t is an honor and privilege to be joining the Holy Trinity family as Priest-in-Charge. I am sure you may feel the same way. Yet, God is predictable and is in the middle of our lives offering us new beginnings and opportunities as long as we stay open to the Holy Spirit.

So, as we begin this new chapter in Holy Trinity's life, let us live joyfully into our faith community, keeping our eyes on Christ and being open to the ministry before us!

During his time in the Diocese of East Carolina Ron has served on many committees and boards, including Standing Committee, Deputy to General Convention, Diocesan Trustee and Executive Council. In 1999 Ron accepted the call to serve as rector of St James Parish in Wilmington where he served until his retirement in March of 2019. During this time Ron served on several community boards as well as national church committees. Ron and Kathleen's family has expanded over the years. Kyle is married to Laura and they have two children, Oliver and Rowan. Kyle is the Assistant Director of Good Shepherd Center in Wilmington. Ryan is married to Lindsay and they live in Falls Church, VA, where Ryan is a High School teacher and golf coach.

Stewardship: Give Cheerfully


St. Paul wrote to the Church of Christ in Corinth: *"Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver"* (2 Cor 9:7). *God loves a cheerful giver.* But who is a cheerful giver?

Abel was. By faith, Abel gave the firstborn of his flock, and it was acceptable in God's sight.

Abraham was. By faith, Abraham prepared cakes and a tender choice calf for God and entertained angels unaware.

So also were **David** and **Solomon**. By faith, David would not make a sacrifice to God that cost him nothing, so he paid Araunah his due. By faith, Solomon built a house for God, where his name would dwell and thereby where He would dwell to be Israel's God and they His people.

What more shall I say? For time would fail me to tell of all those who gave not simply for the joy of giving but for the joy of knowing the One to whom they gave.



So also, our Lord, who for the joy set before Him, gave everything, yes, even His life, enduring the cross and scorning its shame. He gave to the shedding of His blood, willingly and resolutely setting His face toward Jerusalem to die for the life of the world.

Though He was rich in every way, He became poor, so that by His poverty we might be rich beyond measure.

So then, let us – like Abel and Abraham, like David and Solomon, and even like our Lord Jesus Christ – give cheerfully to God for the work of His kingdom in our midst. Like them, let us decide in our heart – for the joy set before us – the joy of knowing the One to whom we give is the One who gives us all good things. S

News & Notes from Outreach

t's difficult to believe that we are already looking at the holiday season from a planning standpoint! Thanksgiving and Christmas are Holy Trinity's opportunities to help our local families and seniors in a meaningful way. Our parish has always taken a personal approach to our contacts with the families we aid, getting to know them by name and circumstance, seeking to understand the unique needs of each recipient.

We will be able to assist 3 families with 8 children and 2 seniors who live alone at Thanksgiving by providing food collected by our congregation in conjunction with donations which have been deposited in our Holiday Baskets Fund and budgeted Outreach Ministry funds. A gift from Holy Trinity ECW will also extend our aid.



Want to help? We need food that would provide families with a scrumptious Thanksgiving Day meal as well as providing extras to cover meals following Thanksgiving during the days that children are not attending school. You will see **Tom Turkey** on the Outreach

Bulletin Board in the narthex. He is adorned with feathers naming a food needed for our collection...pick a few feathers, Tom won't mind, and take them with you when you food shop. Return the feathers and food to the area under the bulletin board. We will distribute boxes of food to our families on **Saturday**, **November 23**.

Holy Trinity also helps the larger community holiday effort, **CHAP** (**C**ommunity Holiday Assistance **P**rogram), an organization of volunteers from churches, civic groups, schools and businesses. In 2018, they gave out 700 food boxes at Thanksgiving. This year, along with volunteer opportunities to help this group, we will donate \$25 grocery cards to their cause.

There is a Christmas component of the Holiday Baskets Project... remember the **Angel Tree**! The Angel Tree will be up by November 26. By taking angels from the tree and purchasing the



items on the Angel, you will be providing 8 children in our assigned families with clothing and toys. Our seniors will also receive a small gift and all families will receive food boxes.

Thank you for supporting our Holiday Baskets Program again this year. Monetary donations can be made to Holy Trinity Episcopal Church, with the memo line "Holiday Baskets" on the check.



Some suggestions for your Cleaning are:


- Empty each shelf.
