

Blessings to you in the name of the Risen Lord!

In this season when we celebrate that resurrection follows death, it's a good time to look at those things in our lives and in the life of our congregation that need to die in order for new life to be resurrected. That has been one of the things that your VCI team has been exploring. In March the "Away Team" met in Capac to discuss the book Renovate or Die by Bob Farr with Kay Kotan. Unfortunately, the March "Home Team" meeting was only attended by one person.

The "Home Team" is open to everyone in the congregation. If we hope to be a vital and transforming presence for God's Kingdom, we need a critical mass of people who are interested and invested in the success of Richmond First UMC. Please, if you are at all interested in learning how to prepare the Richmond First United Methodist Church to be vital into the future, make time to come to the next meeting of the "Home Team" on May 22 at 7PM. We will be discussing the book Worship Ways by Thomas Bandy. A copy is available on the book shelves in the back of the sanctuary.

In his book, Renovate or Die, Bob Farr writes about ten ways to renovate the church.

- "A church must also be pastor-led rather than pastor-centered. "Pastor-centered" means a pastor is hired to *care for* the congregation, *entertain* the congregation, and *do ministry* for the congregation. ... In a pastor-led church, a pastor's first responsibility is to lead, then equip, and then serve" Bob Farr
- A church must understand their present reality. They must thoroughly research the community so that they know the needs and preferences of those people whom they are seeking to enter into relationship with. A church must know where they are in the church life cycle.
- A church must get the basics of radical hospitality, passionate worship, intentional faith development, risk-taking mission and service, and extravagant generosity right. If you are interested in better understanding these basics, see the book <u>Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations</u> There is a copy in the bookshelves at the back of the sanctuary.
- A church must be seeking to catch momentum rather than focused on keeping things the same. If something new or exciting occurs, build on it, don't leave it standing alone as pillar.
- Worship must be experiential with life-application preaching. The people in the pews need to be engaging in the acts of worship, rather than observing. Sermons need to be more about how the Gospel is relevant and applicable to life than about teaching.
- A church needs to think strategies, not programs. For example: when a church decides, it would like to draw new people to their worship experience, they may need to decide on a new worship time, a new ministry or a new worship style. Rather than ask the people who already come to the current time, ministry or style, the church should get the input of those outside the church doors for whom the current time, ministries or style are not working.

- A church should be staffed for leadership. Your current church staff, paid and unpaid, should be serving based on their Spiritual giftedness rather than on the needs of the church. For more information on this see the book <u>Leadership and Organization for Fruitful Congregations</u> by Stephen Ross.
- A church should develop disciples with clear and intentional steps. There should be a team of people committed to helping move people from visitors to members to fully devoted disciples of Jesus Christ.
- A church needs to network, network, network and then market. Is the church full of fishers of men or keepers of the aquarium? A church should be ready to welcome guests every day. The congregation should be inviting guests to every worship experience, event and ministry.
- The structure of the church should be simplified. Leaders should spend more time doing ministry than sitting in meetings. The church board is not the place where new ministries are born or permission is given. It is the place where vision is cast and where culture, discipleship and faithfulness are modeled.

These are some pretty lofty goals. But at Richmond First UMC, we have been experiencing decline for several years. Therefore, the obvious conclusion is that what has worked in the past, is no longer working. We must now decide whether we want to keep doing what we have done in the past because "it was good enough for us" or because it is what we are comfortable with; or are we willing to renovate.

Achieving a renovation of the church requires a high level of commitment from a critical mass of people. Are you willing to commit to one of these areas outlined above? Are you willing to actively seek out information, recruit people to a team, and work to bring forth the Kingdom of God? Are you ready to lead for the future? I hope that each of you have been in prayer for the vitality of this congregation. I hope that you will prayerfully consider what your role is in this process. And I hope to hear from you and work with you in discovering your spiritual gifts and empowering you to transform the church and the world.

Dear members and friends of Richmond First UMC,

You, the congregation, own a small home adjacent to the church on Churchill Street. Since you purchased it, more than a decade ago, you have leased it as a residence to various community members. It became vacant in February of this year. You now have an opportunity to decide if that is still the best way to use this asset to build the kingdom of God or whether you would prefer to sell it or use it for the ministries of the church.

We have had several meetings where the options have been discussed. On this past Sunday, April 23, presentations were made that laid out the costs and benefits of each option. This is a synopsis:

Sale: Suggested market value: \$95,000 to \$105,000. Improvements necessary to sell: Flooring installed (\$3,502), Electrical upgrades (\$2,300), Paint (\$540 - labor \$2,025), Flashing replacement (\$400). Money would be invested in an endowment for future needs. If this body chooses this option, it would need to be passed by a vote of the charge conference before it could be acted upon. Advantage: The revenue would continue to be an appreciating asset.

Rental: The same improvements as sale would be necessary. In addition there would back door and storm door replacement (approx. \$500). Estimated annual net income \$6497 - \$7037 if rented at full market value. There was discussion of renting it to people in need at a reduced rent (i.e. transitional housing for homeless or domestic violence survivors) Advantage: The rent would be a source of income if congregational expenses exceed income.

Ministry: The same improvements as rental would be necessary plus we would need to make bathroom handicap accessible (\$12,000) and add a ramp (\$4000). Community usage of building could include (small amount of potential rental income): AA/NA, student tutoring, scout troops, youth activities, English as second language classes. Church usage could include: Sunday school, adult small groups, backpack ministry, UMW, UMM. Advantage: The building would be an "opening to the outside community. . . A less threatening introduction to church"

If you would like more information about these options please contact: Glenn Quick, Susan Foster, David Foster, Kim Grose, Tristan Grose, Mark Hubanks, Jean Breederland, Sue Nieman, Pat Gibbs, or Carl Merecki. They each worked on one of the fact-finding teams.

A decision will be made at a meeting immediately following worship on May 7. All people with a vest-ed interest in this congregation are welcome to attend. The manner by which this decision will be made is being determined by an ad hoc committee of members and constituents.

I hope that all members and constituents will prayerfully consider how best to use this opportunity to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. After all, that's why we are all here, that is the mission of the church.
