FRONTIER HERITAGE FAIR

This is the club's main event, going back to 1981! Set-up is Friday, Feb. 16, about 9:00 a.m. for us and from 10 for vendors, though a few show up early. Bob and I try to be prompt but the reality is thievery is such an issue we cannot load the multitude of items that we take (car and pickup) the night before so it all has to be done the morning of. Anyway, the first chore is moving items into the building and hanging banners and the raffle blanket. The fairgrounds sent me the revised Facility Guide which specifies any banner hung on the fence has to be 4'X8' or smaller. Our three are longer so we are getting one made that will replace the damaged one and comply with the requirement.

Set-up times are 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. Friday and 7 a.m. Saturday.

Remember the building will probably not be heated on Friday.

There is a new phone number for the Auditorium: 458-215-4370. This will be Friday through Sunday.

Table covers are no longer provided free so people will have to bring their (appropriate) own.

Reservations are arriving at the normal rate so I expect we will have about the same number as last year and possibly more. I've been told the quilters want to come back, the schoolmarm will be there on Saturday and Lola the bead seller has not moved to Idaho yet so will have beads a'plenty. We're getting a second blacksmith and there will be a good assortment of plunder. One of the Old Time Fiddlers is rounding up volunteers for us again.

Speaking of plunder, don't forget to look at your stash for suitable items to donate to the club sale table! This was a big success last year and helped keep our heads above water. Many thanks to Jim and Debbie Eikenberry who managed the sales last year and have volunteered for it this year.

Again I am asking for people to serve as greeters and collect entry fees at the admission table. My thanks to those who have done that in the past – you are so appreciated! MOUNTAIN MAN FEAST by Edwin Bingham

With the exception of sparse supplies of salt, flour, tea, coffee and tobacco the mountain man lived off the country. Favorite meat was the buffalo, supplemented by deer, antelope, beaver tail, and in extremity horse or mule meat. Thomas Jefferson Farnham described a trapper's feast on buffalo:

"The narrow bones were undergoing a severe flagellation; the blows of the old hunter's hatchet were cracking them in pieces, and laying bare the rolls of 'trapper's butter' within them. A pound of marrow was thus extracted, and put into a gallon of water heated to nearly the boiling point. The blood which he had dipped from the cavity of the buffalo was then stirred in till the mass became the consistency of rice soup. A little salt and pepper finished the preparation. It was a fine dish...for a while it loosed our tongues and warmed our hearts toward one another; it made our faces to shine with grease and gladness".

MOUNTAIN MAN FAMINE by Joe Meek

I have held my hands in an ant hill until they were covered with ants, then greedily licked them off. I have taken the soles of my moccasins, crisped them in the fire and eaten them. In our extremity, the large black crickets which are found in this country were considered game. We used to take a kettle of hot water, catch the crickets and throw them in and when they stopped kicking, eat them. That was not what we called *cant tickup ko hanch* (good meat, my friend) but it kept us alive.

Both from Northwest Rendezvous, August 1983. Edwin Bingham was a U of O professor whose specialty was the American West

Joe was known to be a teller of tall tales to amuse or shock people but I can believe him on this one...
