

Objective: Students will observe images of historical flags of the United States to identify common themes, colors, and changes over time.

## Preparation:

The poster comes in 2 sizes:

- Use the Ledger size (11x17) if you have access to a large format printer. Print it directly onto 1 sheet of ledger sized paper.
- Use the Letter size ( $8.5 \times 11$ ) if you are using a standard printer. It will require 2 sheets of paper.

1. Run the poster on tag, cover stock, or heavy white drawing paper. Set your printer to "borderless printing" if you wish. Run as many posters as necessary for how you wish to use them: 1 poster is enough if you are going to place it at a center. If you are going to use it as an assignment, run enough for small groups or partners.
2. Letter Size Poster only: Carefully trim the inside margins, and tape the poster together on the back.
3. Laminate and trim.
4. Hang on the wall or place at your center.

Uses: Students may

- Identify key visual elements of historical US flags.
- Correct their time line of flags. (See Historical Flags of the US: Task Cards.)
- Compare and contrast the images contained on the flags of differing centuries.
- Research the meanings of the colors on specific flags.
- Research the meanings of the symbols on specific flags.
- Identify themes represented by the flags.
- Choose a flag and find out more about it.
- Create a flag for an historical event.
- Write a report or news cast about an historical event represented by one of the flags.
