Pastor's Study Desk Notes



Dear St Anthony & St Pius Families,

17th Sunday Ordinary Time Year A

Matthew 13:44-52

"I've caught the big one!" How many times as a kid fishing with friends, I might have yelled that, only to lift my line up out of the water & discover a stick, a chunk of plastic or some green algae-looking clump of underwater plants dangling from the line! Not any significant catch at all! Or I remember my uncle telling us kids as we fished along the Ohio riverbank after we got so excited, reeling in and lifting up an alligator-gar fish, he would say, "Bring that here, we cut the line on those and throw them up the bank to die!" Those are my versions of 'sorting out' the bad from the good in a catch. The last parable in our gospel today tells about some fishermen who pull in a net filled with various fish 'of every kind'. The net is hauled in and the fishermen sit down and take time to sort through the catch, separating out the keepers from the 'throwbacks'. This parable of a sorting-through a 'catch-all' net is the third in a set of three parables today that speak about searching and finding, or fishing and separating what is to be kept from what is to be left behind. All three parables teach us the important lesson of being discerning or wise about distinguishing differences between good and bad.

'Discernment' ('knowing differences') is a wonderful word to be familiar with, as likely we engage in it all the time, whether we are aware of it or not. For example, when determining which route to take after Google-maps gives several options, or which coffeemaker to buy when Amazon throws five products at you that look alike but vary so much in cost, or whether to call back a salesperson who keeps adjusting product details on you; in all these cases, a person must be discerning about what is really being compared or offered? All of these situations require a closer examination of differences to determine what is best and right to decide! Discernment involves the separating or teasing out of distinctions, considering variables individually and then piecing back together true equivalents to make the best judgement. Discernment is a common element in the three parables that Jesus teaches today. All three involve someone who is very experienced in their field of work. The first tells of a treasure hunter who would not only know treasures, but also 'land' and excavation work. The second parable tells about a gemologist that knows his pearls and can pick out the truly best. And the third parable tells of experienced fishermen who know both the best tasting fish and the current market as to what fish are in demand. All three stories encourage wise judgements based on long experience familiar with what is being examined. Jesus says that all of these parables teach us about the Kingdom of God. I'd say, the question of our getting to the Kingdom and whether we are allowed into it, come down to our proper discernment of reality, living and interacting with everyone and God until that day comes around.

Many scripture verses tell us what to do in an obvious way such as 2 Peter 3:11, "Turn from evil and do good". But then we often ask, "After the obvious commandments, how do we identify the good and evil?" Well, that is discernment! 1Thessalonians 5:21 advises us to, "Test everything; retain what is good." 1 John 4:1 cautions us, "Do not trust every spirit but test the spirits to see whether they belong to God" And Hebrews 5:14 commends "those whose faculties are *trained by practice*, to discern good and evil", while Romans 12:2 counsels us always to "discern what is the will of God, what is good and pleasing and perfect." I find Jesus to wonderfully summarize all good discernment as a matter of discovering signs of fruit or not, when He taught, "by their fruits you will know them" (Matthew 7:20) & "wisdom is vindicated by her deeds" (Matthew 11:19). That is discernment: act-ualization and fruit!

I have to include this curious note about Matthew the Evangelist! Some people theorize that Matthew is describing his own activity as a gospel writer or what he aspires to be in writing (good scribe!) when he states this in Matthew 13:52 "Jesus replied "Every scribe who has been instructed in the kingdom of heaven is like the head of a household who brings from his storeroom **both the new and the old."** Consider for a minute that the Gospel of Matthew stands on the threshold of the New Testament. As the first book in the New Testament, he serves as the perfect bridge or hinge between the Old Testament and the New Testament. He knows what to bring forward helpfully from the Old Testament and what in the New Testament wonderfully illuminates the Old Testament. Just because something is old, that does not make that thing a valuable antique to preserve, and just because something is new, that doesn't make that thing automatically better! As a scribe trained in the Kingdom of God, is Matthew hinting that he knows best how to weave together both the New and the Old (guided by the Holy Spirit, of course!)? Like a great architectural designer, it takes experience and wisdom to best renovate and incorporate elements of previous construction into the new design. Done well, it preserves both the new and the old, going forward yet solidly founded. As an interesting defense of this theory, it is true that of all the four gospels, Matthew has **the most number** of Old Testament quotes and references to the Old Testament. Who could count best, but a tax collector? Sounds like Matthew! Peace, Fr Brian

What is Eucharistic Adoration? How do I spend a Holy Hour in Adoration?

- 1. Practice patience: When you sit down to pray do you constantly glance at your watch? It's okay! Be patient with yourself. This is your time with the Lord and He's happy to see you! Pop in to say "Hello, Jesus!" Stay one hour or stay ten minutes. We do not have to say or do anything to focus on the One who loves us so much. Just 'be' with Him
- 2. Open your heart to Jesus; Adore Him: Tell Jesus everything that's on your mind, then listen for His response.
- 3. Ask forgiveness & Intercede for others: Request a special blessing for those who have hurt you. Ask forgiveness from those you may have neglected or hurt in past. Bring all those who have asked you to pray for them before the Blessed Sacrament.
- 4. Be thankful: Thank God for all the big things in your life: your family, a great friendship or job interview. Thank Him for the small gifts of the day, too: the sun shining through the trees or even cup of tea. Nothing goes unnoticed by God.
- 5. Practice silence: We are so driven by distraction that silence can be hard, even uncomfortable, but we be come closer to Christ when we are silent. There is no place on earth where God is more present than in the human heart. The heart is truly God's great abode, the temple of silence ... The Father waits for His children there, in the silence of their own hearts.
