

Parish Membership: Every family and single adult to be considered active members of St. Bartholomew's Parish must be properly registered in the parish, receiving and regularly using the parish weekly donation envelopes. Only in this way can the parish issue documents attesting to parish membership and Catholic practice, e.g. a letter to be a Godparent or Sponsor. New parishioners are requested to visit the parish office.

Sick & Shut-ins: The priests are available to administer the Sacraments to those who are unable to come to Church. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is part of the healing ministry of the Church, and should be received early in an illness or before a serious operation.

Baptisms: Please call the parish office to make arrangements.

Marriages: In order to provide sufficient time for the Marriage Preparation Course, please call the parish office and ask to speak with the pastor at least six months in advance of the wedding.

DO WE RECOGNIZE CHRIST AS OFTEN AS WE COULD?

Infants can do little for themselves,; parents must do everything



the infant requires. At the opposite end of the spectrum, seniors are often equally reliant on their children. Sirach instructs children to care for their elderly parents, recognizing that not only their strength but their mind may fail. For both child and parent this may be quite difficult. It

is especially then that we must "put on heartfelt compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience, bearing with one another and forgiving one another," for the supple bond of love can easily strain or snap (Colossians 3:12-13).

Abraham lived his life filled with great faith, faith proven by his willingness to do anything the Lord asked him. Simeon and Anna lived lives of tremendous faith, as evidenced by their continual presence in the temple. They immediately recognized the Messiah, "the Christ of the Lord," in this infant boy (Luke 2:26). Do we recognize the Christ of the Lord every time that we could? We know of Christ's presence within us and trust that what we do for the least of our brothers and sisters we do for Him. But do we see the Lord's saving power, our redemption, in their eyes?

The timing of the reading of this Gospel makes sense, for this scene can only occur after Mary has borne the Son of God. However, the lives of Anna and Simeon, at least in their later years, symbolize the Advent season. Both had been waiting for years for this moment—the moment in which they would see the face of salvation. Both must have been filled with incredible faith to recognize the Messiah in this infant boy. Each immediately gives thanks to God for granting them the fulfillment of their final desire before they die. They then proclaim Jesus' power, Simeon to Mary, Anna to the others in the temple, initiating another period of expectant hope.

How can I better see Christ in my family members? How can I better see neighbors and strangers as my sisters and brothers?


