

Just to remind all of you that your lodge can be opened , with



Last but certainly not least, I would like to thank all of you who participated in our Dad, Grand Dad, and Great Grand Dad program. I realize there was some confusion with the program. It was even tough to find anyone who knew the exact purpose of the program when it started! We have said for many years that we will publish the names of all who have participated. From an attendance standpoint we were only 300 over 2019, however, our toy sales increased \$14,000. However, our patrons flocked to the Event Center to purchase their tickets. Our Ticket sales increased \$8,175 over the prior year. Our net income from the 2020 Circus was \$71,081 up \$18,104 over the prior year. After all the numbers, except the Unit ad sales commissions, have been accounted for we were \$175 within our budget.

We had also planned to hand out ad sales commissions checks at a Stated Meeting. We will start working on those in the next couple of weeks. With the shut down of Bingo the last couple of months I would ask that the Units consider donating those checks back to the Temple this year to help us with the low Bingo revenue.

Planning for the 2021 Circus has barely started. Currently there are so many unknowns that it has been hard to estimate even the budget. All we can do at this point is hope and pray that this pandemic will pass before we can hold our annual Circus next February.



Hospital News Branding Update

Shriners Hospitals for Children is changing to Shriners Children's!

The video that went out via email system-wide from our organization's leadership has been well received, and has generated a lot of questions. Some additional information has been complied by MarCom to help answer some common questions that have been received so far.

When do we start using the new name?

This will be a slow transition. We will not be making any immediate changes to our existing facilities. The announcement was a "soft launch" for our internal audiences including our coworkers in our SHC locations and our fraternal membership. We will not be announcing this change publicly until the fall of 2020 (estimated). Please keep the news internal until we are ready for our public announcement. We are developing new brand standards and will be communicating much more about this change as we move forward.

What will we call the individual locations? We are working through naming conventions for each location. Our corporate leadership will present a thorough and wellvetted plan for naming conventions later this year. These will be voted upon by the Joint Boards.

Why are we changing our name?

As care models have changed, many states will not allow the use of the word "hospital" for a facility that is not one, even if it is the name of the parent corporation (the corporate name of Shriners Hospitals for Children® remains in place.) As a result, we currently have multiple brand names in the market place, leading to marketing expense and brand confusion. Five of our locations no longer use hospital in their name but now – under a renewed master brand – they can once again share the same brand as all of our other facilities. Another advantage to the new brand is that we have become far more than a system of hospitals. We have become leaders in care, research and medical education. This new brand is expansive and is an umbrella large enough to house all that we do.

What now?

Be positive, embrace the change and encourage other team members to do the same. Change can be slow and difficult for a nearly 100-year-old health care organization. To keep pace with the ever-changing health care industry and consumer marketplace, our brand must adapt. Meanwhile, Staff/Shriners should continue using the existing name and logo until the formal roll-out and new design assets are ready.

From St. Louis

The St. Louis Hospital is open and functioning! Things are really back in the swing in terms of "busy-ness" and volumes. Between our in-person and virtual visits, our patient census has risen drastically over this same time period last month. It's hard work, and everyone has really done a great job in helping it all run very smoothly!

We have not yet brought back in our volunteers or students. We are monitoring the situations closely, and are currently working with Goldfarb School of Nursing for our CRNA students, which will likely be the first back on campus. We will SLOWLY increase the number of students back dependent on the requirements put forth by the local governments and our system offices.

In the News

In June Shriners Hospitals were recognized for our achievements in the US News and World Reports rankings. Six of our locations have been recognized for their work in Pediatric Orthopedics this year. Of course, St Louis is at the top.

An update from the Claybusters

I recently had a fascinating conversation with a government trained sniper. Yep, the real deal. I will call him "George" (not his real name).

George was a Green Barret in Vietnam. As he was ending his military service he was recruited and trained, including sniper training, for clandestine operations. After a few years he left this quasi-government group (I think it was CIA related, but I did not push nor did he volunteer) and went to work for the "Bureau", aka FBI. After 5 years with the Bureau he left and returned to his former quasigovernment job.

I was shocked to hear George express great dissatisfaction with his peers at the Bureau. He said they were good moral people but lacked the ability to remain cool under pressure. He explained that in his prior quasigovernment training, the washout rate was enormous, and pressure was a nightmare. All it would take is one bad morning to send the candidate packing. George explained that this same standard did not exist with the Bureau. "Guys would melt given enough pressure. I wasn't used to that."

George said the extreme training he received in the quasigovernment job was designed to ensure that those who graduated would remain calm under pressure. He said the average person looses up to 50% of their motor skills under extreme pressure. But those that learn how to channel their energy become more focused and their motor skills increase under pressure. As the pressure ratchets up, they become calmer.

George said very few people are capable of this. After graduation they would continue to practice remaining calm under extreme pressure. "Everything slows down, your senses are on edge, you process everything, your logical decision making improves, your motor skills improve." George said continual practice was necessary to remain sharp, i.e. become calmer under pressure.

I found the entire conversation totally surreal. As I set down to write this Clay Buster article I'm reminded of George's statements about practice and how practice imprints on our minds.

This winter the Clay Busters went to The Gun Garage in North Topeka to practice at the pistol range. Our practice is not as intense as the one George described but it did imprint on our minds the keys to successful pistol shooting: Focus, Align the Sights, Touch the Trigger. Bang and repeat.

If you are a beginner or an experienced shooter, practice. Think about what you must do beforehand and develop a routine that you can repeat. Then practice it, repeatedly.

Tony Frye was asked what the most important part of successful pistol shooting is. He responded, "It is not the trigger, nor the caliber, nor the type, or brand of gun. The most important thing is the pink and gray mush between your ears. If you think you can, you can. You just need to practice."

Despite CSSA Shotgun and Pistol competitions getting cancelled for this year, the Claybusters continue to go out monthly to Ravenwood and will return this fall to The Gun Garage.

Come join the Clay Busters the first Wednesday of each month at Ravenwood and join us afterward for some food and fellowship.


We had our Christmas party with the patrol on December 7th. It was very well attended and a very good time with great drinks and great food.

Masonry is Alive, Vibrant, Passionate and Growing, (just not here)

I've had the great good fortune of being able to visit more than fifty Grand Lodge jurisdictions outside the United States. It is an eye-opening experience. It was also very positive and gives me great hope for the future of Freemasonry. I have had the fortune to sit in Lodges from Romania to Paraguay. I've been able to watch the induction of 28 new Shriners in Santa Cruz Bolivia.

The average age of the Lodge membership is at least a decade younger than the average age here in the US. Lodge Brothers are extremely passionate, vibrant, highly active, and GROWING! The members are often lawyers, doctors, engineers, policemen, pharmacists, business owners, university professors, elected officials, and other professionals. They are the "movers and shakers" in their respective communities, no matter how small, or how large the community. From a small Lodge housed in a 2,800 year old Greek shipping building on the Black Sea to ornate and huge edifices in gigantic cities like Sao Paulo Brazil. In the last five years my travels included much of Europe. I found the same thing taking place there. Younger members, passionate, vibrant, alive and growing.

So, what's going on? What are the differences. Just like I used to do when I was a salesrep covering various states, I looked for the things I could use back in my own Lodge. I'll admit I am a thief. Every time I found some good idea in a Lodge I visited back in those days, I would take it home to Sandpoint Idaho and see what we could do with it. I haven't changed much. When I observe success, I look for the reasons. I look for differences that might be a clue.

I have found some significant differences between US Masonry and Masonry practiced in Europe and South and Central America. Are the differences the reason one part of Masonry is on fire and growing, and another part is struggling? That's impossible to prove one way or another, of course. Over the years I've heard the comment frequently. "Well it's the 'culture', those countries are where we were in the 50's and 60's". That sounded reasonable, but it was clearly not the case. Masonry in the USA grew rapidly in the 50's and 60's because service men came home from WWII and Korea in search of a replacement for the Brotherhood they had overseas. All these countries where Masonry is alive and well and growing, did not have the benefit of such an experience. Cell phones are everywhere, shopping malls are everywhere, and you've never experienced a truly rabid sports fan until you watch soccer fans in Brazil or Serbia.

I do think there is significant merit in some of these

differences that we ought to look at. Over the past 15 years I've had the good luck to visit other Grand Lodge jurisdictions. I've observed some very significant differences. In no particular order, here are the major things I've observed.

The Differences:

It's a family affair.

At least once or twice a month the entire family goes to Lodge. Women and kids of all ages. The men run upstairs for no more than 20 minutes leaving the wives free to gossip and the children free to roam around and have a great time playing with other kids. Dinner is always catered, and it is a very fine meal. Wives don't cook, they don't clean up, they simply enjoy themselves on an evening out where they can dress up and enjoy a fun social evening. Beer and wine are always served with the meals. The kids grow up in Lodge, it's a comfortable familiar place to them. It's where they expect to go when they come of age. If you think the wives are going to let their husbands slack off at Lodge and miss a night out, you must be single.

Visit In fact, in some jurisdictions if you ask you may be placed on a blacklist and never gain admission. The Lodge members guard the door with fervency and zeal, but they actively seek out

new members. They look for professionals who can add something to the Lodge. Process varies significantly from Hungary to Paraguay, but they actively seek new members. In some jurisdictions the tradition is that all first-time applicants are blackballed on their first application. They are very selective who they admit, but they are constantly seeking new members that meet their standards.

GM's serve much longer terms.

Usually 3-4 years and often are re-elected for another term. Being GM is a full-time job and they are well compensated. It is not unusual for a GM to serve 8-10 years.

Dues.

The cheapest dues I have found are in a tiny town in Northwestern Paraguay. Dues are roughly the equivalent of \$70 US per month. Average dues around the world are in the \$150 -\$200 range per month. Of course, this covers the twice a month Family Dinner events very easily. In Italy you must submit your federal tax forms each year and your dues are based on your annual income. The highest dues I have found is a small town in southern Brazil. Monthly dues there are roughly equivalent to \$450 US. With this money the Lodge operates a private school for kids who have the smarts, but don't have the finances, to

attend private schools. Most of the male teachers belong to the Lodge. There is a special dues rate for professors and teachers, who's profession brings "further light" to the community and to the Lodge.

Nobody memorizes the work.

The WM, SW, and JW have an open book with the Lodge ritual for opening and closing Lodge. Only some select pieces of degrees are memorized where the Deacons are moving candidates around the Lodge and holding a 3-ring binder wouldn't work.

Candidates don't progress by memorization.

Candidates don't progress to the next degree by memorizing the catechism of the preceding degree. Instead candidates are required to write one or more thesis about the lessons they learned in the preceding degree and how they will implement those lessons in their daily lives. The thesis is defended in open Lodge. Masonic education on steroids! A considerable debate and discussion about the lessons learned takes place during the defense of the thesis.

Of course, there are lots of other minor differences. Subtle differences and ones not so subtle. The seven major differences I've listed above are the dominant differences that are nearly universally found outside the United States.

Could we implement some or part of these differences? Would it make any difference yo our members? Personally, I would consign 2B1ASK1 to the trash heap of failed ideas. I think the twice a month Family Night would make a huge difference in attendance and activity. Even doing this once a month would be significant. It would be a great time to bring a prospective member and allow their family to experience a small bit of Freemasonry.

Clearly what we're doing now is not working well. Membership continues to fall; activity levels continue to fall. We aren't truly teaching and bringing much "further light" to our members. Maybe it's time to think about our future and learn from our Brothers who are so successful.
