In 2009 through August, Bible worker teams in Peru have:

## Mozambique Report

Dear Family and Friends, What a day! Today was the climax of our stay here in Chokwe, Mozambique. There was a dedication service
 for the new church and a baptism for the 4 evangelism campaigns at the new church. The church was packed and so was the new "OneDay Church" for the children. The "One-Day Church" will be finished by the local people. Maranatha and SAGE put up the support structure and the roof. There is native material there to build the walls.
The baptistery (right) is in back of the church. I watched as all 77 were baptized. There were three women that the Devil did not want to let go of. When they stepped down into the baptistery they each one started to shake. The pastor prayed and all the people around the pool sang very loud. Finally the shaking stopped and the pastor baptized them. One of them had to be baptized twice!


The third one was young (late teens or 20) When she came out of the pool there was a victory song and several people lifted her up and went singing and dancing away with her.

Before the baptism there was a burning of the Devil worship articles like certain clothes of red or black. In the village there are several small
 round huts by the houses. These are used for Devil worship so these too will be burned.
The Chief of Matuba (left), which was our site, was baptized. This is very good because he will have a great influence on his people. There is a group of about 70 people worshiping there in Matuba each Sabbath under a tree by a member's mud hut (below). I think 20 of the 77 baptized are for Matuba so that makes a nice sized group. One of our SAGE members donated money in memory
 of her husband to build a "One-Day Church" there in Matuba. And SAGE pledged money to build one more church. The pastor and members were so happy for this.

## God Speaks to a Rich Man in Zambia

Mr.Fredrick Shebwela was known to be one of the richest men here . in this area and was married to 13 wives. The man had nothing in need and no time for religion or God. He had more than 300 workers on his farm and a lot of animals. We had tried to make several appointments with him in the past and every time he has refused. We had tried to send him some books like steps to Christ and Desire of Ages, but he just refused these and said that he had not time for God.

We asked God to give us a chance and an opening into his heart. It so happened that during our evangelist meeting, one of his sons died. Here God gave us 3 days consecutively to speak at the funeral house. Everyone listened carefully and as we are told in Rom 10:17, things started to change. This change was not only with Fredrick but even with his wives. Four of his wives approached him requesting to leave him, for now as in light of the scriptures they realized that they are living in sin. To everyone's surprise, he had no problem letting them go, since they chose to follow God. When the other 8 saw that they also requested to leave and he accepted that. This happened during the last week of our meetings. Fredrick had not missed any of the meetings, including the 3 held at his home during the funeral. As his home was about 200 m from the meetings.

When it came time for the day of the baptism we did not have water to use other than what he had on his farm for his animals. He put his hand up and requested to be baptized as well, but now! He took his baptismal vows and was baptized. That was May 02 at the age of 87 .

The following day, Sunday May 03 he died in a road accident. I know that he died in Christ and when the trumpet sounds on that Glorious day, Fredrick will come forth with the others that died in Christ, then unto eternal life.

What happened then? Something went wrong! When asking the children what the image on the little card represented, Viridiana could not continue as planned because the Huicholes know the story about Jesus on the cross, but were not familiar with Jesus' birth.

How could this be possible? Well, I was so focused on talking to them about the Son of God who died to save us that I overlooked telling them about Jesus becoming a human to pay the price of our salvation. Now I realize the importance of starting at the very beginning, sharing the story of baby Jesus.

Then on the second visit to the same group of children, a story board was improvised and the class that began with four children ended up with seven. The mothers are very pleased for the attention provided to their children. And now the foundation is being laid for the Church of tomorrow.
