First Reading: Acts 5:12-16

The numbers of men and women who came to believe in the Lord increased steadily.

The faithful all used to meet by common consent in the Portico of Solomon. No one else ever dared to join them, but the people were loud in their praise and the numbers of men and women who came to believe in the Lord increased steadily. So many signs and wonders were worked among the people at the hands of the apostles that the sick were even taken out into the streets and laid on beds and sleeping-mats in the hope that at least the shadow of Peter might fall across some of them as he went past. People even came crowding in from the towns round about Jerusalem, bringing with them their sick and those tormented by unclean spirits, and all of them were cured.

I turned round to see who had spoken to me, and when I turned I saw seven golden lamp-stands and, surrounded by them, a figure like a Son of man, dressed in a long robe tied at the waist with a golden girdle. When I saw him, I fell in a dead faint at his feet, but he touched me with his right hand and said, 'Do not be afraid; it is I, the First and the Last; I am the Living One. I was dead and now I am to live for ever and ever, and I hold the keys of death and of the underworld. Now write down all that you see of present happenings and things that are still to come.'

Gospel: Jn 20:19-31

After eight days Jesus came in and stood among them.

In the evening of that same day, the first day of the week, the doors were closed in the room where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews. Jesus came and stood among them. He said to them, 'Peace be with you,' and showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were filled with joy when they saw the Lord, and he said to them again, 'Peace be with you. 'As the Father sent me, so am I sending you.'

After saying this he breathed on them and said: 'Receive the Holy Spirit. For those whose sins you forgive, they are forgiven; for those whose sins you retain, they are retained.'

Thomas, called the Twin, who was one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. When the disciples said, 'We have seen the Lord', he answered, 'Unless I see the holes that the nails made in his hands and can put my finger into the holes they made, and unless I can put my hand into his side, I refuse to believe.' Eight days later the disciples were in the house again and Thomas was with them. The doors were closed, but Jesus came in and stood among them. 'Peace be with you' he said. Then he spoke to Thomas, 'Put your finger here; look, here are my hands. Give me your hand; put it into my side. Doubt no longer but believe.' Thomas replied, 'My Lord and my God!' Jesus said to him:

'You believe because you can see me. Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.' There were many other signs that Jesus worked and the disciples saw, but they are not recorded in this book. These are recorded so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing this you may have life through his name.

2ND SUNDAY OF EASTER - Year C DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY, 27th - 28th April 2019

"The Peace of the Lord Be With You!"

"Holy Week, culminating in our Easter celebration has once again come and gone. Participating in the liturgy has probably been a deeply moving and inspiring experience for many. But now life goes on as before, in a world that does not seem to have changed. The words of the Easter Preface, "the joy of the resurrection renews the whole world' don't seem to ring true as we are reminded of the loss of past wars and hear of ongoing acts of destruction, violence and discrimination still occurring in our time. We should not let a mood of despair or helplessness overwhelm us. That is not the way of the Gospel.

Today we hear of two appearances of Jesus following his death and burial. In the first appearance, the risen Lord brings "Shalom" – peace of heart and mind through forgiveness to a group of disciples who had locked themselves away in fear and shame since the horrific death of their leader. What a dramatic life changing situation it must have been when the One they had to abandon at His most vulnerable time became present to them without a word of reproach. "Shalom' – "Peace be with you" and breathed into them the Holy Spirit. Their faith restored, they are animated to accept Jesus' commissioning to share what they had received with others.

Today's liturgy celebrates Resurrection faith, derived from a shared experience of God's merciful and undying love in the midst human tragedy.

Resurrection faith awakens a sense of commitment to share the 'Jesus mission' to liberate, heal and restore friendship with God and each other.

Here we recall the appearance of Jesus to Thomas. We could drift through these Easter weeks repeating abstractly, "Happy are they who have not seen yet believed' or we might learn from Thomas traditionally dubbed a doubter, but in essence a forthright and honest person. To be able to recognise and touch the wounds of his beloved master was all he needed to awaken him to the power of the resurrection to transform human lives by sharing the mission of Jesus.

We should wish to see and be bearers

of this power healing the wounds of our brothers and sisters; undoing oppression of violence and discrimination: bringing back into life those alienated by poverty, illness, despair and abuse. Thomas' recognition of his Lord and God in Jesus' wounds of suffering and death gives us every reason to believe in the impossible and to take up the challenge Jesus sets before us, 'As the father has sent me so I'm sending you!'



Divine Mercy Sunday

Since the year 2000, the Church has concluded the Octave of Easter by celebrating Divine Mercy Sunday. This great solemnity calls the faithful to rejoice in the merciful love of God as it is most profoundly manifested in the Paschal Mystery of Jesus Christ. Simply speaking, the "Divine Mercy" is another name for the revelation of this magnificent love of God, which culminates in the life,



death and resurrection of Christ. Christians have long known and praised this abundant mercy. In this sense, devotion to the Divine Mercy is not new.

Less than a century ago, however, Christians were challenged by God himself to a renewed awareness and trust in His mercy, which has begun to fan the old flame of devotion into a more ardent veneration. Our Lord spoke to a young Polish nun, Faustina, giving her a timeless reminder for all of humanity: "Humankind will not have peace," He said, "until it turns with trust to my mercy. .. Proclaim that mercy is the greatest attribute of God."

The feast of Divine Mercy is not only a beautiful reminder of the love of God, but also a challenge to a deeper understanding of who He is, and who we are in relation to Him. At the Mass for Faustina's canonisation, Pope John Paul prayed for her intercession. We should join him in this prayer: "Divine Mercy reaches human beings from the Heart of Christ crucified. ... Today, fixing our gaze with you [Faustina] on the face of the Risen Christ, let us make our own your prayer of trusting abandonment and say with firm hope: 'Jesus, I trust in You!'
