Words from Our Pastor

Dear Trinity Church Family,

have been very disturbed by the events of this past month as I suspect most of you have been.

Just when we were hoping the COVID-19 quarantine was ending and we could start to resume some kind of normalcy again, we witnessed the brutal killing of George Floyd by a police officer in Minneapolis. A firestorm of protesting, rioting, and looting spread across the nation. The events in our cities appeared to be organized, or perhaps infiltrated, by people

who cared less about effecting positive change than they did about sowing chaos in our communities. In the quiet town of La Mesa, two banks were set on fire and destroyed. I have heard that some of you were directly impacted by this senseless act of vandalism.

I wish I had a response which could turn things around in this country, but we continue to be in a season of great unrest. Like you, I don't know how things will be resolved. Different people and groups are proposing different ideas and agendas. Some are calling for police reform, and others are calling for the elimination of the police.

All of the pastors I am in touch with are talking about how churches can respond. The Presbytery of San Diego hosted a gathering for pastors to pray for our nation. Pastor Miles McPherson called San Diego to join in prayer on Saturday, June 20th. To me, most people wish we could do more to move our country toward harmony, prosperity, justice, and peace for all races and nations. Some people believe God is calling them to protest. Others believe God is calling them to prayer. Some people are doing both. And some people are doing neither.

When I first felt God calling me to the ministry, I was a student at the University of California San Diego studying Economics. In one class, I had to read a book about the race riots in Detroit, Michigan. The accounts of violence broke my heart. I found myself quietly weeping in the basement of the library on one memorable evening. The next morning, I rode my bicycle along Torrey Pines down to the edge of the ocean. I stood praying in that beautiful place and felt God's call to use my life in a way that would bring unity between people and

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between God and humankind. It was an important time in the discernment of my call to be a pastor.

At that time, I really wanted to do big things to change the world. I wanted to end poverty and war. I wanted to end racism. I wanted to end child abuse and divorce. I wanted to end suffering wherever it was happening.

I wanted to change the world in the way that I felt Jesus Christ had changed me. I firmly believed that if people came to know Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior, they would leave behind hatred, bigotry, greed, cruelty, and selfishness. They would devote themselves to loving and serving others rather than exploiting or abusing them. I was very idealistic about the transforming power of the gospel. I believed that God would move in mighty ways to renew

I still believe all of this is true. I believe that Jesus Christ changes lives and transforms hearts. I've also come to see the darkness in the world. These are "the cosmic powers over this present darkness" that the Apostle Paul mentions in his writings (Ephesians 6:12). These forces of darkness are powerful and destructive for the whole human community. I also learned that even when people trust in Jesus Christ, they don't automatically get cured from all sin. We all still struggle and need God's grace every day.

is tiny, but it grows. I have become more attentive to the small ways God works, in simple deeds of kindness, love, mercy, and grace he does through people of all skin colors in all communities all over this world. I like this quote from Mother Teresa, "Not all of us can do great things. But we can do small things with great love."



Some of the pastors led by Martin Niemoeller and Dietrich Bonhoeffer approved the Barman Declaration in 1934.

In 1934, a few hundred German pastors wrote and signed the Barman Declaration in response to Adolph Hitler and the "German Christian" movement that took over churches. This movement's academically elite followers believed that God was bringing a whole new revelation through the plight of the oppressed German people to usher in a new kingdom based upon German nationalism. The Barman Declaration declared that "Jesus Christ as he is attested to us and Holy Scripture is the One Word of God whom we must hear and obey."

Later, the Presbyterian Church included this document in the Book of Confessions so the church will always be careful of joining too closely with any political movement. We have seen through history that when churches get into bed with political systems, these systems tend to eclipse the

purity of the gospel. God can work through political movements, but the Barman Declaration brings a word of caution to churches who want to give their blessing to political ideologies which may, or may not, reflect the kingdom of Jesus Christ as he is revealed in scripture.

Of course, there are people like William Wilberforce who served in the British Parliament during the late 1700's. He spent his lifetime using the political system in England to end the British slave trade. I admire and appreciate all that he achieved and the way that he accomplished it. However, those opportunities for BIG change are few. People with Wilberforce's amazing ability are uncommon. Most of us just have two hands to help, two ears to hear, two eyes to see, and one heart to love and reach out to others with the simple love of Jesus Christ as he guides and directs each of us.

As a Presbyterian minister, I don't know that I did very many great things. I hope I did some small things with great love and faith. I trust that Jesus who tends the garden, which is his kingdom, has grown those little mustard seeds into blessings that multiplied as his gospel and his love spread out to others. I have seen a lot of the same kind of love, kindness, and gospel-centered living in the people of Trinity Church. I know that this ministry continues to bless many people that you may not even know about. Unfortunately, we have not eliminated poverty, oppression, racism, greed, or violence, but I trust we have been faithful to the calling that God has given to each of us.
