HERE WE ARE AGAIN...at that time of year when we are supposed to be thankful for all the blessings we've been given. First comes Thanksgiving, which is really a national holiday, but

we have transformed it into a religious observance by holding services on Thanksgiving Eve and by making sure that all depictions of Thanksgiving Dinner include scenes of the family gathered with bowed heads around a table heaped with the bounties of the earth. The implication is obvious: God is responsible both for meeting our needs and for holding us together as families.

Thanksgiving is immediately followed by all the material trappings of the Christmas Season as corporations that provide those trappings become almost ravenous in their insatiable lust for the almighty consumer dollar. In God We Trust, but on Black Friday, We Lust.

Black Friday is so named because in the 1960's the streets of Philadelphia became so congested with shoppers on the day after Thanksgiving that the sidewalks and streets would vanish from view and chaos would reign. Originally, of course, Black Friday was the day we commemorated our Savior's horrific death on a cross. That day was also called "Good Friday" because from the beginning the word "good" also meant holy or pious.

The season of thankfulness that started with humble prayers of thanksgiving and culminated in the unselfish gift of the birth of our savior has been reduced to a season of raucous binge eating and "I better get what I asked for" present opening. Black Friday has become more about purchasing luxury items for ourselves we've been lusting after all year than about finding heart-felt gifts for those we love in honor of the ultimate gift of love we've received from our Lord.

As one who is as guilty as anyone of putting my focus on the wrong things at this time of year, all I'm suggesting is that instead of starting Christmas with the day after Thanksgiving, we try to restore the connection between Thanksgiving Eve and Christmas Eve.

For the ten years I've been back in Findlay, Christmas has always started for me with a group of us taking some of the First Lutheran children Christmas caroling at Birchaven and Primrose (on December 3 this year) and with Pastor Mike Thompson giving me a CD copy of his Christmas program, which I play in my car all through the holiday season. This year, I'm going to start a little earlier: at the community Thanksgiving service at Trinity Lutheran (7 p.m.) because saying "Thank you" is the reason for the season.



Stewarding the **Christmas Story**

"In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor Syria." Luke 2:1-2 (NRSV)

So, how do you hear this story this vear?

As Christians we live in these days of Advent in a sense of "both -- and." We celebrate Christmas as an event that took place 2000 years ago that also takes place again, here and now, in our lives today. We hear once again this Good News of Great Joy -- that to us is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord.

For most of us when we hear the word "stewardship" we think of our money, our possessions, our time, or our particular talents. And all of that is certainly true. I am very aware that in the midst of all the things on our lists to do this Christmas season it is easy to overlook this area of our stewardship. We are busy -- often too busy -- to even hear the angel's message to the shepherds in that field outside of Bethlehem. So my prayer for you is that you can make the space in all of the busy-ness, to receive this blessing of Good News -- and to steward this gift -- for you and for all the people -- "that to us is born in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord."- Scott Jacob

Shaving God's Gifts



ur spotlight for December is on our congregation's Social Ministry Committee and all the work they do providing ministry for community needs. This month we look at the many ways we seek to serve those outside of our congregation, in the immediate vicinity of our church, agencies, special needs and drives, and ministries that follow the biblical mandate: "Do not neglect to do good and to share what you have, for such sacrifices are pleasing to God." (Hebrews 13:16)



Carolyn Bryant has been a member of First Lutheran since 1971 and has served on the Social Ministry Committee for many years. She is currently the Committee Chair.

Briefly describe the work of the congregation's Social Ministry

The Social Ministry committee has the opportunity to bring social awareness such as World Hunger, human trafficking, drug abuse, injustices and any items we think are important for the congregation to know. We try to be aware of needs both locally, nationally, and worldwide.

What are some of the local projects and ministries that the Committee has been

Areas or agencies locally that the congregation has helped include: Stuff the Bus, Coats for Christmas, Clothe-A-Child, Habitat Build, LSS, Food Boxes for distribution at the Community Dinner, The Daughter Project, Komen Race, Glow Run, Bake Sale, distribution of meat from Chipotle to agencies in Findlay, Riehm Farm produce for community dinner guests or members of congregation and City Mission, CHOPIN Hall, Open Arms, Salvation Army and the Learning Center near the high school. We have helped Lincoln School in their school lunch program, collected Box Tops for them to use and have recently purchased items for Purses with a Purpose. [We also support global ministries including Baby, School and Fabric kits to send to Lutheran World Relief; we have offered Fair Trade coffee and chocolate for sale and have delivered food supplies to areas affected by hurricane disasters.]

How are all of these projects funded?

In 2017, the congregation budgeted \$750 for LSS, \$900 for City Mission, and \$1500 each for Hancock Christian Clearing House and CHOPIN Hall. Most of our funds come from generous special gifts (of money and other gifts) from members and friends. We have asked for donations from the congregation of useful items and also have approached the Endowment Committee for monetary needs.

It is a busy committee and we would encourage anyone to join us or take time to volunteer at any of the local agencies. These agencies are always in need of volunteers to help in various ways. It only takes a few hours per month or as many as a person wants to give. We try to do God's Work with Our Hands and a willing heart.

Where does our money go? Each month the Stewardship Committee will highlight a ministry of the Church: congregational, local, national, and global. We will get a glimpse of how our offerings are being put to work.

The Church Library

You can cope with poor health - try living one day at a time without any unhealthy thoughts. Make it a habit.

6. Solve your money problems with his seven suggestions. 7. Trying to cope with discouragement? Get a philosophy of life. Trouble is here. It is for a purpose. Feel God's restoration of your soul bringing you to a place where he gives you serenity, peace, and powerful control. 8. Tired of coping with loss, sorrow and grief? What a marvelous chapter of suggestions given here. My favorite prescription is this: "Go to your room, put on your hat, go out and do something for someone. Repeat ten times," 9. Feeling defeated? The Bible says, "I have the strength to face all conditions by the power that Christ gives me." 10. Are you a worrier? Get with Jesus! "Fear thou not; for I am with thee..." That is the way to deal with worry and to defeat it.

Fifty-eight powerful pages. Well worth reading. Currently on the book cart. I thoroughly enjoyed reading this small text and learned more than I could absorb in one sitting.


