Sarasota Concert Association

Sarasota Concert Association (SCA) continues its eighth decade of "bringing Carnegie Hall to Sarasota" with a line-up of world-class musicians and ensembles.

December 18—the Emerson String Quartet. Hailed by The New York Times as "one of the most impressive of American string quartets," and winner of nine Grammys, three Gramophone Awards, and an Avery Fisher prize, the Emerson Quartet is widely regarded as a giant among American string quartets. The arrival of award-winning conductor and cellist Paul Watkins in 2013 has "complemented their customary power, finesse and unanimity with a fresh, palpable vigor," that is "electrifying."

■ January 9—the Minnesota Orchestra, conducted by Osmo Vänskä, with cellist Alisa Weilerstein. The Grammy Award-winning Minnesota Orchestra, now in its second century. has long ranked among America's top symphonic ensembles, with a distinguished history of acclaimed performances, award-winning recordings, radio broadcasts and a visionary commitment to building the orchestral repertoire of tomorrow



Vänskä, is recognized for his meticulous preparation and compelling interpretations of repertoire from all ages. London's The Times has called Vanska a "wiry dynamo" and his interpretations "lean, whippy and indefatigably energetic. He never stops probing and pushing." In May 2015, Vänskä and the Orchestra performed two historic concerts in Havana. Cuba. becoming the first major American orchestra to perform in the island nation since the U.S. and Cuban governments announced steps to normalize relations between the two countries.

Sensitive and emotional performances are the hallmark of cellist Alisa Weilerstein, recipient, in 2011, of a MacArthur Fellowship. The McArthur Foundation hailed her as "a consummate performer, combining technical precision with impassioned musicianship."

■ January 30—National Symphof **Ukraine** (NSU), conducte

during this NSU concert, has been described by Le Figaro as a "master of transparent and sovereign touch, astonishing personality and absolutely transcendental virtuosity".

February 22—Apollo's Fire. Named for the classical god of music and the sun, Apollo's Fire was founded in 1992 by the award-winning young harpsichordist and conductor Jeannette Sorrell. Sorrell envisioned an ensemble dedicated to the baroque ideal that music should evoke affekts or passions in its listeners. The resulting Apollo's Fire is a collective of creative artists who share Sorrell's passion for drama and rhetoric. The group will perform "In Bach's Coffee House," their program of music by Bach, Handel, Telemann and Vivaldi that brought the house down at last summer's Tanglewood Music Festival. This concert is at Riverview Performing Arts Center.

■ March 16—Royal Scottish National Orchestra, by Peter Oundjian, with Scottish violinist Nicola Benedetti. The renowned Royal Scottish National Orchestra (RSNO) marks its 125th anniversary year. Since its official founding in 1891 (as the Scottish Orchestra), RSNO has worked with some of the world's most respected conductors and soloists, including Gustav Holst, Richard Strauss, Arthur

Rubinstein, Aaron Luciano Copland, Pavarotti and Elmer Bernstein, and has played a crucial role in shaping the musical life of the nation. Since Peter Ound-

jian's arrival as music director of the RSNO, the orchestra has toured China, performed at the BBC Proms and Edinburgh International Festival and released two recordings. Originally

trained as a violinist, the Toronto-born Oundjian was the first violinist of the renowned Tokyo String Quartet, a position he held for 14 years.

Scottish violinist Nicola Benedetti is one of the most influential violinists of her generation and is the winner of Best Female Artist at both the 2012 and 2013 Classical Brit Awards. Her international television appearances include performing at the opening ceremony of the 2014 Commonwealth Games to a live audience of approximately 40,000 and a TV viewing audience of 9.4million people. Benedetti performs on the Gariel Stradivarius (1717), lent to her by noted collector Jonathan Moulds.

■ March 30—Daniil Trifonov, is one of the most sought-after young virtuoso pianists of today's concert world. in a program of duo piano music with his long-time teacher at the Cleveland Institute of Music, Sergei Babayan, Born and trained in Russia, the young Trifonov burst onto the world stage in 2011 at age 20, at the International Tchaikovsky Competition. Hailed for his emotional intensity, bold energy and remarkable levels of color, pianist Sergei Babayan brings a deep understanding and insight to a stylistically diverse repertoire, which includes a performance history of 54 concertos. story of these violins, we preserve the history of the Holocaust and honor the survival of the Jewish people. Even in the midst of the unspeakable evil of the Holocaust, there was music. Music was a source of comfort, hope and resistance — a way for the Jews to express themselves and prevent the Nazis from stripping them of their humanity.

Amnon Weinstein, one of the world's most respected violin makers, has dedicated his life to locating and restoring violins that were played by Jewish musicians during the Holocaust, so that they can give voice to the voiceless - their owners and the millions who perished at the hands of the Nazis. He calls these instruments the Violins of Hope, in the belief that, where there was music, there was hope. Weinstein will bring 16 of these vio-

lins to the Sarasota area for a once-ina-lifetime opportunity for our community to hear these violins played and to experience the stories of their owners.

These patterns engender new spatial planes to interject overlapping moments in time. Through this process she hopes to achieve the feeling that time is both fleeting and infinite.

When she began, she used commercial cotton fabric; however, now her camera is her constant companion. She has the ability to transfer her photos to cotton fabrics for use in her pictures. by the mid-19th century. Hindu snake charmers and Japanese and Chinese strongmen were among the types of performers imported to entertain American audiences with both their skill and their foreignness. In addition to the performers, many circuses created productions around tales of the "Far East" like 101 Arabian Nights and Aladdin. The shows capitalized on every opportunity to promote the mysterious quality of Asia. Explore how stereotypes and fantasies of Asia played to American audiences under the Big Top through lithographs printed to advertise American circuses from the last quarter of the 19th century through the first half of the 20th century.

Soviet Scenes: Baltermants' Photographs of WWII and Pho**tojournalism from the August Coup** to Jan. 8, 2017. This exhibition presents photojournalism from two key historic moments of the former Soviet Union: World War II and the August Coup of 1991 that ended the communist regime. It features photos from The Ringling's permanent collection. Soviet Scenes showcases WWII through the lens of acclaimed photographer Dmitri Baltermants, whose work not only functioned as state-endorsed war propaganda but also captured the emotional toll of war in terms that continue to resonate. In contrast, the August Coup is shown through a range of press images, featuring photographs by Shepard Sherbell, among others, that witness the dissolution of the empire and document life in countries that were formerly part of the Soviet Union. This exhibition showcases various styles of photoiournalism and documentary as distinctive content from each time period, underscoring both the climax and collapse of the Soviet era.




