The Feast of the Transfiguration of the Lord became wide-spread in the West in the 11th century and was introduced into the Roman calendar in 1457 to commemorate the victory over Islam in Belgrade. Before that, the Transfiguration of the Lord was celebrated in the Syrian, Byzantine, and Coptic rites. The Transfiguration foretells the glory of the Lord as God, and His Ascension into heaven. It anticipates the glory of heaven, where we shall see God face to face. Through grace, we already share in the divine promise of eternal life.

In 2023, the Feast of the Transfiguration falls on a Sunday. According to the Order of Precedence in the General Norms for the Liturgical Year and the Calendar, Feasts of Our Lord take precedence over the Sundays of Ordinary Time, so feasts such as the Transfiguration, Exaltation o the Cross (September 14) and the Presentation of the Lord (February 2) are celebrated when they fall on Sunday.

From the Catechism of the Catholic Church, #554:

From the day Peter confessed that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of the living God, the Master "began to show his disciples that he must go to Jerusalem and suffer many things. . . and be killed, and on the third day be raised." Peter scorns this prediction, nor do the others understand it any better than he. In this context the mysterious episode of Jesus' Transfiguration takes place on a high mountain, before three witnesses chosen by himself: Peter, James and John. Jesus' face and clothes become dazzling with light, and Moses and Elijah appear, speaking "of his departure, which he was to accomplish at Jerusalem". A cloud covers him and a voice from heaven says: "This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!"

Our divine Redeemer, being in Galilee about a year before His sacred Passion, took with him St. Peter and the two sons of Zebedee, Sts. James and John, and led them to a retired mountain.

CLERGY COLUMN

Brothers and sisters,

I mentioned in July that I would use this column on the first Sunday of each month to talk about the devotion for each month that the Church has prescribed. Last month was the Precious Blood of Christ, a very lovely devotion. This month we turn to Mary as we honor the Immaculate Heart of Mary. This will be something of a theme throughout the year - five months have devotions related to Mary, including August, September, and October. There also seems to be a little bit of confusion about the month of August: a couple of websites I checked listed the Blessed Sacrament as the devotion for this month. Most places listed the Immaculate Heart, so I'll write about that.

I'm guessing the reason for the Marian devotion in August is due to a couple of Marian feast days this month. The first one is a big one: The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary on August 15th, which is a Holy Day of Obligation for us. This is a great Solemnity which is meant to provide us with hopeful expectation: Mary is taken into Heaven, body and soul, showing us our final destination and leading the way. One week later is the Memorial of the Queenship of Mary on August 22nd, which reminds us of the important role of the Queen Mother in the Kingdom of Heaven. Jesus is our King and Mary is the Queen Mother, having a particular influence over him that we don't share.

These two feast days show us that Mary's heart is so pure that it needs no purification after death, that her will is always lined up with the will of God. Her heart is immaculate, preserved from all stain of sin. We'll talk more about this when we discuss the Immaculate Conception in December, but this is a heart of holiness that is worthy of our honor. We don't worship Mary, as some Protestants accuse us of doing, but we do show her the highest honor we can show to someone who is merely human.

How can we honor the Immaculate Heart of Mary? Above all, we can ask her to pray for us. Beyond that, we can do our best to imitate her best qualities by striving to avoid sin and reflecting on the Word of God. It could be good to spend some extra time at some point this month reading and meditating on the first couple of chapters from both the Gospels of Matthew and Luke, which speak most about the Infancy of Jesus and Mary's role in it. Slowly read through the stories and try to imagine what it must have been like to be Mary and to find out her role in the salvation of the world. Imagine what it would have been like for her to hold her newborn child in her arms, knowing that her child is the Savior of the world. These kinds of meditations can lead to some very lovely moments in prayer. I'll write more about the rosary in October, but praying the rosary is a great way to spend time with Mary and reflect with her on the life of her Son Jesus.

Immaculate Heart of Mary, pray for us! May the Lord give you his peace! Fr. Bryan

Tradition assures us that this was Mount Thabor, which is exceedingly high and beautiful, and was anciently covered with green trees and shrubs, and was very fruitful. It rises something like a sugar-loaf, in a vast plain in the middle of Galilee. This was the place in which the Man-God appeared in His glory.

Whilst Jesus prayed, he suffered that glory which was always due to his sacred humility, and of which, for our sake, He deprived it, to diffuse a ray over His whole body. His face was altered and shone as the sun, and his garments became white as snow. Moses and Elias were seen by the three apostles in his company on this occasion, and were heard discoursing with him of the death which he was to suffer in Jerusalem.

The three apostles were wonderfully delighted with this glorious vision, and St. Peter cried out to Christ, "Lord, it is good for us to be here. Let us make three tents: one for thee, one for Moses, and one for Elias" Whilst St. Peter was speaking, there came, on a sudden, a bright shining cloud from heaven, an emblem of the presence of God's majesty, and from out of this cloud was heard a voice which said, "This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased; hear ye him" The apostles that were present, upon hearing this voice, were seized with a sudden fear, and fell upon the ground; but Jesus, going to them, touched them, and bade them to rise. They immediately did so, and saw no one but Jesus standing in his ordinary state.

This vision happened in the night. As they went down the mountain early the next morning, Jesus bade them not to tell any one what they had seen till he should be risen from the dead.

In the Transfiguration Christ enjoyed for a short while that glorified state which was to be permanently His after His Resurrection on Easter Sunday. The splendor of His inward Divinity and of the Beatific Vision of His soul overflowed on His body, and permeated His garments so that Christ stood before Peter, James, and John in a snow-white brightness. The purpose of the Transfiguration was to encourage and strengthen the Apostles who were depressed by their Master's prediction of His own Passion and Death. The Apostles were made to understand that His redeeming work has two phases: The Cross, and glory—that we shall be glorified with Him only if we first suffer with Him. —Rt. Rev. Msgr. Rudolph G.
