PASTOR'S MESSAGE Pastor Allegra Hoots

Greetings to you in the mighty and wonderful name of the Lord Jesus Christ, our blessed Redeemer. I hope this letter finds you in good health and basking in the joy of the Lord – the source of our strength.

This lengthy letter updates you on how United Presbyterian Church (UPC) continues working with other organizations and individuals outside our congregation to supply relief and comfort to those in need, supply services to youth, and help fund our religious education program.

The longtime ministry started by Reverend Dorothy (Dottie) Morris to AristaCare at Norwood Terrace is still vibrant and expanding. Each week, UPC leads a well-attended worship service in the facility's dining room. Most regular worshipers fully engage in the service by singing the hymns familiar to them, listening to Scripture reading, and sharing their testimonies and thoughts about ways to remain positive and do good where they are. At times, the residents' singing sounds like a small well-rehearsed choir. Recently UPC added a book reading segment to our AristaCare ministry.

The UPC congregation's latest overseas mission focused on getting clothing to Haitians affected by the massive earthquake that shook part of the nation on August 14. Shortly after the quake, Mr. Darius Butherede, a UPC member and local restaurateur, asked the congregation to collect clothing for the earthquake victims.

Answering Darius's request, Davaughn Hoots (UPC system administrator) coordinated a charitable drive between UPC, AristaCare, and Darius Grill, Grill, Grill restaurant. That partnership resulted in AristaCare staff donating over two hundred pounds of new and gently used clothing, shoes, and toys. Mr. Charles Rivers, the UPC custodian transported the goods to Darius' restaurant, where the gifts will be repacked and moved for shipment by boat.

UPC also served as a conduit in getting more than thirty pounds of nonperishable food to Haiti. The person and organization who donated the food wish to remain anonymous. A young Haitian American couple picked the food up from United and transported it to a shipping port for delivery to Haiti. The couple also paid the shipping cost.

Mr. Christopher York developed a college readiness program for UPC. Then Christopher and Davaughn conducted the hybrid workshops on five consecutive Saturdays in July and August. The UPC college readiness program is another example of how our congregation partners with people to supply meaningful services to our community. The second series of college readiness workshops begin on October 16.

The collective efforts of the people and organizations highlighted in this month's newsletter prove good happens when people lend their talents and combine resources to make a positive difference. The activities also show UPC's commitment to missions.



Under the guidance of the Holy Spirit and following the motto "teamwork makes the dream work," United Presbyterian Church partners with people and organizations that share our values to make the world better by working cooperatively and collaborating on projects to alleviate suffering and improve people's lives in the United States and overseas.

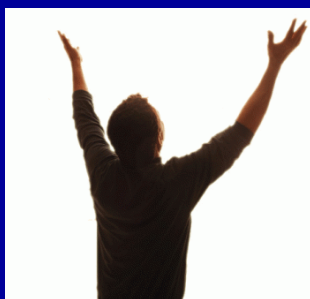

World Food Day is an annual international holiday observed on **October 16**. It is a United Nations holiday that aims to raise awareness about food supply and distribution issues around the world. The United Nations recognizes food as a fundamental human right, and this day helps in the constant fight to end world hunger. The food supply chain is not well balanced at the moment, and many people in first world countries tend to overindulge in food instead of eating sustainably and mindfully. World Food Day also teaches people how to eat better.

On World Food Day there are many events organized around the globe. The main event happens in Rome, Italy, at the headquarters of the Food and Agriculture Organization, where several international organizations gather to discuss issues regarding food supplies. On a smaller scale, many organizations in different world cities put together talks, conferences, workshops, and exhibitions that focus on food supplies, distribution, and the issue of world hunger. There are also fundraisers in support of agriculture, and small farmers in local communities.

Many people also choose this day to donate to food banks and help inside their own community.

Presbyterians celebrate the tradition that grounds their faith on Reformation Sunday. It is always the last Sunday in October, marking the occasion in 1517 when Martin Luther posted his 95 theses on the church door in Wittenberg,

Up until 1521 it was relatively safe to show an interest in the writings and teachings of Martin Luther. Then, the Edict of Worms officially declared him a heretic. This year's church bulletin insert explores the 500 year-old decree that made Luther a heretic and an outlaw.

The decree "forbid anyone from this time forward to dare, either by words or by deeds, to receive, defend, sustain, or favor the said Martin Luther." The Edict declared Luther to be an obstinate heretic and banned the reading or possession of his writings. It further called for his capture.

Luther escaped to safety at the Wartburg Castle under the protection of Frederick the Wise, Elector of Saxony, where he proceeded to translate the New Testament into German. Luther had become a prolific writer, fully embracing the new technology of the printing press to widely disseminate his teachings. Attempts to carry out the Edict were largely unsuccessful and the movement for Reform swept across much of Northern Europe, forever changing the face of Christianity.

October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month

In every congregation of every faith, victims, survivors and abusers sit in our pews. Some are listening for words of recognition, understanding, comfort and healing, hoping to hear that the church stands with them and wants them to choose life. All need to hear a clear message that violence in our homes is against the will of God. Our silence makes us complicit to the suffering.

Presbyterians Against Domestic Violence Network (PADVN) invites you to make your church a place where the gospel of wholeness is heard and lived out.

PADVN Theological Statement:

It is not enemies who taunt me—I could bear that; it is not adversaries who deal Insolently with me—I could hide from them.

But it is you, my equal, my companion, my familiar friend, with whom I kept pleasant Company; we walked in the house of God with the throng. (Psalm 55:12-14)

Violence is contrary to God's intentions for the world. This reality demands the response of the church in these days of increasing danger to vulnerable peoples—children, youth, women, disabled and the elderly. Interpreting biblical teachings and responding to the leadership of Jesus Christ in our lives calls the church to a pastoral and moral response through an active program of advocacy and resourcing for transformation.

Reach out to the Pastor, Elders or someone you trust for help. We can't help if we don't know.

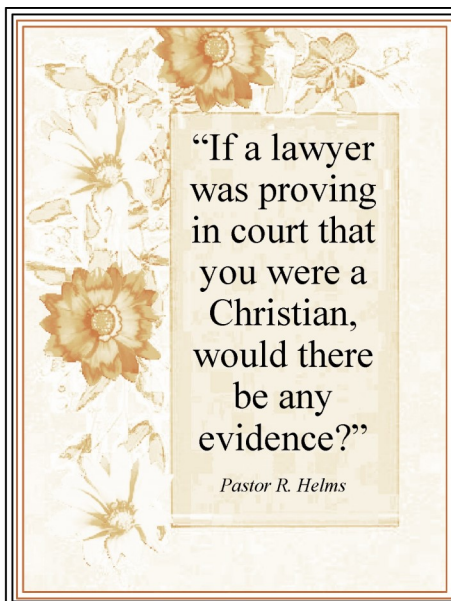

World Communion Sunday

“All who eat and drink without discerning the body, eat and drink judgment against themselves.” (I Cor. 11:29)

The first Sunday in October is designated as World Communion Sunday, which celebrates our oneness in Christ with all our brothers and sisters around the world. Paul tells us that we are to “discern the body” when we partake of Holy Communion, mindful that we note our relationship to all our brothers and sisters in Christ in the celebration. One is not to go hungry while another is drunk! (I Cor. 11:21). This is scandalous behavior opposed to the Way of Christ. Thus it is appropriate that World Communion Sunday is also a time when we receive the annual [Peace and Global Witness Offering](#) as a way of continuing the ancient Christian practice of sharing what we have with brothers and sisters in need.

National Hispanic Heritage Month

Each year, Americans observe National Hispanic Heritage Month from September 15 to October 15, by celebrating the histories, cultures and contributions of American citizens whose ancestors came from Spain, Mexico, the Caribbean and Central and South America.

The observation started in 1968 as Hispanic Heritage Week under President Lyndon Johnson and was expanded by President Ronald Reagan in 1988 to cover a 30-day period starting on September 15 and ending on October 15. It was enacted into law on August 17, 1988, on the approval of Public Law 100-402.

The day of September 15 is significant because it is the anniversary of independence for Latin American countries Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua. In addition, Mexico and Chile celebrate their independence days on September 16 and September 18, respectively. Also, Columbus Day or Día de la Raza, which is October 12, falls within this 30 day period.

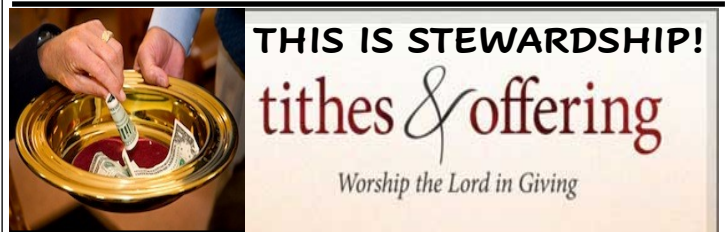

COLUMBUS DAY

Monday, October 11, 2021

Columbus Day is a U.S. holiday that commemorates the landing of Christopher Columbus in the Americas in 1492. It was unofficially celebrated in some cities and states as early as the 18th century, but became a federal holiday 1937. For many, the holiday is a way of both honoring Columbus' achievements and celebrating Italian-American heritage. But throughout its history, Columbus Day and the man who inspired it have generated controversy, and many alternatives to the holiday have proposed since the 1970s including Indigenous Peoples' Day, now celebrated in several U.S. states.

Christopher Columbus was an Italian-born explorer who set sail in August 1492, bound for Asia with backing from the Spanish monarchs King Ferdinand and Queen Isabella aboard the ships the Nina, the Pinta and the Santa Maria. Columbus intended to chart a western sea route to China, India and the fabled gold and spice islands of Asia. Instead, on October 12, 1492, he landed in the Bahamas, becoming the first European to explore the Americas since the Vikings established colonies in Greenland and Newfoundland during the 10th century. It wasn't until his third journey that Columbus finally realized he hadn't reached Asia but instead had stumbled upon a continent previously unknown to Europeans.

Most educated Europeans in Columbus' day understood that the world was round and did not yet know that the Pacific Ocean existed. As a result, Columbus and his contemporaries assumed that only the Atlantic lay between Europe and the riches of the East Indies. Later that October, Columbus sighted Cuba and believed it was mainland China; in December the expedition found Hispaniola (now Haiti and Dominican Republic), which he thought might be Japan. There, he established Spain's first colony in the Americas with 39 of his men.

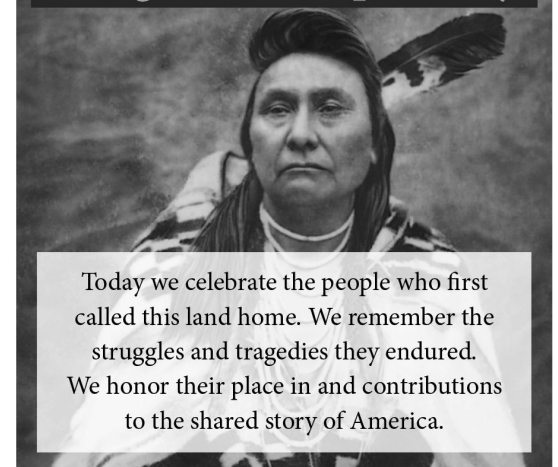
In March 1493, Columbus returned to Spain in triumph, bearing gold, spices and "Indian" captives. The explorer crossed the Atlantic several more times before his death in 1506.

Controversy over Columbus Day dates back to the 19th century, when anti-immigrant groups in the United States rejected the holiday because of its association with Catholicism. In recent decades, Native Americans and other groups have protested the celebration of an event that resulted in the colonization of the Americas, the beginnings of the transatlantic slave trade and the deaths of millions from murder and disease. European settlers brought a host of infectious diseases, including smallpox and influenza that decimated indigenous populations. Warfare between Native Americans and European colonists claimed many lives as well.

Indigenous Peoples' Day: The image of Christopher Columbus as an intrepid hero has also been called into question. Upon arriving in the Bahamas, the explorer and his men forced the native peoples they found there into slavery. Later, while serving as the governor of Hispaniola, he allegedly imposed barbaric forms of punishment, including torture.

In many Latin American nations, the anniversary of Columbus' landing has traditionally been observed as the Día de la Raza ("Day of the Race"), a celebration of Hispanic culture's diverse roots. In 2002, Venezuela renamed the holiday Día de la Resistencia Indígena ("Day of Indigenous Resistance") to recognize native peoples and their experience. Several U.S. cities and states have replaced Columbus Day with alternative days of remembrance. States including Alaska, Hawaii and Oregon commemorate Indigenous Peoples' Day, as well as cities like Denver, Phoenix and Los Angeles.

CHILDREN'S CORNER

Parents, please read this to your younger child(ren)

The God of the Impossible

Theme: With God, all things are possible.

Object: An old sock, a sewing needle, and yarn

Scripture: Mark 10:17-31

Have you ever gotten dressed in the morning only to discover your sock has a hole? I've been there. (Show the sock). Today, I thought we could mend this sock together. I brought these to help me. (Show the needle and yarn.)

First, I'll thread the needle. That means you hold the needle like this and push the thread through this little hole called the "eye." (Show the eye.) This could be difficult. Do you think I can do it? (Attempt to thread the yarn, and make a show of it. Ask for help, and let a couple children try.)

You know, this problem of threading the needle reminds me of something that happened with Jesus. One day, a rich young man came to Jesus and asked what he needed to do in order to go to heaven. Jesus answered him, "You know the commandments: 'Do not murder, do not commit adultery, do not steal, do not lie, do not cheat, honor your father and mother.' "

Well, the young man said he'd followed all the commandments since he was young. How many of us have never, ever, ever broken a commandment, even a little bit? (Pause for responses.) Then Jesus told him there was one more thing he needed to do: "Sell all you have and give the money to the poor," Jesus said.

The young man was very disappointed. He turned and walked away because he was very wealthy, and he wasn't willing to give up his wealth and belongings -- not even to go to heaven. Then Jesus turned to his disciples and said, "It is easier for a camel to pass through the eye of a needle than it is for a rich man to enter into the kingdom of heaven." Now, putting thread through the eye of the needle can be pretty difficult. How would you like to try to put a camel through the eye of a needle? (Pause and hold up the needle again.) That seems impossible, doesn't it?

Does that mean Jesus was saying it is impossible for a rich man to enter into heaven? I don't think so, because next, Jesus said, "With man this is impossible, but not with God. With God, all things are possible." That is the God we serve. The God of the impossible!

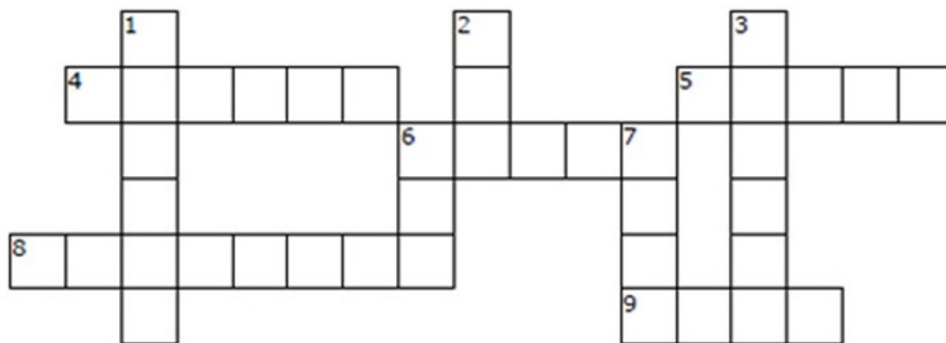
Heavenly Father, we are thankful that You are the God of the impossible. Without You, it would be impossible for any of us to get to heaven. In Jesus' name, amen.
