

Bylaws of the Apostolic Faith Bible College, Inc.

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Doctrine

It is recognized that the true church of Jesus Christ consists of all believers in the saving grace of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ who have accepted him as their personal Saviour. It is recognized and agreed that no organization or man has been granted authority by the Lord to exclude from or accept anyone into the Kingdom of Heaven, as this is done by Jesus Christ only. It is further recognized and agreed that we as Christians are to love all members of the Body of Christ (Christians), and this love and fellowship derives from the unity instilled by the Holy Spirit. Although differences in doctrinal beliefs and interpretations should not influence our love for one another, adherence to similar doctrinal beliefs and modes of worship have bonded together those of the Apostolic Faith Movement as founded by Charles F. Parham in the early 1900's. The scripture teaches us to adhere to the truth and proper doctrine. The common doctrinal beliefs are essentially as follows:

Triune God; Father, Son and Holy Spirit

Creation and Formation

Man is basically sinful and in need of Salvation

Salvation by Grace upon repentance toward God and acceptance of Jesus Christ as one's personal Saviour, which is the conception of Spiritual Life.

Sanctification of the Spirit, Soul and Body. A second definite work of Grace by the Lord Jesus Christ.

Baptism of the Holy Spirit; evidenced by speaking in other languages.

Water Baptism (of all believers) by immersion in water in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

Washing of Feet.

Divine Healing through Jesus Christ for all believers.

Do not condone divorce and remarriage. Matthew 19:8-9.

Destruction of the Wicked. Conditional Immortality.

listed basic doctrines.

Rapture of the Man Child Class.

Return of Jesus Christ to earth again; bodily and visibly. A Ministry supported by tithes and offerings.

These basic doctrines shall be adhered to in the teaching of the Apostolic Faith Bible College, which in addition to other doctrinal teaching approved by the Board from time to time if they are not inconsistent with the above



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The Church's Marching Song

ONWARD, Christian soldiers, marching as to war," sang the school children of Horbury Bridge, England, as they marched the mile to St. Peter's Church on the hill. The song they sang that day had never been heard before, but it has become one of the most familiar marching songs in the English language. Millions have marched to its martial strains, and it has been used as the theme song of countless conventions and crusades.

The author of the hymn was a young minister, Sabrine Baring-Gould, curate of St. Peter's at Horbury, who was in charge of the mission at Horbury Bridge near by. Every year at Whitsuntide, the children of the church held a procession, a service, and a festival. In 1865, it was arranged that the children of the mission should join them. Years later, Baring-Gould gave this account: "I wanted the children to sing while marching from one village to the other, but I couldn't think of anything suitable, so I sat up at night resolved to write something myself. 'Onward, Christian Soldiers' was the result. It was written in great haste. Certainly nothing has surprised me more than its popularity."

The hymn did become popular, but much of its popularity must be credited to the martial music composed for it six years later by Sir Arthur Sullivan, the eminent English musician. Sullivan also expressed surprise at its popularity, for he felt that his tune was "too brassy."

As a boy, Sabrine Baring-Gould had wanted to be a soldier, but it was as a soldier of the cross that he fulfilled his mission in life. Born into a prominent family at Exeter in 1834, he graduated from Cambridge University. After a few years of teaching, he felt led to offer himself for the ministry. His first charge was at Horbury. Along the Calder River in the valley below lay Horbury Bridge, a community of cloth mills surrounded by cottages and hovels, whose people were neglected spiritually. Here the young minister rented quarters and launched his missionary work. A room on the first floor was used for a night school, while a small room above served as a chapel for the congregation, which soon overflowed onto the stairs and filled the space below. Relief came presently, when a substantial chapel of stone was opened.

Two years later, Baring-Gould was appointed by William Gladstone, prime minister of England, to another parish, but not until a romance had developed. During one of the frequent floods of the Calder, he had saved a mill girl named Grace Taylor from drowning. Grace also attended his night school and the Sunday chapel services.

Baring-Gould was a desirable suitor. He had position, education and moderate wealth. Grace had none of these. Yet, beyond her natural beauty, he saw in her the qualities which he greatly admired, regarding her truth, trust, simplicity, and courage as precious jewels, without which the settings of fortune, position, talent, and education are worse than nothing. He sent her away to be educated and, in 1868, married her. She proved to be a worthy companion, wife, mother, and lady of the parsonage.

In the drawing room of the beautiful Elizabethan - style manor house at Lew Trenchard, where the Baring-Goulds spent many happy years, there was a portrait of Grace as a mill girl, wearing a shawl about her head and the plain dark dress of her working days. Shortly before his death in 1924, at the age of ninety, the aged minister confided to a friend that this was the picture that he loved best of all. And after Grace's death in 1916, her devoted husband had inscribed on her tomb (in Latin) Half of My Soul.

After his pioneer work at Horbury Bridge, Baring-Gould served several other charges. Then, when he inherited the ancestral home at Lew Trenchard, which had been a family possession for almost three hundred years, he also became the pastor of the parish church, having the spiritual oversight of a flock of some three hundred persons.

A talented and prolific writer, he wrote eightyfive books on theology, history, travel, and many other subjects, as well as one novel a year on a religious theme - more titles than any other writer of his time. And back in the Horbury days he had also written the lovely children's hymn, "Now the Day Is Over," and the exquisite Easter hymn, "On the Resurrection Morning," by Ingemann, "Through the Night of Doubt and Sorrow," from Danish into English.

In explanation of his accomplishments, he said, "The secret is simply that I stick to a task when I begin." He never waited for "inspiration," but often did his best when he felt least inclined to work. However, despite his tremendous literary output, it is certain that he will be best remembered as the author of "Onward, Christian Soldiers."

No Man . . .

.. Is An Island

There is a poem that starts with this line. Drop a pebble in the water: just a splash and it is gone, but there's a hundred little ripples circling on and on. Another verse speaks Drop an unkind word, or careless: in a minute it is gone; But there's little waves a-flowing, and there's ripples circling yet, and perhaps in some sad heart a mighty wave of tears is stirred."

There is also a saying No man is an island". It is so true. Our lives, actions, words, attitudes affect others in various ways. Today God's people are carrying loads that do not need thoughtlessness or impatience of others to add to the burden.

Most of us want to do God's will but many times we act as judge and jury instead being lead of His spirit.

There are various times in the Bible where people decided to act but not just in the way God would have them. Not always does God explain in His word but as result of impatience or wrong motives it hurts rather than in results that will glorify God. How we need to pray and wait on the Lord that we do not play into the hands of Satan. And perhaps some one is hurt needlessly or even some one else weak in the Faith is driven away.

Israel was not a shining example of obedience, but God chastised in His time and His way. Too many people see all the faults in others and decide they are God's hand-picked sheep dog to whipped them in line, not waiting on God to hear His will.

David decided to number the Children of Israel, disregarding the advice of Joab, he did his own thing. Comparing II Samuel 24:1-5, I Chronicles 21:1-10 with Numbers 1. Satan was behind it all. Just what prompted David it is not spelled out but trouble to Israel and David resulted. Obedience is better than sacrifice always. How we need the Lord to cause us to see our motives. Are they self-seeking, impatient or self righteous? Oh! To allow God to examine our ambitious, motives, impatience, or judgements to see if self is not the instigator or even the devil. We can really throw a monkey wrench" in to the plan of God by being impatient or judgemental.

Pastors, ministers, board members, teachers or laymen are not exempt from the sly provocations of Satan. It is so easy to see the faults of others, lack of interest, failure of others to shoulder their part of the burden, causing us frustration. Then we feel we have to do something. Sometimes Satan can cause us to be provoked! Perhaps we are in the position where we can subtly let them know they are not doing what we think they should. Have we EVER done that? Have you ever passed judgement on someone then found out you WERE wrong? sometimes laymen withhold money that belongs to God from the one you should give it to because you are miffed at them. Sometimes preachers use the pulpit to beat the sheep into obedience. Teachers also can do the same. Board members can make life so uncomfortable to pastors and the fellow christians because they are not obeying their ideas. Impatience can cause division, discouragement or even drive people away from the church. How much better to wait before the Lord, put the problem in His hands and then WAIT on HIM. Maybe God is just trying to teach us patience! When we run ahead of the Lord we can hinder Him and others. And we are

helping Satan instead of defeating him. We can hurt someone else, perhaps a weak one in the Faith, and the one we want to obey us, did not get the warning. The Bible says if we have aught against our brother go to him. Otherwise Pray, love and commit that one to the Lord. A task may important but if we become impatient, we may find ourselves working by ourselves because our timeing is wrong. PATIENCE is a virtue worth waiting for.

May the Lord give us humbleness and great love as we work for Him, for we are workers together with Him. Remember our fellow christians are God's servants too. And to our Master he standeth or falleth. Yea, he shall be held up; for God is able to make him stand. Should I add this, make sure we do not cause him to fall.

The Bible In The Wall

Many years ago a lady in Spain wanted to do something special for the Lord and decided to give away Bibles. While seeking possible recipients she came upon a man building a wall. When she discovered he had never owned a Bible, she offered him one, writing his name in it.

The man was too embarrassed to refuse it; but when she left, he resolved, "I will never read this and I'll make sure no one else will either." He placed the book behind one of the stones and finished the wall, certain that at least this copy would be hidden forever.

A few years later an earthquake hit that area and an inspector, looking for damage, found a crack in the wall. He peered in and to his amazement saw the book. He carefully removed it, hurriedly turned the pages, and decided to take it home. That evening he was found earnestly studying the Word of God.

Soon the inspector was on his knees thanking Jesus for dying for him. He yielded his life to his newfound Saviour and became a distributor for the Bible Society in Spain, selling God's Word from town to town.

It was not long before he came upon a stonemason and offered him a Bible at a very low cost. The man told him he had sealed in a wall the only Bible he had ever owned. The distributor drew from his pocket the very Bible and glancing at the flyleaf told the man his name. The startled laborer sat down and listened to the distributor's story. Then he too decided to have a closer look at this strange book.


The stoneworker also became a Christian and eventually a missionary in a foreign land where for many years he labored faithfully for his Saviour.

Three Questions ? ? ?

Matt. 24:1-14

The last part of Matthew 23 lays the foundation for this first part of Matthew 24. Jesus had come to His own (Israel). He had preached to them. He fed the multitudes. He healed the sick. He cast out devils. He taught in the synagogue and by the sea shore. He had given them the opportunity to a new and better way of life. He gave them every opening to recognize that He was the Messiah. They refused.

Dejectedly He has walked out of the temple. So noticed by His disciples who tried to console Him by pointing out all the beauty of the temple, with its ornaments of gold, silver and precious stones. A building well constructed. Jesus startled them by saying, "See ye not all these things? Verily I say unto you, there shall not be left here one stone upon another that shall not be thrown down." Matt. 24:2

He left them thunder struck and headed for the Mount of Olives. The disciples hunted Him up and privately asked Him three questions - (1) "Tell us, when shall these things be? (2) And what shall be the sign of Thy coming? (3) And of the end of the world?" Matt. 24:3

Jesus never answered their first question. "When shall these things be?" This was concerning His statement, "There shall not be left one stone upon another" or specifically the destruction of the temple. Here let me insert a summary of the seige of Jerusalem A.D. 70. This was just a few years from this time.

Destruction of Jerusalem

Titus with his Roman army arrived before the walls of Jerusalem on the day of Passover A.D.70. Banks of earthwork were built, battering rams were placed, and the seige began.

The Roman army numbered 30,000; the Jewish army 24,000. The city was crowded with 600,000 visitors. After five months the walls were battered down; the Temple burned and the city left in ruins. The Roman soldiers pryed the stones apart to get the gold and silver that had melted and run into the crevices. One million Jews were killed..95,000 captives were taken. "One of the most appalling events in all history" wrote the historians.

This happened in less than 70 years so Jesus did not take time to explain their first question. The third question, "And of the end of the world?" He did not explain because this would be at least 1,000 years after He returns; because He must rule this earth for 1,000 years. Rev. 20:4 "---they lived and reigned a thousand years." Then will be the destruction of this earth and fulfill II Peter 3:10-13. This was, at least, three thousand years away. Eighteen more years and 2,000 years will have come and gone since Jesus made these statement.

The three questions: One happened real soon; one is a long way off; that leaves question two. "And what shall be the sign of thy coming?" Jesus spent most of Matthew 24 explaining things that will point to His coming back to this earth again.

May I refresh your memory, Acts 1:9-11..(99) "And when he had spoken these things, while they beheld, he was taken up; and a cloud received him out of their sight. (10) And while they looked stedfastly toward heaven as he went up, behold, two men stood by them in white apparel."

(11) "Which also said, Ye men of Galilee, why stand ye gazing up into heaven? This same Jesus, which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen him go into heaven."

Unthankful Christians

America is a wealthy nation. Here we have an abundance of food, clothing, housing and luxuries. We have a rare degree of freedom, security and opportunity. Above all, we are immeasurably benefited by the widespread proclamation fo the gospel.

But Americans are basically ungrateful. Our yearly Thanksgiving Day is characterized by empty formality and gorged stomach. For the rest of the year we complain and grumble about everything from taxes to toothaches. Overeating and overspending are confusing our wants with our needs, and like spoiled children we are very hard to satisfy.

All this is a great sin, and God will judge us for it. This was the prime sin of the primeval apostasy. Paul says in Romans 1:21: "Because that, when they knew God, they glorified him not as God, neither were thankful; but became vain in their imaginations, and their foolish heart was darkened." This is what is happening to our nation.

But what about the Christians of American? Are we really thankful? How much do we complain about others, our pastor, our co-workers, our friends, our government, our health, our economic lot, our work and our problems? And how often-shame on us-have we actually spoken against the Lord?

Unthankfulness is a vicious sin because:

1. Unthankfulness represents shallow thinking. Have we forgotten the glorious salvation which drew us from the pit of sin? Have we gone to sleep and quit numbering our blessings? Are we no longer alert to the daily mercies of God? A thoughful Christian has reason for daily praise. David said: "The dead praise not the Lord, neither any that go down into silence. But we will bless the Lord from this time forth and evermore. Praise the Lord" (Ps. 115:17,18).

2. Unthankfulness questions God's wisdom and authority. An unthankful Christian is really saying: "God is not treating me right." This is presumption of the worst sort, and undermines the entire relationship between God and His child. Let us say with Paul, "...I have learned, in whatsoever state I am, therewith to be content" (Phil. 4:11).

3. Unthankfulness reveals a dominant self-emphasis. All self-consciousness at the expense of Christ-consciousness is sin. The unthankful person is invariably concerned about his profit, his advance and his security. But one who is filled with thanksgiving is filled with thoughts of His Lord and the daily benefits received from heaven's treasure store.

4. Unthankfullness develops covetousness. An unthankful Christian has nothing to share-either materially or spiritually. How can he? Unsatisfied with his own lot, he has neither concern nor aid for others. Many of God's works are languishing because His people are not abounding with "thanks-giving!"

5. Unthankfulness marks the beginning of apostasy. Contrary to common opinion, such things as false doctrine and unbelief seldom arise from free intellectual exercise. The source is rather in a wicked, unthankful, selfish heart. With such a foundation, theological apostasy issues forth as an inevitable process (Rom. 1:18-23).

Christians, let us repent of the great sin of unthankfulness. Then with cleansed hearts let us obey the admonition of Hebrews 13:15: "By him therefore let us offer the sacrifice of praise to God continually, that is, the fruit of our lips giving thanks to his name."

Jacob Hornberger Pletcher, of Barksdale, Texas, son of Jacob Elijah and Maria Pletcher, was born August 22, 1908 in Mill Creek, Oklahoma. He departed this life January 5, 1984, at the age of 75 years, 4 months, 13 days, in the Methodist Hospital in San Antonio, Texas. He was married to Demerita Mae Beagle on May 31, 1936 at Sharon, Oklahoma.

To this union were born three sons and two daughters. Jacob John married Joan of Benton, Louisiana; Ermarita married Fred Urick of Alvin, Texas; Rockney married Barbara of Dallas, Texas; Zale married Cathy of Dallas, Texas; Karen Joan married Savoy Grimmer of Dickinson, Texas. Rev. Pletcher is also survived by seven grandchildren: Demerita Joan Urick, Jacob John Urick, Stephen Pletcher, D'Ann Pletcher, Melinda Pletcher, Todd Pletcher and Bethanie Pletcher. He is additionally survived by one brother, Byron Pletcher of Perrytown, Texas and two sisters, Cora Edge of Hardesty, Oklahoma, and Vivian Taliferro of Roswell, New Mexico, as well as a number of nieces, nephews and other relations. He was preceded indeath by his parents, five sisters and two brothers.

Rev. Pletcher was converted and accepted Jesus Christ as his personal Saviour as a young man of 21 years in 1929. He felt the call into the ministry and preached the gospel for 54 years as a pastor and evangelist in the Apostolic Faith Movement. The service was opened with prayer by Rev. Neil Ragan, followed by two of Rev. Pletchers favorite old hymns, rendered by the Mathis Quartet of Hempstead, Texas, accompanied by Doneva McPhetridge, Jr. Rev. Roland Busch then read the obituary and gave his heartfelt comments. Rev. Savoy Grimmer, son-in-law of the deceased, in giving the eulogy, proceeded to read a lovely poem written by Mrs. Pletcher especially for the service, given by the Holy Spirit to her following the death of her husband. He then left the congregation with very appropriate comments of how God has used Rev. Pletcher to touch his life through teaching at Bible College.

Sheltered Safe With the Arms of God" was then sung by the Whitely family with added words and remembrances by Rev. Howard Whitely of the time and labor spent by Rev. Pletcher in the work of the Lord at Bible College. The text of the service brought by Rev. Olen Bachler was Romans 8:28 and Mark 10:29,30, giving words of comfort and encouragement to the family. Before and after the service, organ music was rendered by Mrs. Phyllis Bachler.

Interment was at South Park Cemetery, Pearland, Texas. The gravesite service was opened with Rev. Pletcher's two daughters singing The Meeting in the Air", accompanied by Mrs. Phyllis Bachler. Isaiah 47:1,2 was read with added thoughts by Rev. Marcus Adair. After closing with prayer, an expression of thanks was given by Rev. Olen Bachler to all who had contributed in lovely friendship gestures.

Jacob Hornberger Pletcher was laid to rest awaiting the meeting of the saints in the air with Jesus Christ, his Savior. Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of His saints." Psalms 116:15
