It seems that when the Amana Bulletin was first published Dr. H.G. Moershel wrote a one page letter to the community members saying that periodically a notification of what was happening in the colonies would be submitted to the residents about important matters.

What was a one page "letter" would turn into a six page/2 fold sheet of paper that would come out weekly on Fridays.

Different towns had people who would act as the gatherers of the news by having people report to them via the local "grape vine" or eventually the phone.

The remaining correspondents were Mary Ann Haas Fels in Amana and Richard Seifert who would be replaced by Marie Stuck Selzer - the last of the "reporters."

A note was recently received from Madeline R. Bendorf telling how she and Mary Seifert Wendler would pick up the "Bulletin" each and every week and deliver them to every home in the Amanas. Upon completion they would report back to the Secretary of the Amana Society, Mr. Stuck who would, with great solemnity open the middle drawer of his desk and reward those hard working girls with two shiny dimes which he kept in a roll

Madeline did not report if she and Mary saved this money or went next door to the general store to buy some candy or perhaps a soda.

The "Bulletin" has remained although the reports have changed. Instead of the oversized large sheet, the paper has decreased to a more reasonable size, much to the relief of the librarians who file these "tomes" into the archives.

We now know who had the first dandelion salad in the colonies, what happened to Bismarck the fabled bull that graced two farm village farms, what families went on vacations and where they went, out of town visitors, birthday parties, even the colors and songs sung at some of the weddings, who the "Personalities" where, who broke an arm, or when a baby was born.

Truly the "life" of the community was recorded for decades for all to celebrate or mourn. Amana was a true community that was held together with the words of this simple "Bulletin" that was (and is) free to the residents.

TIPS... CARING FOR RHUBARB (abridged) April 23, 2021, Ajay Nair, Patrick O'Malley, I.S.U

Rhubarb has long been a popular crop to grow in the home garden. In this week's Yard and Garden entry, Iowa State University Extension and Outreach horticulture specialists Ajay Nair and Patrick O'Malley give answers and advice on some frequently asked questions about rhubarb.

My rhubarb plants are blooming. What should I do?

The flower stalks should be promptly pulled and discarded. Plant vigor and next year's production will be reduced if the plants are allowed to flower and set seed.

Flower formation may have been induced by stressful growing conditions, such as drought, extreme heat or infertile soils. Age also may be a factor. Flower formation can be discouraged by following good cultural practices. Sprinkle onehalf cup of an all-purpose garden fertilizer, such as 10-10-10, around each plant in early spring. Stop harvesting rhubarb in mid-June. Water rhubarb plants once a week during prolonged dry periods. Dig and divide large, old rhubarb plants in early spring or late summer.

When can I transplant or divide rhubarb?

Early spring is an excellent time to transplant rhubarb. As soon as the ground is workable, carefully dig up the plants before growth begins. Dig deeply to insure getting a large portion of each plant's root system. Divide large clumps with a sharp spade or butcher knife. Each section should have at least two or three buds and a portion of the root system.

Replant the rhubarb as soon as possible. The roots must not be allowed to dry out prior to planting. If the rhubarb can't be planted immediately, place the clumps in a plastic bag and store them in a cool, dark location. This temporary storage should be fine for a few days.

When planting rhubarb, place each section upright in the planting hole with the buds 1 to 2 inches below the soil surface. Space the plants about 3 feet apart. After planting, water thoroughly. Continue to water the plants throughout the first growing season. During dry weather, a deep soaking every seven to 10 days should be adequate.

Rhubarb also can be transplanted in early fall (mid-September to early October). Mulch fall planted rhubarb with several inches of straw in mid-November.

When can I start harvesting newly planted rhubarb?

It's best to wait two years before harvesting any stalks. The two-year period allows the plants to become strong and productive.

Rhubarb can be harvested over a four-week period in the third year. In the fourth and succeeding years, stalks can be harvested for eight to 10 weeks.

The South Dump, is **private property** and **only** for the use of **Amana Society stock holders living within the Amana Colonies**, and may be under 24 hour photo surveillance.

Absolutely No burning is permitted. Only organic compostable yard refuse is allowed, and users must empty & remove plastic bags or other containers used to transfer yard waste. Lumber, and other building material, & trash dumping is absolutely NOT permitted.

If you witness violations of these rules, *please* report those abuses, to Amana Society Conservation at 319-213-3445.
