

Admittedly, it has been some time since the SRCA board has provided an update to the community with respect to the organization's activities. SRCA hopes this is forgivable, in light of the havoc that monitoring the Sears developproperty ments and a special land use permit have conflicted with traditional board meeting times, inflicted inconsistency, and imposed delays in completing business.

With respect to the former, SRCA continues to observe and participate as necessary to represent the community's interests. Significant developments since the last report are the exchange of old and worn sign toppers with revitalized replacements and that the independent financial audit assured at the annual meeting is well underway. Currently, the SRCA endeavors to meet with Tucker



Of Note to the Community: Safety Alerts & Watches by Cedric Ross

Devastating house fires can happen in an instant, and many begin due to human error. The U.S. Fire Administration reports that cooking tops the list of residential building fire causes (50%), followed by heating equipment (12.5%) and electrical malfunction (6.3%).

Make your fall and winter seasons merry, bright and firefree with these essential fire safety tips:

Schedule a chimney inspection at least once a year.

Creosote, or condensed smoke, builds up on the flue and can catch fire. An annual cleaning and inspection can help prevent chimney fires.

Keep flammable items at least three feet from heat sources.

According to the National Fire Prevention Association, 56% of fatal home heating fires ignite from items being placed too close to heating equipment. Make sure everything is a safe distance from heat sources, including the furnace, space heaters, fireplaces and wood stoves.

Check smoke detectors frequently.

Approximately 60% of house fire deaths happen in structures with no working smoke alarms. Test your home's smoke alarms monthly and replace batteries each year.

Have a family escape plan and practice it regularly.

All household members need to know all exit strategies in case a fire breaks out, as well as where to meet once they're safely outside. Have a semiannual drill and practice at different times of the day.

Cook safely.

Never leave the room when boiling, frying or baking, keep pot holders and dish towels away from the flame, and immediately turn off appliances when not in use.

Be mindful of holiday decorations.

If you choose to decorate with strings of lights, always check their condition first. Throw out those with exposed electrical wiring, and be sure to read over the manufacturer's instructions.

E-Cigarettes and Vaping – Is it Safe?

Rates of cigarette smoking have declined in the last decade to about 20% in adults older than 25 years, and 17% in those less than 25 years of age. Simultaneously, the tobacco industry has begun to heavily market e-cigarettes as a means of stopping tobacco smoking. The main target seems to be our youth! From glamorizing e-cigarettes in movies and advertising, to introducing kid-friendly flavors like bubble gum and gummy bear flavors... "vaping" is all the rage! These products are currently easily available for on-line purchase for anyone who knows how to use a credit card, and are available in dozens of local shops that have cropped up in our communities. Are e-cigarettes dangerous, or are they a better alternative to tobacco smoking?

Electronic cigarettes (e-cigarettes) and vaping are almost interchangeable terms for "smoking" nicotine from small cigarette-like devices. These devices have a mouthpiece, and a refillable cartridge, which contains nicotine, water and flavorings (there are more than 3,000) in a chemical base. A battery operated heating element heats the liquid in the cartridge to help aerosolize it to "smoke."

Can e-cigarettes help you quit smoking? Well... possibly. E-cigarette users who are trying to stop smoking regular cigarettes were able to cut down, and some quit. But they were also more likely to become "dual users." This means they continued smoking, while using e-cigarettes. While cutting down helps, it does not eliminate the smoking risk. Cutting down from one pack of cigarettes to half a pack per day doesn't cut your health risk in half.

E-cigarettes are considered by some to be a "gateway" to smoking cigarettes. The Journal of American Medical Association reported that in teens who had never smoked, 30% of those who tried an e-cigarette went on to smoke cigarettes. In those who had never tried an e-cigarette, only 8% went on to smoke. While rates of smoking traditional cigarettes in youth have declined markedly in the last decade, vaping or e-cigarette use is up almost 20% among teens—and is being seen in younger and younger age groups. Current e-cigarette rates have surpassed tobacco-smoking rates in teens and young adults.

Are the chemicals and flavorings safe in e-cigarettes? Well, the jury is still out, because e-cig use is a relatively recent phenomenon. Most studies only extend 10 years and no long-term studies-lasting 30-40 years-- have been done. These studies are critical in determining how safe e-cigarettes are.

E-cigarettes have about a tenth of the carcinogens that regular cigarettes have. However, most of what is inhaled from e-cigarettes is inadequately studied. Devices that have a five-volt battery (or more) release agents that break down into formaldehyde. The heating element itself releases minute amounts of heavy metals, like aluminum. The base carrier in the cartridge is mostly propylene glycol. These substances are aerosolized and inhaled very deeply into the bronchial tree. No one knows what effect they will have in the long term. Most of the flavorings, while "food grade" have never been tested as inhaled substances. Food grade products are safe to eat, but not necessarily to inhale! Already some flavorings have been found in early testing to be toxic to lung cells in lab animals.

Are there known risks to e-cigarettes? Yes! One teaspoon of nicotine from a cartridge can be fatal to a three year old. Each refill container holds between two and six teaspoons of nicotine. Considering that kid-pleasing flavorings might attract an interested toddler, it is very important to safely store the cartridges and refill bottles. The FDA took on the oversight of e-cigarette products in August, and it just started requiring childproof caps. Companies have until 2018 to comply.

So, what is the bottom line? E-cigarettes and vaping devices are possibly safer than traditional cigarettes, but not yet consid-

ered safe. Long-term studies are critical in determining their effect on the lungs. There is no proof that they help people quit smoking, and they may be a gateway to regular cigarettes in youth. So... the jury is out.... What will the verdict be? For me, I would like to see more facts. Next month: Hookah Smoking.

DeKalb County Issues Water Disconnection Moratorium

As we near an important American holiday where we reflect on what we're thankful for... I'd like to say I'm very thankful to live in the good 'ole USA – and the wonderful Smoke Rise community to boot. I'm also thankful we have government and county services that I often take for granted.

For example, when I turn on my sink, I have clean, fresh water.

However, some residents in the county are noticing water bills higher than average or may suspect there is a problem with their water meter. The county has acknowledged several factors may be creating these discrepancies; including a misread meter, irrigation, double-cycle billing, a leak, a water meter malfunction, a billing error, a water rate increase and seasonal usage. Because of these factors, the county has issued an official water disconnection moratorium – meaning no water disconnections will be made through the end of the year – as long as the customer formally disputes the bill, and continues to pay the average bill (from the prior 12 months or six cycles of usage) until the dispute is resolved.

If you notice a higher-than-average bill or think you have a water meter issue, you may contact the Utility Customer Operations unit with DeKalb County government to dispute your water bill. Call (404) 371-3000, Monday through Friday, 7:00 a.m. to 7 p.m. Or, visit 774 Jordan Lane, Suite 200, Decatur, Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. You may also send email to: dekalbwaterbillingfn@dekalbcountyga.gov.

That contact will start the dispute process and allow the Customer Assurance team to transfer the dispute to a technician to inspect the meter. (The cost for a field technician visit has been waived during the moratorium.) Following the technician's investigation, a report will be returned to Customer Assurance where the customer's bill may be adjusted as necessary to resolve the dispute. If the issue is not resolved, the dispute will be reviewed by a third party who will make a final decision.

The customer should disregard any disconnection notices received, as long as the dispute process has begun and an average bill is paid. While your account is under dispute, and you pay the average bill amount, your water will not be disconnected.

Some additional ways the county is helping people with a water bill dispute; adding more personnel to better manage disputed cases, empowering the finance director to use discretion in addressing unusually high bills due to billing or meter errors, suspending the installation of the new iPerl "smart" meter until a more thorough review of mechanical issues is complete, expanding access to water billing representatives in the community, and removing timeline restrictions on resolving disputes.

Meanwhile, we can all be thankful the Department of Watershed Management (DWM) provides its customers with high quality, safe, drinking water that surpasses the U.S.

Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the Georgia Environmental Protection Division (EPD) requirements.

DeKalb County's water supply is located on the Chattahoochee River, which is north of DeKalb County. Water is treated at the Scott Candler Water Treatment Plant and then distributed to DeKalb County customers.

Every three years, the EPD runs the analysis of the county's water in a certified laboratory to assure an extra level of protection and compliance by its independent analysis. In 2015, the Georgia EPD Lab ran 50 water samples county-wide and DeKalb County was found to meet or exceed the Federal compliance lead levels.

Now, that's something to drink to!



HODGE PODGE

I decided to make caramel last week. I love caramel for fall, and I picked the perfect dry, clear day. I used a perfect pan, perfect thermometer and even used real perfect expensive butter. I chose a recipe from a frou-frou ta-ta cooking magazine that I can't seem to unsubscribe to. They promised this was the perfect caramel recipe which would cut beautifully. I bought all this cream and stuff and decided to get started! What could possibly go wrong? Well, what could go wrong was that my stove top is one of those black, smooth top convection inventions from hades that cycle on and off. You need a degree in thermodynamics, metallurgy and the wisdom of an atomic clock. It reached the perfect temperature, and all I got was a lovely pan of caramel Polident®. And I had decided, in a fit of misguided neatness, to line my pan with buttered waxed paper so I could lift it out for easy cutting. What I got was a pan of thick caramel flavored Polident® roll-ups. I had to pull it off the paper in globs and roll the thick mass into about a thousand balls to freeze - so I could later on hand-dip them in chocolate for lovely holiday gifts. In your dreams. They will stay in the freezer until I forget what they are and toss them, thinking they are tiny meatballs or something. So I'm giving you EASY caramel recipes for fall that really work and won't destroy your kitchen or sanity. Well, at least your kitchen. I have no control over your sanity. Or mine apparently.

Lovely Caramel Frosting made with Kraft® caramels

Barbara made this for the Yellow Daisy Festival and got rave reviews! Perfect for your favorite 9x13 baked cake like spice, chocolate, etc. You'll need 28—32 unwrapped caramels. I used 30.

2 cups sugar, 2/3 cup milk and 1 stick butter.

Mix and cook over medium high heat to soft ball stage, stirring fairly often. Add the unwrapped caramels and stir like crazy until mixture is completely smooth. The longer you stir, the thicker it gets, so it's up to you. I stirred it for about 5 minutes and it became more opaque. Not thick enough to spread exactly, but thick enough to make a lovely coating on a nice chocolate cake.

And, this is probably going to create a stir, but pumpkin is not actually my favorite flavor. I'd rather have a sweet potato pie anytime, and this sweet potato pound cake is wonderful. I've added a glaze too and you can drizzle it over the cake or use it to drizzle over the cake and ice cream later on...I'd add toasted pecans for sure in that case!

Sweet Potato Pound Cake with Maple Glaze

2 cups of mashed, cold sweet potatoes (canned is fine, but drain well and beat it with a mixer before using, so you get out those "strings")

1 cup butter

2 cups sugar

1 teaspoon vanilla

1/2 teaspoon maple flavoring

4 large eggs

3 cups plain flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon soda, 1 teaspoon cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon EACH of nutmeg, allspice and salt

Preheat oven to 325°. Cream the butter, sugar and sweet potatoes well. Add in the extracts. Mix the dry ingredients together. With a mixer, add eggs, one at a time, alternately with the dry flour mixture, beating well after each addition. Spread into well-greased 10" tube pan and bake at 325° for 1 hour. Cool 5 minutes, loosen sides and invert on wire rack to cool completely. If you want to cheat a bit, while the cake is still warm, spread about half a carton of canned caramel frosting on it, letting it drip down sides. Or make this:

Maple Glaze

1 cup heavy cream mixed with 3/4 cup real maple syrup. Bring to a boil in a sauce pan and continue to boil, stirring once in a while, until thickened a bit. This takes about 15 minutes. Drizzle over the cooled cake or ice cream and cake. Sprinkle with toasted pecans if desired.

This would be a fun treat the kids can make for Thanksgiving!

Caramel Turkey Drumsticks

20 braided honey pretzel sticks

40 unwrapped caramels

chocolate coating for dipping

Soften the caramels in the microwave or in your warm hands. Mold two in an oval shape and shape it around half of a stick to resemble a drumstick. Make 20 and then melt about 1 cup of milk chocolate candy coating in a heat proof cup. Dip the caramel end in and shake off excess. Place on waxed paper to set up.
