Every Eastertide the Holy Spirit reminds me of what it means to live by faith. When Lazarus got sick his friends found Jesus and informed him (John 11:4-7). Jesus replied that he would get there soon. By the time he got there Lazarus was dead going on four days. Martha got a bit frustrated with Jesus about his delay (John 11:17-22). Likewise Jesus's disciples buried him in a stone tomb and then shut themselves up in an upper room for three days before Jesus appears to them very much alive (Mark *16:1*). Now three or four days might not seem very long at first but consider the circumstances in both events – fear, death, trauma, grief. The anxiety grows for all those who are involved -suffering, maybe even tormented at the acute loss and sudden changes!

We are entering a season of beginnings and ending which we call spring. Spring is a turbulent time and shuffling schedules and emotional gatherings for graduations, journeys, relocations back for snowbirds, etc. It can be challenging to bear witness to the resurrected Christ among us at such times. Faith is a gift which we receive at baptism and gets renewed and strengthened over time by the Holy Spirit. Faith moves us to trust that God is active in our lives in ways that we might never see nor understand. Waiting on God does not mean that God is not present and busy creating life in, with and for us. God knows better than we do that change takes some adjustment for us humans and as much as we might want it now that we are neither ready nor sure about what we truly "need" let alone "want" for ourselves, or others.

This Spring take in the season with prayer for God's will to be done and pause now and then to remind your heart that God is present, active, and worthy of your trust. Just as Jesus promised to rise from the dead, and he did...so God promises to raise you up with Jesus in forgiveness and blessing every day. Amen.

The Annual Roadmap Overview Council Retreat 2018



Before the era of GPS (global positioning systems) we used to navigate using "maps and charts" in which we had to plan and trace routes ourselves and considers where to stop

for lunch or gas. I remember taking the highlighter and working through the atlas one city at a time. Many times it was not the destination alone that was the adventure but the journey to get there was the real adventure.

On Saturday, April 14th from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. our congregation council had their annual leadership retreat. At this annual event we get a chance to learn about one another as council members and begin to work together on dreams and goals for the coming year. We gathered at Riverside Bible Camp in Story City during a questionable weather day and we began to discuss with Bible reflection, prayer and some "sticky notes" the route for our team and congregation for the next twelve months.

Our map for the journey consists of "waymarks" or guides for our traveling together – like road signs and mile markers on a highway. As we considered the routes, we determined first what values would guide our focus this year. The values are guiding principles that will help in decision making together. We will operate under four main values:

- 1.) Deepening people's relationship to God
- 2.) Help members live out their faith in their daily lives
- 3.) Seek out and use the gifts of people of all ages
- 4.) Worship nurtures faith life

With these values in mind, we continued tracing our route by deciding who would be the focus of our

ministry this year. Everyone is valuable and important to the ministry of this congregation; however, we believe that some people might need some additional attention for the coming year – particularly, <u>the elders who are retired</u>, <u>elders who</u> <u>are widowed/single</u>, <u>families with children</u>, and <u>those who live with mental illness</u>. Our strengths as a congregation include the deep compassion and care for which we honor one another, as well as the diverse community in which we thrive and worship together. Our challenges include timing and hectic schedules for social events, and effective ways to bring awareness to the forefront. We do not accept these challenges as obstacles but as opportunities for interaction and relationship formation.

What empowers this council are the aspirations – that is, the deep hopes and dreams that motivate action – moving us from the usual expectations toward our group imagination of what God is up to here and now. We aspire to be a community in which people contribute to the life of the community and feel like they are a part of something fulfilling for their life and impacting the world especially one person at a time in love and for the good of others.

Like any journey we have our trip mapped out to some degree but God is the one who makes it all come together as is best for Palestine. We came up with two ministry ideas which we believe are not only measurable but are seed planting for the future growth.

- <u>"Third Word" Ministry</u> Comes from Jesus' third word from the Cross - "Jesus said to his mother: "Woman, this is your son." Then he said to the disciple: "This is your mother." John 19:26-27 - A ministry whose goal is to build relationships between individual families of all generations within the family created by Jesus at Palestine Lutheran Church.
 - a. <u>Prayer Partners</u> Pray for each other, checkin regularly, celebrate times of joy (*birthdays, anniversaries*) and sorrow, be encouraged to invite into aspects of life (*sporting events, plays, etc.*), sit with each other in worship
 - b. <u>Service Events</u> Be a part of serving opportunities with /for each other share

your gifts of service together (Mutual Service Events, God's Work our Hands Sunday)

 <u>Table Fellowship</u> – Have a meal together at organized times by the congregation, and on other days when appropriate

<u>Who will lead this?</u> The council will partner with the Fellowship/Evangelism and Stewardship Committees to organize/implement each part of this ministry over the next 12 months.

2. Accompanying families and individuals who live with mental illness with awareness, support and understanding. We will seek to promote awareness about mental illness by inviting guest speakers into the community to educate and personalize the way of life for those living with mental illness. We will seek to engage local support ministries and agencies in order to learn more and interact with helping hands. We believe that our society is struggling to engage with the mentally ill and Jesus calls us to love, accept and encourage those who live with it.

<u>Who will lead this?</u> The council will partner with Mission/Outreach and Staff to organize and implement opportunities for awareness and support over the next 12 months.

3. We identified some additional areas in which we might support the relationship strengthening goals of this congregation: a. Provide childcare options – training and support, b. Establish a list of drivers who are willing to give rides to individuals in need

We closed our time together with a short council meeting and a prayer along with the desire to pursue God's will for Palestine Lutheran to the best of our ability and in faithful expectation of what we together will accomplish in the next 12 months.

We ask the congregation to pray our retreat closing prayer regularly as we seek to live out these goals, and thank you for your continued support and ministry:

O God you have called your servants to ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden, through perils unknown. Give us faith to go out with good courage, not knowing where we go, but only that your hand is leading us and our love supporting us; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. Where are the paths that lead to life?

What kind of road do you find yourself traveling today? How do you decide which way to go when another road crosses your path? You may choose a detour leading you to a road less traveled, or you may have the determination to take the straight and narrow, or you might travel down memory lane where you come to an intersection that causes you to pause and wonder, which way do I turn?

ELCA Disability Ministries is approaching a decisive crossroad. Several transitions have occurred in the past year, some of which include personal health, missional dollars and questions about our direction. In February 2018, Carol Josefowski accepted the position of ELCA Disability Ministries coordinator. So much of what we've accomplished at Disability Ministries stems from the 2013 ELCA Churchwide Assembly's vote to empower Disability Ministries by accepting Brian Krause's \$4 million challenge to raise funds through Always Being Made New: The Campaign for ELCA. We are grateful for the roads taken, which have brought us to today. 2018 brings us to an intersection where our work can continue in the same manner or take a turn; yet, I believe through the Holy Spirit our ministry can proceed in many bountiful directions in response to what our church has called for: God-enabled ministries.

The Holy Spirit rests within each of us, waiting to be realized through our baptismal call, including our fellow church members with disabilities. We know God is able, and as we each admit with confession, "with God's help," we are able. What an awesome God we seek to serve alongside one another in this journey!

As we quickly approach the Summer months the council would like to update you on the current budget and giving status.

Although the weekly giving since the first of the year has been keeping pace with budgeted expenses, we are still hovering around a negative (\$3,000) balance from month-to-month in the general fund. We also still owe about \$4,900 on the Building Improvement loan for the repairs made last spring. We want to be proactive knowing that giving typically slows down in the summer months due to vacations, etc. and ask that you prayerfully consider how you may be able to help meet the following goals.

- Pay off the \$4,900 note for building improvements. This loan is due the end of June, and we would prefer to not extend the terms.
- Get the General Fund back to being positive. This is primarily due to a couple missed Sundays over the last year and half and we just haven't caught back up. Continuing to run a negative balance may necessitate taking a loan out to cover monthly expenses and we would prefer to avoid this.
- 3. Consider signing up for EasyTithe. This will allow you to give your offering at any time from any place on a mobile phone or computer, or set up automatic giving. We have discussed that 'Every Sunday Counts' for giving in the church and this allows the opportunity to give even if you can't physically make it some Sundays.

Palestine continues to be an active and vibrant "haven for all generations" and continues to do God's great work! Feel free to contact me or any council members with questions.

Sunday, May 6, is Rachel's Day: Justice for Children and Youth

— a time when we look at the needs of our children, especially needs for safety, security, and justice. One day is not enough. The goal of Rachel's Day is to serve as a beginning, a place and time to move participants to actions. Think of ways you can continue to work on behalf of children within your community.



Many children today fear they will not grow up to be adults. They also fear drugs, guns, gangs, going home to an empty house, poor education,

illness, hunger, unsafe streets, that friends will kill themselves, being unloved, and being alone.

Rachel's Day is an observance that started in one congregation — Bethel West in Chicago — and spread to a synod & synodical women's organization.

In 1996, the first Sunday in May was observed as Rachel's Day in the Metropolitan Chicago Synod. The day took its name from Jeremiah 31:15–17. In those verses Rachel grieves for her children. Rachel's Day is a time to mourn the loss of our children and to renounce the forces of evil and fear that plague our nation.

In July 1996, the Metropolitan Chicago Synodical Women's Organization brought to the Women of the ELCA Third Triennial Convention a memorial asking all women to encourage their congregations to recognize the first Sunday in May each year as "Rachel's Day." The memorial was adopted.

What a wonderful way to build community and relationships by connecting adults (who may or may not be parents or grandparents) with children at risk. It is another way to remind us that, as the African proverb says, "It takes a village to raise a child." We are all responsible for all children.



Across the country, older Americans – a rapidly growing population – are taking part in activities that promote wellness and social connection.
