A Message From Fr. Brian Johnson

Dear St Pius And St Anthony Churches,

May 16, 2021

Happy Ascension Sunday! I am sure it is evident that with Sunday Mass I always focus on the gospel when reviewing the Sunday readings. Why? The red letters of Jesus-I say 'Red Letters' of Jesus because it used to be popular to print bibles with the actual words from Jesus' lips being printed in red for special focus (so called Red Letter bibles). The Red ink does draw our eyes to them better. I liken such a red hotline to the old Red Bat-Phone that directly connected Police Commissioner Gordon to Batman-A Dedicated & Direct Line!) So, I always start any meditation by actually reading the words of the gospel, those 'very words of Jesus'. Now, I must also state that "Yes, every bit of holy scripture is the inspired and inerrant Word of God". God speaks directly Himself, yet He also speaks equally through His chosen messengers -mouthpieces. But, I always begin any commentary by hearing from Jesus Himself in the gospels. I let Jesus' own words be the lens through which I interpret all the rest of God's communication to us through His inspired authors-prophets. So, for this Sunday of Christ's Ascension we hear the fullest story of the Ascension uniquely from the first reading which is not a gospel but the Acts of the Apostles. Mark's gospel does mention the Ascension, but gives only the scantiest detail that after blessing the disciples for mission, that "then the Lord Jesus was taken up into heaven and took his seat at the right hand of God" (Mark 16:19). Mark only gives a bare bones description like a 'Just the facts, mam' version of the story. Simply, Mark says, "Jesus gathered & commissioned His disciples to go out ministering in His Name. Then He rose away to the Father's heavenly right hand!" However, Luke in Acts of the Apostles helps us see a fuller picture of the natural questions and reactions of the disciples to one more "out of this world' experience with Jesus. As if they haven't learned not to ask such questions trying to predict the future, the apostles ask Jesus one more time, 'Jesus what is next?'

Of course, Jesus says, "It is not for you to know the times or seasons that the Father has established.." Acts 1:7. This is not new. Several times Jesus had indicated to the apostles that Faith operated on a 'need to know' basis when it came to the Father's will. Once asked about the end of the world, Jesus said ""But of that day and hour no one knows" (Matt 24"36, Mk 13:32), and when Peter asked about the personal destiny of the Beloved Disciple, Jesus said "What concern is it of yours? Follow me" (John 21:22). Jesus did not wish us to be swept away with too lofty a matters or to meddle in others' business when He emphasized in Luke 21:14-15 about having to give testimony of oneself, saying, "you are not to prepare your defense beforehand, for I myself shall give you a wisdom.....". This is the gift of the Spirit that Jesus spoke about at the Last Supper who will come to us 'as needed' and "lead us into all truth" (John 16:13).

So, what were the apostles to do after Jesus ascended? He advised them to return to Jerusalem and remain 'waiting for the 'Spirit-the promise of the Father' (Acts 1:4). What do they do? I believe they were faithful to Jesus' command that he once gave in the Garden of Gethsemane "Remain here and keep watch." Mark 14:34) They didn't listen to Jesus back then (remember they all fell asleep), but they do this time and they basically conduct the first novena (nine days of dedicated prayer for a single purpose- to receive the Holy Spirit). How or what did they pray? I think during their nine day retreat together, they all did what the two disciples did on the road to Emmaus, "conversing (debating among themselves) about all the things that had occurred" (Luke 24:14). They shared with each other about their mutual experiences with Jesus and prayed for the openness to continue on enacting His mission. And the Holy Spirit appears and motivates them to do just that! But that will be nest week's Feast of Pentecost! What can we do? Follow their example and spend the next nine days (okay, seven now!) offering a Novena to the Holy Spirit. We want to receive the Spirit fresh and so with our seven days we can spend a little time each day praying for one of the Spirit's gifts (One-a-Day Wisdom, Knowledge, Understanding, Counsel, Piety, Fortitude and Fear of the Lord!). We can 'Remain, watch and pray' until the Holy Spirit comes! Peace, Fr Brian

Another Saint in Time of Plague: Blessed Jan Beyzym (born 5-15- 1850 died 10-2- 1912)

Jan (John) Beyzym was born within the Russian Empire, at Bevzymy Wielkie, what is now called Ukraine, on May 15, 1850. He was the first child of five to be born to his parents Jan and Olga. In 1863, there was a political uprising and his father fought alongside others against Russian tyranny. His father was tried in absentia by the government when the uprising was put down and fled, causing the family to separate. The family also lost its home, so Jan Jr, and his siblings moved with their mother to Kiev. He studied in Kiev finishing secondary school and entering university from 1864-1871. After completing his education, he pursued religious studies applying for candidacy to diocesan priesthood. After much discernment, he opted for the Jesuits and joined their novitiate in 1872. During his two year novitiate period, an epidemic of cholera broke out in Stara Wies and he convinced his superior to allow him to serve the sick languishing in the streets. He felt fully alive serving the sick poor. Following the epidemic, he finished his Jesuit formation and was ordained a priest July 26, 1881 in Krakow by Bishop Albin Dunajewski. During his first years as a Jesuit, Bl Jan served in education teaching the young students French and Russian languages in Jesuit Colleges at Tarnopol and Chyrów. He taught for 17 years and oversaw the school infirmary. However, he felt a pull in his heart to serve God in the missions, specifically among those most sick and despairing of health. Jan volunteered to his superiors that he wanted to serve leper missions. An opportunity arose when he was asked to move to Madagascar and help the ignored colonies of lepers there. At 48 years old, (1898), he was eager to go serve the lepers.

Jan went to Madagascar to a sanitarium near Antananarivo, where 150 lepers lived almost in complete abandonment in the desert avoided by everyone. The lepers were barely alive, using crumbling shacks as homes with no floors, furniture or windows. They had received no treatment or medicine, and almost no interaction with anyone (too weak to even walk around). They often died of hunger rather than their disease. In 1899, he wrote back to his Jesuit province that he often cried at night for his patients' misery and helplessness, but he threw himself even more into caring for the lepers. He wanted lepers to know their God-given dignity and God's love for them.

He wrote to everyone he knew and all possible benefactors to help in any way with donations or supplies to build better accommodations for the lepers. He discovered that with better nutrition and hygiene, the rate of death and serious weakness was dramatically lower. He especially worked among the young to ensure their proper diets and enough vitamins for their strength. He increased their daily caloric intake and improved the whole morale of the community by the children's activity and involvement around the village. Within just a few years, Jan decreased the average number of burials in the leper colony from 5-7 a week to only five a year.

Blessed Jan was guided daily by Jesus' command, 'What you do for the least of my brothers or sisters, you do for me.' His ministry did not come easy, and he suffered often in his time with the lepers. He often fainted at the strong stench of decaying flesh on his patients. He wrote to friends to send flowers or flower seeds, the more fragrant the better, to help cover the odor of the leper camps.

He always wanted to build a leper hospital and God opened a door for his efforts in 1902 when he moved to Marana near Fianarantsoa, due to its location near a fresh water supply and better landscape for agriculture. To build such a hospital in so poor a country was a miraculous undertaking that required his tireless efforts asking for donations. He placed the project under the protection of Our Lady of Czestochowa, and began soliciting funds from Catholic missionary organizations and in Catholic magazines in Poland. The hospital opened Aug. 16, 1916, staffed by Sisters of St. Joseph of Cluny. Many leper friends from back at Ambahivuraka surprised Blessed Jan when they arrived walking to the new hospital from 180 miles away to express their love of their pastor.. Blessed Jan died at Marana on Oct. 2, 1912. Blessed Jan was an inspirational and dear soul to Pope John Paul II during his papacy. He is a great intercessor for the lonely sick, and a source of comfort for those suffering COVID out of view and feeling alone. Blessed Jan Beyzym, pray for us!
