"Humbly asked Him to remove our shortcomings"

He said: I can remember numerous occasions in sobriety where I have begged, pleaded, screamed at my Higher Power to remove a specific defect of character. I've tried to make deals, I've cursed Him, I've shaken my fist at the ceiling. I can also tell you that whatever defect it happened to be at the time was not removed as promptly as I would have liked. For years, I wondered if this meant that my Higher Power would only do certain things, or that I was asking the wrong way, or if I just wasn't worth God's time or energy. But then I re-read the Seventh Step prayer. It says, "Please remove from me every single defect of character that stands in the way of my usefulness to you and to others." It does not say, "Remove these defects that are causing me harm."


Now, not one time did any of these character defects cause me lasting harm. I've been afraid that they would, or that my world was crumbling around me, or that my life was in the crapper and would never be repaired. My fears were never realized.

When I was struck with a blinding case of procrastination, I feared I'd flunk out of college. It got so bad I could barely do anything but sit, watch TV and think about it. But, with help from a woman in AA, I got through it, and I graduated. She gave me a great lesson on Step Seven — it's all about fear.

Fear is the foundation for every one of my defects of character. Each time, it is fear rearing its ugly head in a different way. But also, when I beg, plead, cajole my Higher Power, I come from a fearful place too. From there, I can't ask Him humbly for anything.

Another defect is my shyness. I am afraid of talking to people. Sometimes it feels like every time I open my mouth something stupid flies out. So, for a long time in sobriety, I rarely talked. I was the shy guy in the corner. This defect, this fear, has not completely been removed to this day. But I have a job where I have to (*Cont. p. 2*)

Truth is I'm one of those people who likes to do everything myself. You know, 'Being in Charge.' It doesn't often occur to me to ask anyone for help. When it came to asking God for things, I thought I knew the right and wrong of it. That was *before* AA.

I have always been impressed by the story of the Three Wishes, you know the one. It's been told in many ways but the essence is always the same. The shortsighted human being, when granted three wishes, quickly asks for material things; money, fame, some object of infatuation, and it never turns out well. The lesson being that true happiness lies elsewhere. Somehow this always stuck with me.

I assumed that my strategy when dealing with God would be on the right course if I only asked for things of a deep spiritual value, like patience, forgiveness, compassion. Problem was this good intention was eclipsed by the fact that I still wanted to be in charge and was not letting God's full power do its work in me. I was focused on directing my own life. Believe me I still have trouble with that.

Once I had taken up the adventure of Alcoholics Anonymous and took a good hard look at this idea of letting God be in charge I saw that I had never truly done it. I had never completely trusted Him to lead the way. It takes an attitude of humility that is not natural for me. But I do remember the complete humiliation that alcohol bestowed on me and I never want to go there again. The solution is having the humility to ask God to do for me what I cannot do for myself. I need only to ask in the simplest of terms; I pray that you now remove from me every single defect of character which stands in the way of my usefulness to you and my fellows. He Said: *(cont)* talk to people, often about uncomfortable stuff. So how do I get through it? I have to remove myself from the equation. I have to come from a place of service. When I do my job, not for my own ego or to better myself, but that my job can help others; that shyness and fear is removed and I can do my job well. It is that idea of service -- or humility if you like -- that gets me through.

For me, faith is not the opposite of fear, humility is. But humility is more slippery than a bar of soap in the bathtub. Once I think I have it, especially when I think I have a lot of it, it's gone. Humility comes when I forget about my needs, wants and desires. It's when I become a small part in a large world that God can work through me. It's also the place from which I can share myself the most.

For me it starts from when I talk to another alcoholic. The humility that 'all I can share is my experience' leads me to say things that I didn't know I even believed. No matter how shy or depressed or any other character defect I have been - sit me down with a newcomer and watch that disappear, if only for a little while. When I can bring that notion of service into other areas of my life, that's when God can do the most work through me, and my character defects are relieved. Tom F., Kauai

She Said: (cont) resentment, self-abasement, pride, and the list goes on, had become habitual. Taking a fearlessly honest look I realized that I was unable to remove these things from myself. They had become my modus-operandi, my way of dealing with life. On my own I was truly powerless to break free from the destructive pattern. Today I don't have to stay imprisoned by my shortcomings if I ask for help. Without expectation of how He is going to do it, God can even turn my weaknesses into strengths.

It has been said that the best way to combat evil is through energetic progress in the good. This makes sense to me. In AA we say that right action will lead to right thinking. As I am confronted with my own shortcomings in handling life's obstacles I try to remember to ask God to grant me these Three Wishes; The serenity to accept the things that I cannot change, the courage to change the things I can and the wisdom to know the difference. This, the beginning of the Serenity Prayer, makes room in my heart for God to do it His way. I really had it all wrong you see. If I'm humble I don't have a 'strategy' for dealing with God. Wow. I pray to let God deal with me.

The Best of Big Book Dave:

July in Our History:

July 15th 1938: The first documented use of the A.A. name in our General Service Office Archives. It is in a letter from Bill W. to Willard Richardson (non-alcoholic trustee). Bill started using the name "Alcoholics Anonymous" both as the working title for our book and then as the name for our membership.

July 1936: At Lois and Bill W.s home on Clinton St., Brooklyn, a group of hard core alcoholics was developing weekly meetings while Bill was receiving strong criticism from the Oxford Group.

July 1942: Opening in New York City, Riverside Hospital, which has the first alcohol treatment facilities for adolescents in the U.S.

July 1949: The first medical journal about **A.A.** is written by Dr. Silkworth.

July 1965: At our International Convention held in Toronto, Canada, Bill led thousands of A.A. members in our "I am responsible" pledge for the first time! It was written by Al S.

July 1967: The American Medical Association passes a resolution identifying alcoholism as "A complex disease and disease that merits the serious concern of all members of the health professions."
