1850-51 was the primary period for construction of Alexandroffsky. Land assembly had begun in 1848. It was first occupied on February 24, 1852. 1851 is the year of the death of Tom & Celeste's 2-year old first-born, George. Their other son Ross Revillon is about a year old. In this year's diary I discovered that Tom called his father "Father," his brother Clinton Dewitt "Clint," his brother Walter Scott "Walt," and his brother Ross Jr. "Ross." Tom gives Celeste a monthly expense allowance of \$250 and frequently gives her cash for what his diary refers to as "living." I discover they have a dog, are living on Market Street while awaiting completion of Alexandroffsky. Tom's builder or general contractor is Josiah Lee who authorizes Tom to make payments when he is satisfied with various subcontractors' work. Celeste and Tom make frequent shopping trips to New York, always staying in Philadelphia on the way. In August they continue from New York by steamboat to Newport, where Tom rents sailing vessels to fish from. Tom is pushing his builder for an October 1 completion date for Alexandroffsky but doesn't get it. Construction on the brick wall is largely completed this year. Ross meets John H. B. Latrobe for the first time concerning real estate settlement business. Tom's banker is Alex Brown & Sons. He and Celeste go to the theater, the opera and concerts in both Baltimore and New York. They also like to attend the circus when it is in town. On one trip they bring an "Aunt Sally" back with them from Philadelphia. They usually take a train from Baltimore to Philly and another train a day or 2 later to New York. The two lions are shipped from New York this year. I discover that Tom loves to smoke cigars and the couple likes oysters. Entries to follow do not include all the entries made; routine duplications are often omitted.

Tom and Celeste make regular trips to Philadelphia and New York, buying furnishings and visiting people. For the first time Newport is mentioned in his diaries. He begins to make August trips there with Celeste and rents boats for fishing. They now have two boys, Ross and William. They are still paying a steady stream of contractors at Alexandroffsky. The herd of cattle grows quickly. Since they regularly pay butchers but buy their milk it is probably a herd of beef cattle rather than a dairy herd. They buy a \$550 harp and Celeste begins taking music lessons on the harp and guitar (mostly the harp).

Crimea's stone wall begins construction in September by John Wolfenden; ice house in November and wagon shed in December. Over 251 bushels of wheat are grown at Crimea earning \$527 in December. Thomas begins making significant income from interest on personal loans, increasingly secured by mortgages and from rental properties. He joins a duck hunting club in December. Alexandroffsky's gate-house is installed in May and the walking path from house to gate in July. Celeste's doctor is Dr. Maynard. For the first time Alexandroffsky has 4th of July fire works display. Tom gives to a colored man to help buy his wife's freedom. Ross Winans Jr. (Tom's brother) marries Maggie Wentz on July 19. Tom buys Celeste a grand piano in December.

Most Crimea construction occurs this year. This is the first year Tom receives significant interest returns on his securities investments and he gets very heavily into mortgage banking this year. The ice house, dairy, chicken house, farm house, fencing, windmill, fish pool, road and entrance wall are completed at Crimea this year and a lot of cows are purchased for the country estate. The cornerstone (northeast corner) is laid for the Orianda mansion on June 27 and construction hits its peak in September. The pair of eagles flanking Crimea's entrance in the year 2000 is received September 23, 1856. The brick stable (its tin roof cost \$321.50) is built at Alexandroffsky. Mr. George Revillon (Celeste's father) comes to stay at Alexandroffsky. Tom purchases the family plot at Green Mount Cemetery. Celeste continues harp lessons. The infamous brick wall around the Alexandroffsky estate is completed this year. The family continues its tradition of spending August in Newport, Rhode Island. On October 31st, Tom hires a personal assistant named Walter Wilkinson.
