MAKING A POSITIVE CONTRIBUTION

(2 Kings 4: 42-44; Ps. 145: 10-11, 15-18; Eph. 4:1-6; John 6: 1-15)

Last week Friday, we all woke up to the horrific news of a gunman who mowed down twelve lives and injured 58 others in a movie theater in Aurora, Colorado. It has been a difficult week for the families who lost their loved ones and for the victims who were injured in that heinous attack. The people of Colorado and the nation at large are still in shock, and many are questioning as to what could drive a twenty-four year old man to carrying out such a bestial act. As a community of faith, our hearts go out to all the victims of that single cowardly attack. We pray that Christ, the author of life, will grant eternal rest to all those who lost their lives in the attack; and bring healing in body and mind to those who were injured.

Now as the politicians continue their debate on the 2nd amendment and gun control, you and I should live above the fray and genuinely consider the sacredness of human life and its value in a society like ours. Our own debate must center on the values we must instill into our children. When we hear of parents who at midnight went to see a PG 13 rated movie with a four month old and a four-year-old; we have to ask, "What were they thinking?" We are grateful to God that those children were not harmed and are still alive. We feel sorry for the six year old whose life was ended by the gunman. We pray that her innocent soul may rest in God's peace. As adults, it is time we set our priorities, and start instilling in our children the values that will benefit them and society. At midnight, under normal circumstances, those children should have been tucked into bed, and kept warm by the love of a parent and the security of a home.

As for the killer, no one yet knows the motive for his bastardy action, but we can only suggest that our society is in great need of redemption. We live in a world where our young people are bombarded with pseudo super heroes. For many of our young people life has become a drama, not an art. The culture of violence is eating deep into the moral fabric of our society - young people and, unfortunately, some adults often want to act out what they experienced in video games, TV and/or movie screens. Some cannot differentiate between what is real and what is staged. As a community - parents, priests, teachers, relatives, friends, neighbors, et cetera - you and I have a responsible to invest our talents, time and treasure in building a society that will benefit the present and the future generations - a society rich in traditional and Christian moral values.

The challenges we face today can be overwhelming and at best, intimidating. The temptation might be to give up trying and raise the white flag. The disciples of Elisha and Jesus felt the same way: "How can I set this before a hundred people." Or "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves...but what good are these for so many?" We should never underestimate the power that we can unleash upon the earth when we put our faith in Christ and rely on Him to "multiply" our "small" contribution to save the multitude from being slaughtered by the enemy of good. Christians must harness all resources in an effort to build a society that would benefit all. Just as the man from Baalshalishah in the 1st reading and the boy in the gospel donated barley loaves to the men of God to enable them feed the multitudes, you and I must donate our talents, time and treasure, so that through our involvements our society would be rid of a culture/value that promotes violence. Every Christian must live in a manner worthy of the call they have received: "With all humility and gentleness, patience, bearing
