Dear Alan,

Here's everything about me and my aspirations from Princeton.

I am Sriyans Rauniyar, the youngest of the three children in a family of five. I was born and raised in the capital of Nepal, Kathmandu. I was always very interested in studying in the US. I had heard stories of how advanced the institutions in the US are and American life always intrigued me. I, thus, wanted to apply to the US when I was in my senior year of high school. However, finances were a major concern. Initially, when I had shared this to some of my friends, they told me costs that I simply couldn't afford at that time. The standardized tests, application fee, enrollment fee, visa costs, travel costs, it was all too overwhelming for me. Even though I badly wanted to apply to test my chances of getting accepted, I sadly couldn't even begin my process. However, I knew of a life-changing opportunity

called the "Opportunity Funds", an initiative by the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Education and Cultural Affairs to make U.S. higher education more accessible to non-elite international students from disadvantaged backgrounds and administered by the United States Educational Foundation in Nepal. The program selects 14-16 students each year and funds their entire upfront costs involved in the application process including visa and travel. The program was the only hope for me. However, after my graduation from high school, I got to know that I had missed the deadline by a week. So, I chose to take a national examination for undergrad engineering school here. I secured a very good rank and got a full scholarship in the top engineering school. However, I knew I would regret my entire life if I choose not to apply at all. I dropped the engineering school here, waited for a year, and applied for the program. Fortunately, I made it through. I was one of the 16 students selected from all over Nepal and that marked my first step towards my dream of studying in the US.

As soon as I got into the program, I was very grateful. I wanted to make the most out of the opportunity I had received. I used to spend my entire day at the USEF's library preparing for my tests, researching schools, and crafting my application. Here's a funny thing though. As I was selecting schools to apply to, Princeton was a school I never wanted to apply to. The apparent image of Princeton I had was a nerdy school with a toxic ambiance. However, two of my friends really pushed me to apply to Princeton. It's very strange that I used only the very last day of the deadline to craft my application to Princeton. However, when the results were announced, Princeton was the only ivy league I got into. The rest of the four ivies I applied to ended up waitlisting me. Apart from Princeton, I got into 8 other schools with full-rides and also became the first Nepali to receive the Brown Scholarship at Center College. The application process was a great run for me.

Fast forward to my beginning days at Princeton, The initial days were very confusing for me. Everything online made so lesser sense to me. I had never been in such circumstances. I was worried about my frosh experience at Princeton. The differences in the education system posed another challenge plus the timezone was crazy. Everything was so overwhelming. I am just thankful that Princeton let me know everything so well. From getting timely emails to the freshman website, everything helped me manage my initial days very well. The registrar thing was crazy too, I couldn't sign up for a class I so wanted to take. Eventually, I got normalized with everything though. I really loved how Princeton shapes its undergraduate experience though. From precepts to the lectures, everything is overwhelmingly interesting. The class discussions are too intriguing and taking classes ranging from arts to sciences to history just gives everything one can

seek. Academically, I am more inclined towards being a tech entrepreneur. So, I am planning to major in BSE with a degree in Computer Science while also taking certificate courses in Entrepreneurship, Data Science, and Finance. I don't know yet if I will be able to complete it all but I am definitely inclined towards these fields of studies. However, I am also interested in history, geopolitics, journalism, and economics.

Talking about extracurriculars, I have always been active in my community. In my high school, I led the formation of a students' council in my school after almost two decades of its establishment. I led the council as a founder president and opened 11 clubs under the council. After graduation, I have been acting as a mentor and advisor to subsequent presidents. In addition, I am a central executive member of the Nepal Youth Council-the largest youth-led social org in my country. I have led several national and regional projects including a national sanitation campaign, a national plantation campaign, a project on solid waste management, and I have played a crucial role in organizing several national and provincial youth conferences here. Further, I have also involved in numerous events and projects that have had, more or less, a positive impact on the targeted community. In addition to social engagement, I have always been an athletic person. I am fond of basketball and cricket and have played both sports at a competitive level as well. I am also into swimming, running, badminton, tennis, and a few more. It's just that I have been athletic my entire life and it makes me content. Also, I have been involved with olympiads and academic events as well throughout my high school and in my gap year as well. I had been selected in six international events to represent Nepal. Unfortunately, I couldn't attend any because of financial issues.

My frosh year at Princeton has been full of excitement, intriguing discussions, and timezone issues. Initially, it was an issue keeping up with the schedule in an already difficult time zone. The classes were very different than what I was used to. Everything on zoom made it even more difficult. All I was doing was joining in, taking some notes, and trying to understand it on my own. Whenever confused, I used to shoot an email to either the professor or the TAs. However, I slowly got used to it. There were consequences though. I went completely nocturnal, sleeping during the day, taking classes in the evening, and dealing with Psets and other social events during the night and early morning. It was difficult the first few days but I got used to it quickly. Also, online education heavily impacted my Princeton experience. It was a constant struggle to manage classes and join certain social events. I rarely joined any sessions that weren't part of my academics, honestly. I missed a lot, I believe. I couldn't reach out to a lot of alumni nor make connections

with a lot of Princeton students nor fully experience Princeton at all. I still lament not being able to do any of it for an entire year. It's definitely something I will lament during my time here at Princeton.

Princeton matters a lot to me in my undergrad journey and beyond. As I mentioned, I wish to be a tech entrepreneur and I know how significant Princeton education will be in my path to be one. At Princeton, I am looking forward to honing my academic skills, my interpersonal skills, my oratory skills, and my leadership and communication skills. Hopefully, at the end of my life at Princeton, I can become a leader who can create an immensely positive impact globally through tech entrepreneurship, something I am aspiring for. In addition, I also want to explore as much as I can here. I took classes ranging from Economics to History to Entrepreneurship and am looking forward to exploring more. All I want to do is make myself more curious to learn and more thirsty to explore. Beyond Princeton, I just want to carry on with the foundation Princeton education is gonna lay for me. I want to definitely complete Ph.D. and then go on to work globally. I aspire to work with people of various backgrounds from various nations and, hopefully, travel the globe as I work.

Coming back to Covid, the situation hasn't been too easy for people in Nepal including me and my family. During the first wave, we entered into one of the longest lockdowns lasting for almost a year. As the situation seems to get better, the second wave hit us and it's been almost a month since we have entered another lockdown now. The healthcare system here is already fragile and the incompetence of the government to handle the situation is not helping as well. In terms of academics, apart from hurting my Princeton experience, the pandemic didn't affect me too much. Mentally, I wasn't challenged much since I was with my family and we had no issues whatsoever. Everything I needed, I had already bought everything right before lockdown and that sufficed for both semesters.

Lastly, I want to put this here. Nepal is now on the brink of collapse as covid ravages the country (much like India, except it has gotten less attention internationally). In the face of the current humanitarian crisis in South Asia, Nepal's government/ health system is already failing, and things are only getting worse. Hospital beds have run out, crematoriums have been inundated, and oxygen is in short supply. Nepal is grossly underprepared to tackle this crisis on its own and to help the most vulnerable tackle the pandemic, I, with a few friends of mine, set up a Go Fund Me to get help from the international community and started a group called the Student Coalition for Nepal. It's not that I am this tardy in responding to emails but the situation has been very different for me in the last few weeks, and the finals added a bit of challenge too. Hopefully, everything I have mentioned answers your question. If not, please feel free to send me an email, and I promise I will be very responsive from now on. Thank you for being so patient and for reaching out to me time and again. I can sense the warmth a Princeton tiger gets from its alumni and I feel blessed to be a part of this community. Also, I want to add this here. Had I not received generous financial aid coming from you all, US education would still be a dream for me. I consider myself blessed to be studying at one of the best schools in the world without having to worry about financials. Thank you so very much. I cannot express how grateful I and my family are to everyone who has helped to make this journey so far and beyond easier for me.

This has now become a very long email and I hope it doesn't bother you too much, but if there are things I have missed, please do let me know. Also, please do share the article you'll be writing, I am more than eager to read it once it's online. Thank you so much again. I will be waiting for a response from your side. Please take care of yourself and I am really looking forward to meeting you soon.
