# Kerry's Korner

Every year in June, I leave the rock (Florida Keys) to travel north and participate in the Florida United Methodist Church Annual Conference session. It is something that I am all too familiar with. However, this year it occurred to me that many in our church are not familiar with what that is. About a week ago, as I was talking about making hotel reservations to attend the Annual Conference, a member of our church overheard me and I was asked: "What is the Florida Annual Conference and what do you do there?"

Well, I thought it would be good to provide you with a little description as to what the Florida United Methodist Church Annual Conference is.

#### **Annual Conferences**

When you hear the term "annual conference," it could be referring to any one of three things. The annual conference is a regional body, an organizational unit AND a yearly meeting. Many of these yearly meetings happen in the U.S. in May and June.

#### Regional body

The annual (sometimes referred to as 'regional') conference is described by the church's Constitution and (other parts of the) Book of Discipline as the "basic unit" of the church. In the United States, an annual conference may cover an entire state, only part of the state, or even parts of two or more states. There are also three missionary conferences in the United States, which rely upon the denomination as a whole for funding. The United States has 56 annual conferences, supervised by bishops in 46 episcopal areas. There are 75 annual conferences in Africa, Europe, and the Philippines, which are supervised by 20 bishops.

#### **Organizational body**

In the U.S., the annual conference has a central office and professional staff that coordinate and conduct ministry and the business of the conference. It likely has a director of connectional ministries, treasurer, directors of program areas (such as camping), communications director, and other staff as deemed appropriate for the annual conference and as required by the Book of Discipline. Clergy and laypersons may also serve on conference boards, commissions and committees.

#### **Annual Conference sessions**


Each year an equal number of clergy members and lay members attend their conference's annual conference session for worship, fellowship, and to conduct the business of the conference, which may last 3-5 days. These sessions include reports of past and ongoing work; adoption of future goals, programs and budgets; ordination of clergy members as deacons and elders; and election of delegates to Jurisdictional and General Conferences (every 4 years). The bishop presides over these meetings.

#### **United Methodist Women**

The last meeting before summer recess was held May 22 at President Edna Waldorf's house. The women need

a long-deserved break after a very busy winter season. During the summer months, several members will be attending Mission U, the annual retreat dedicated to learning about the 2018 study topics. This year's study topics are (1) the three Missionary Conferences of the United Methodist Church: Red Bird Mission in Kentucky, the Oklahoma Indian Conference, and the Alaska Missionary Conference; (2) Climate Justice and (3) a spiritual growth study.

The unit has received donated shelves which have been installed in the narthex of the church to house our reading program books as well as other display materials. In addition to the three annual study topics, every year the UMW national office selects books in five different areas that it encourages members to read to increase their understanding of social issues and mission opportunities. The reading areas are leadership development, spiritual growth, social action, nurturing community and education for mission. These books are usually thought provoking and informative. It is a goal for many units to have as many members as possible read a book in every area. For members who do not enjoy reading, a reasonable goal might be to read one book for the year. In addition, there are copies of the United Methodist Magazine,

These magazines provide a snapshot of activities of local units, the national organization, as well as work overseas. There is a sign out sheet for books on the shelves. If you borrow a book, please sign the date, your name and the title of the book and check off when you return it. We have a limited supply of books so please be prompt in returning the book when you are done with it. Summer is a good time for reading these books because there is less demand for the books with fewer members in residence. Any of you who have books from the last two or three years, please return them because they are still eligible for credit in the reading program for five years. Many of the books are marked inside the front cover as property of the UMW and often have the reading category indicated as well. Please give these books to any UMW officer or leave on the shelves in the narthex. Thank you for your assistance with this. In the past, without adequate church bookshelves, we have had a very haphazard book reading check out and return. We hope to remedy this with our new shelves in the narthex. In addition, our books are now easily available to any women in the church who wish to read them, whether they attend our meetings or not. Simply sign them out on the sheet like any member would do. Please print your name and leave a phone number or email address if you are not known to the UMW officers (Edna Waldorf, Kim Youngblood, Virginia Spear, Melba Benson, or Mary Lou Wilkinson). Our goal is to try to track down all signed out books if they have not been returned in three months!

#### **Burton's Creation Care Green Team Report**

Thank you to everyone who took the time to complete our recent survey. We really appreciate all the feedback, both positive and negative, because it means that the members of our congregation are thinking about what it means to follow God's mandate to care for his creation. Just as God created Adam and put him in the Garden of Eden to work it and take care of it (Gen. 2:15), so too we each have been placed somewhere that God expects us to care for to the best of our abilities. For each of us that will mean something different. Years ago I had a friend who when she did her morning walks, always carried a bag to pick up litter. I have a hard time wanting to sully my morning reflective walking time picking up dirty litter instead of simply enjoying God's creation. She did not ask me to do this with her. It was her thing and she knew I had to find my own way to care for the environment. The main thing is that if every one of us thought about two or three things that we could do to make the environment more like the Eden that God created, then the world would slowly but surely move toward that vision. Not by grand steps but by everyone taking a few small steps.

On Sunday, April 23, members of Burton's Green Team handed out free cloth bags to church attendees in the hopes that this would encourage more people to reduce their use of plastic bags. Thanks to everyone who contributed toward the cost of these bags as well as those who gave a free will contribution that day toward the purchase of more bags. By your use of these bags at the store, you provide a witness to others about creation care. As a resident of a very windy place, all I can think about is how often plastic bags end up whisked away into the ocean to harm unsuspecting marine animals. One of my neighbors carries a long handled net on her boat just to scoop up plastic in the ocean. Again, I think what a good idea but I need a nudge to carry it out. It is this nudge that the Green Team hopes to provide. Most of us probably have at various times thought of things we could do to be better stewards of God's creation, but too often, as in my case, they just remain good intentions. In my defense I can say that it has never been a habit and it takes time to overcome old habits and replace them with new ones. So this is a learning process for everyone.

Thanks to James Kirkman, Burton member and Eagle Scout recipient, for demonstrating his Eagle Scout project to us —a beautiful handmade wooden composter which is behind the church filled with excess rotting vegetables from our food pantry. Now these do not go to waste but are composted for the vegetable boxes and beds around the church. There is a sign on the composter listing the items which can be composted. Also, any time you have free time on your hands at church, go out and give the composter a spin. It needs to be rotated every so often.

We appreciate any information members of the congregation would like to share about things they have been doing to care for the environment. We know we have a creative congregation so we are looking forward to hearing about the ways you are finding to make a difference.
