

Apps for Students with Autism Spectrum Disorders

So you've got a tablet/device, where do you start? Sometimes starting is the most difficult task of all.

Mark Coppin developed an "Apps for Students with Autism Spectrum Disorders" wheel that might have just the start you need.

The wheel is divided into six Common Learning Characteristics:

- ♦ Social Skills
- Need for Sameness or Routine
- ♦ Sensory Sensitivity
- Difficulty with Traditional Learning Methods
- ♦ Behavior
- Communication

Each common learning characteristic is then defined by Common Learning Traits. We will focus on the "Behavior" characteristic. The learning traits are:

- ♦ Hyperactive
- Easily Frustrated

- ♦ Generalization
- **♦** Impulsive
- Self Control
- Explosive
- Difficulty with Personal Management.

The next level then defines App Categories. Once again focusing on the "Behavior" characteristic the App Categories could be:

- ♦ Behavior Tracking
- ♦ Visual Schedules
- Behavior Management
- ♦ Video Modeling
- Reward System
- Visual Timer
- ♦ Self Management

The final level then defines apps that might fit the characteristics or traits you wish to address through your tablet/device. With the "Behavior" characteristic that may be:

- Behavior Tracker Pro
- ◆ Chore Pad HD

- ◆ Time Timer iPad Edition
- iReward
- ♦ Choiceworks
- ♦ iEarned That
- Behavior Lens
- Video Scheduler
- ♦ Win a Spin HD
- ♦ iChoose

As noted on the apps wheel, this is only a sampling of apps; it is only intended to give you a starting point. Keep in mind no two children are the same. What will be important is that you address what's needed for your child and their learning style.

Your apps wheel may not contain all six of the Common Learning Characteristics listed in Mark's sample. You might only want to address three specific characteristics; use Mark's wheel as a template and go from there. When you're done, please share your version of apps wheel with our FXAM Family

Through the Maze (kid friendly) - Cool Math Games by Joyce Kreger

Filled with fear that my son was watching another "Annoying Orange" YouTube video or something equally annoying, I got a delightful surprise last year. Michael was on the website coolmath-games.com. The site deserves its name because the games are really cool. With a variety of levels, you can find anything from shapes, colors and patterns to jigsaw puzzles and logic games. What makes these games especially solid is that they all involve strategy, yet your child will just have fun.

Michael started playing Bloxorz, which is a simple strategy game of moving a block from point A to point B without the block falling into space. He would delight in getting to the next, more difficult level. He is now loving anything with the word Papa's in front of it, like Papa's Freezeria, Papa's Burgeria, Papa's Wingeria, and more. They are all fast food restaurant games where customers place an order and you fill it. This involves all phases of cooking and/or assembling the food in the right order to ensure the customer gets exactly what he or she wants. The customer reacts and gives a tip based on the accuracy. Most importantly, it is enjoyable. There are hundreds of games, so your child is sure to find something that will be enjoyable.

STX209 Studies at Children's Hospital of Michigan

STX209 (Arbaclofen) is a selective gamma-amino butyric acid type B (GABA-B) receptor agonist. Arbaclofen is a modification of Baclofen, a medication that has been on the market for decades with a solid safety record.

Research suggests that individuals with autism and fragile X syndrome have abnormalities in synaptic transmission. Through the GABA-B receptor, STX209 may serve to restore the normal balance at the synapse and correct abnormalities associated with these disorders. In layman's terms, let's say the transmission is at warp speed and what Arbaclofen does is it has the ability to slow down the transmissions, more or less put the brakes on.

Seaside Therapeutics currently has over 25 locations across the US participating in studies on the use of STX209 (Arbaclofen) and shortly they will be adding the Children's Hospital of Michigan to the list.

Children's Hospital of Michigan is located at 3901 Beaubien Street in Detroit, near I-75 and Mack Avenue.

This study's goal is to figure out if STX209 can improve social function. The study in the older age group has completed and so only

the **ages 5-11** study is open right now. Children with fragile X syndrome who have issues with social function - as compared to typically developing peers - may be eligible. Examples include children who like to be by themselves, have emotional outbursts, don't react well to social situations, are difficult to reach, don't respond to affection, etc.

Only children with fragile X syndrome, the full FMR1 mutation can enroll. These individuals may or may not also be diagnosed with an Autism Spectrum Disorder.

They hope to enroll participants and start the study as soon as possible and hope for it to be open in early February. The study will likely be enrolling until May of this year. Enrollment will last approximately three months. Families who participate may be eligible for the longer-term extension study.

The primary investigator will be Dr. David Stockton; he will be assisted by Dr. Flore and Dr. Misra.

David W. Stockton, MD. Dr. Stockton is a Professor in the Departments of Pediatrics and Internal Medicine at Wayne State University. Dr. Stockton is Chief of the Division of Genetic and Metabolic Disorders in the Department of Pediatrics and

coordinates patient care in the genetics clinics of the Detroit Medical Center.

Leigh Anne Flore, MD, MS. Dr. Flore is a recent addition to our clinical geneticists at Children's Hospital of Michigan and Wayne State University. Her clinical and research interests include autism/developmental disorders, dysmorphology, and medical genetics education.

Vinod Misra, MD, PhD. Dr. Misra is also a clinical geneticist at Children's Hospital of Michigan and Wayne State University. He sees a range of patients and has expertise in management of patients with dysmorphology, congenital anomalies, inborn errors of metabolism, and other genetic disorders.



University of Michigan and the FXCRC FORWARD Registry and Database

The University of Michigan has received full approval to enroll participants in the FORWARD Registry and Database. The Registry is open to all individuals with a Fragile X premutation or full mutation and includes basic patient demographic information as well as questions regarding interest in potential future research studies. The Database is open to all individuals with a full mutation only (up to age 24 years) and includes questions about development, education, medical health, and behavioral problems.

For all individuals interested in participating in the FORWARD Registry and Database: If you or your family members have not yet been evaluated by the University of Michigan Fragile X Clinic, or if it has been more than 6 months since you were last seen in clinic, please call our office to set up an appointment to review your medical history and enroll in the study. If you or your family members have been evaluated in the University of Michigan Fragile X Clinic within the last 6 months, you can be enrolled in the study without a medical appointment (with no charge to your health insurance).



From the President's Desk by Laureen Majeske





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
