September is always a busy month, and this September was no exception.

Provincial bargaining is well underway. On September 20th, BCTF President, Clint Johnston, attended our NWTU Special General Meeting and gave a bargaining update. The following week, NWTU First VP and Bargaining Chair, Darryl Schelp, was able to observe a BCTF/BCPSEA bargaining session and will be able to share his observations during our October Executive Committee Meeting. According to the numbers shared by senior administration at the October 4th Board Meeting, student enrollment increased this year by 335 students. This is a significant difference and has created challenges in class organization in some schools. In order to meet the needs of a growing student population, the district continues to work on plans to provide additional space for students. These plans include a potential new build on the Fraser River Middle site. The NWTU will follow up with requests for consultation at the Contract Management meeting scheduled for late October.

September 30th was the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation. Many schools marked this day with events scheduled throughout the preceding week. The growth in understanding about residential schools and the commitment to reconciliation is evident in the assemblies, guest speakers, art projects and more around the district. # **Municipal Elections**


Municipal elections take place on October 15th.

# Guru Nanak

Sikhs across the world will be celebrating Guru Nanak's Gurpurab (birthday) on November 8th this year.

Guru Nanak is the first Guru or teacher of the Sikhs. He was born in 1469. Five centuries ago, Guru Nanak found himself in a society where people of different faith groups had enmity toward each other. Women in his society were treated as second class citizens. People were separated into classes; the lower one's class the worse they were treated in society.

Guru Nanak challenged these beliefs. The basic premise of his teachings was that we are all one. His philosophy was grounded in the equitable treatment of all human beings, respect for diversity and the importance of the philosophy of inclusion where everyone feels valued, welcome and a sense of belonging regardless of differences.


