaz Sharif.

Guests from all over Punjab joined the celebrations, including representatives from the Punjab Assembly and leading members of the provinces military, civil society and business communities. 2016 marks the 64th anniversary of Her Majesty's accession to the throne, when she became both the British Sovereign and the Head of the Commonwealth.

The British High Commissioner, Thomas Drew CMG, and the Chief Guest, the Chief Minister of Punjab, Mian Shehbaz Sharif toasted HM Queen and President Mamnoon Hussain.

Speaking on the occasion of Her Majesty The Queen's birthday, the British High Commissioner to Pakistan, Thomas Drew CMG said:

A lot has changed in this part of the world since the Queen was born in 1926. A country that did not exist is now the 6th biggest in the world. And even since the Queen first visited Pakistan in 1961, Lahore has grown from a city of 1.5m people to one of over 10m. The ties between our two peoples too are unrecognizable, Britons of Pakistani origin numbered around 25,000 in 1961. They now make up over 2% of our population, and many have their roots in Punjab. The ties are different, but just as intense. We are perhaps even more interdependent.

One thing that has not changed is Lahore's unique buzz. It is a city that exudes energy, creativity and culture. What has changed, however – and I hope you will forgive my first impressions – is a sense of hope and change. Things are happening here. Things are getting done. It is good to come back to the feeling of a city, province and country that are starting to fulfil their potential.

That potential is exciting. You just need to look at the map to see it. Indeed, I gather that if Punjab were a country it would be the 11th most populous in the world.

That Pakistan does fulfil its potential is of enormous importance to the UK. The nice thing about being a British diplomat in Pakistan is that our interests really are aligned. It really is the case that what is good for Pakistan is good for the UK and vice versa. And I am not just talking about my ambition to

have the England cricket team come back to play a match here at the Gadaffi stadium.

Of course, the cynics among you will say that all of our ambassadors around the world are saying things like this on the Queen's birthday. Perhaps, but I am lucky enough to have the resources to support it. That is why we have our second biggest diplomatic mission anywhere in the world here, that is why we have our biggest bilateral development programme anywhere in the world here – a large part of which is focused on Punjab. And it is why we continue to build.

We have just opened a British Business Centre in Pakistan to help British and Pakistani companies do business with each other. It today signed a memorandum of understanding with the Lahore Chamber of Commerce and Industry. We are about to open a new British Council Library here in Lahore, as well as one in Karachi.

In short, the British Government is behind Pakistan and wants to make a difference – for Pakistan, for the UK, for Punjab and for Lahore. And it is even better that we can do it with friends like everyone here tonight.

British Business Centre in Pakistan signs Lahore agreement 26 April 2016

British Business centre signs agreement to boost trade and investment between the UK and Pakistan fulfilling promise of UK Prime Minister.

A new Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) signed today between the British Business Centre and the Lahore Chamber of Commerce and Industry (LCCI), as promised by UK Prime Minister David Cameron. The MoU will help boost bilateral trade and investment between the UK and Pakistan. The signing was witnessed by the British High Commissioner to Pakistan, Thomas Drew CMG. In Islamabad and Lahore, the team will work with local authorities to set up an Integrated Disease

Surveillance System, which means Pakistan will be able to detect, verify and respond to national and global disease threats or health alerts before they become epidemics.

The CEO of Public Health England, Duncan Selbie, visited Islamabad and Lahore this week to launch the new team and to discuss priorities with members of the Governments of Pakistan and Punjab. Following a meeting with the Duncan Selbie, the British High Commissioner to Pakistan, Thomas Drew CMG, said:

I am delighted that Public Health England has set up a team here at the British High Commission in Pakistan. Early detection, verification and response to disease threat is vital to saving lives, keeping people healthy and Public Health England has unrivalled skills and experience.

This is only possible because of the vision and commitment of the Governments of both Punjab and Pakistan and I hope that we will be able to work together to save many lives in the future.

The new Public Health England team came to Pakistan following the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding between the CEO of the Public Health England Duncan Selbie and the Chief Minister of Punjab, Shahbaz Sharif. General Carter also visited the Army Museum in Rawalpindi and presented the First World War Centenary Fund Victoria Cross Plaque, a gift from the British people, which names the First World War Victoria Cross winners from what is now Pakistan. Accompanied by General Raheel Sharif, General Sir Nick also laid a wreath at Yadgar-e-Shuhada (the Martyr's Monument) in front of a guard of honour. General Raheel Sharif hosted a dinner at GHQ for General and Lady Carter, accompanied by GHQ's senior generals and their wives, and on Wednesday the generals and their wives had a private lunch together.

Accompanied by Thomas Drew, the British High Commissioner, and Brigadier Murray Whiteside, the British Defence Adviser, General Carter also met with the Minister of Defence, Mr Khawaja Asif, Secretary of Defence Lt Gen (R) Alam Khattak; the Chairman of the Joint Chief of Staff Committee, General Rashad Mahood; and the National Security Adviser, Lt Gen (R) Naseer Khan Janjua. General Carter also addressed the National Security and War Course, Pakistan's senior military course at the National Defence University in Islamabad. He gave them a British view on the strategic context, the character of conflict and the implications for the British Army.

General Carter, at the GHQ dinner, spoke of his deep respect for the Pakistan Army's achievements in combating terrorism and paid tribute to the soldiers and officers who have lost their lives. The British and Pakistan Armies had strong historical ties and General Carter looked forward to further developing the cooperation between the Armies during his time as head of the British Army.

UK-Pakistan Enhanced Strategic Dialogue statement

20 April 2016

Joint Statement between the UK and Pakistan following the Enhanced Strategic Dialogue of 18-20 April 2016

Mr Sartaj Aziz, Adviser to the Prime Minister on Foreign Affairs, visited London on 18-20 April to take forward the UK-Pakistan Enhanced Strategic Dialogue (ESD). The dialogue is a valuable mechanism for Pakistan and the UK to reaffirm their commitment to a strong partnership to increase prosperity, development and security in both countries. This collaboration is underpinned by strong diaspora links, historical and cultural ties, and confidence in Pakistan continuing to develop as a prosperous, secure and stable friend of the UK.

Mr Aziz met Foreign Secretary Philip Hammond, Secretary of State for International Development Justine Greening, Minister of State for Trade and Investment Lord Mark Price, National Security Adviser Mark Lyall Grant and British Council Chief Executive Officer Ciaran Devane. The two sides reviewed progress made under the ESD on trade, development, culture and security. They agreed new roadmaps on trade and investment, culture and education, and security cooperation. Progress against the roadmaps would be reviewed by Ministers annually and next in 2017.

Trade and Investment

Both partners welcomed the steady increase in bilateral trade. Acknowledging the considerable potential for continued growth, both sides agreed to make further progress in meeting and exceeding the bilateral trade target of £3 billion. Highlights of the economic partnership included the opening of British Business Centres in Lahore and Karachi, annual UK-Pakistan business summits and the appointment of UK-Pakistan trade champions. To boost trade and investment, the two countries will work together to further improve the business climate, raise awareness of business opportunities, share expertise and enhance business-to-business contacts. Both sides agreed to establish a joint

Pakistan-UK Business Council comprising leading businessmen to be nominated by their respective governments.

Development

The UK bilateral development programme for Pakistan works to support the country in realising its potential and meeting the aspirations of its fast-growing population. Since 2011, UK support has helped more than 6.8 million primary school children get an education, ensured that nearly a million mothers had medical assistance during childbirth and supported 1.54 million people to establish small businesses.

Cultural and Education Cooperation

Under the cultural and education roadmap the UK and Pakistan will expand the opportunities for young British and Pakistani people to connect, collaborate and create a friendly understanding. Working with federal and provincial government partners across all of Pakistan, British Council will strengthen links and partnerships between the education systems of the two countries to support system reform and share best practice; continue to enable over 250,000 people to take UK qualifications in Pakistan each year, and train a third of a million Pakistani teachers and educators to improve the quality of teaching and use of English in the classroom by 2018. British Council will expand opportunities for collaboration in the arts, digital and research; developing partnerships between both countries to support heritage, museums and the creative industries. By 2017 100,000 young people will develop new skills through social enterprise initiatives, and 200,000 out of school young children will be supported to go to school. Ministers agreed the establishment of a new UK-Pakistan cultural forum.

Security

Faced with the common threat of terrorism, the UK and Pakistan will continue to cooperate to ensure the safety of citizens in both countries. They will work to counter extremism and learn from each other in this area. Cooperation to limit organized crime and illegal migration will also continue. Over the past year, the ESD has continued to demonstrate the depth, breadth and strength of UK-Pakistan cooperation. It has played a valuable role in framing an ongoing, wide-ranging and candid conversation between the two countries on the issues that matter most. Throughout the visit, Mr Aziz and his hosts reiterated their commitment to a long-term partnership covering all areas of common interest.

British High Commissioner says the Literature has special place in Pakistan's national psyche

The British High Commissioner to Pakistan, Thomas Drew CMG, spoke at the Islamabad Literature Festival at Lok Virsa Islamabad.

The Islamabad Literature Festival is in its fourth year, and the speakers this weekend include Quaisra Shahraz and Anatol Lieven.

British High Commissioner to Pakistan, Thomas Drew CMG, said:

The Islamabad Literature Festival – like its sister festivals in Karachi and Lahore – is a celebration of literature, of art and of culture. Literature shows the depth and variety and colour and texture that anyone visiting this country can see, but is too often invisible to those outside.

You might say that I could make comments like this at arts festivals in many countries. Perhaps. But, to an outsider at least, literature seems here to have a special place in the national psyche. Back in the UK, we are this year celebrating 400 years since the death of William Shakespeare. But we don't

have a public holiday around it; and we certainly have no literary figure playing such a prominent role in the national consciousness as Allama Iqbal.

As British High Commissioner, I should also mention the many joint British and Pakistani authors or British authors of Pakistani descent – from Tariq Ali and Mohsin Hamid to Qaisra Shahraz. Qaisra too will also be appearing at the Festival. They are making a mark in both of our countries.

Finally... I should add that this is one of those areas of my work that is as pleasurable as it is critical to our interests. Some of you will know about the British Government's education work in Pakistan: this is the biggest single element of the biggest development programme we have in any country in the world. There is no literature without literacy. But we are doing a lot more too.

This year alone we are re-opening the British Council Libraries in Lahore and Karachi – with brand new modern buildings, facilities – and books. For those who can't reach them, the British Council is also launching a Digital Library, which will offer access to over 5,000 journals, 30,000 books, films, discussions as well as a poem of the day, book of the week and film of the month. And, of course, we are delighted to support this weekend's activities.

British High Commissioner's speech at a high achievers' awards ceremony of the Roots Millennium Schools

Delivered on:

13 April 2016 (Transcript of the speech, exactly as it was delivered)

The British High Commissioner to Pakistan Thomas Drew spoke at a high achievers' awards ceremony of the Roots Millennium Schools in Islamabad. Following is the full text of his speech:
Ladies and gentlemen, can I start by thanking the Roots Millennium Schools, and in particular Faisal Mushtaq, for inviting me here as your guest. It is a great honour. When you are invited as a foreigner to a school, you really are being invited to the heart of a country. Even more so on such an important day for everyone here.

I should probably confess to two things before I speak:

First, I always find speaking to students more daunting than pretty much any other audience. I am always kept on my toes, there is a great sense of challenge, the questions are more open. Perhaps I should be grateful today that there is no Q and A.

Second is that I have always had a particular interest in schools and education. And that is not just because of the work the British Government does on education in Pakistan. By far the biggest thing

we do here is support Pakistan's education system – and that is right. But it is also because of my background. I am, on my mother's side at least, from a long line of educationalists.

You don't, however, have to be an educationalist to know that after 2 hours of ceremony, no student wants to hear an Ambassador drone on for more than a couple of minutes. So I will restrict myself to two things:

First is to congratulate you. You have all achieved fantastic things.

I remember well my own graduation ceremony and the sense of relief of getting over the months of hard work and angst. I confess that it took me a good few years to stop having dreams about exams after my university finals.

The second – and more important point – is to make the most of it. I can now speak as a diplomat. This is a country of fantastic potential. I have only been in Pakistan for 6 weeks, but this is coming back after an 8-year gap. I see how it has developed. I feel hugely more optimistic. Admittedly, I left Pakistan in 2008 – a difficult year – and a time when the outside world looked at Pakistan mostly in the context of risk.

Now, risks of course remain, but I and the British Government see also a country of hope and potential. We have the Governor of Punjab here. How many people know that if Punjab were a country, it would be the 11th largest in the world? Karachi is the world's 6th biggest city; we don't yet view it in the same way as we do Shanghai or Sao Paolo. This is a country buzzing with potential. Pakistan's main task is to realise it – and you will find the British Government right behind you. But in the end, the key to making all this happen – and realising Pakistan's potential - is you. You are Pakistan's future. You should grab it.
