THE WORD

Year B - 12 May 2024 - Colour: White - Psalter Week 3



Gospel is dramatic in its clarity and brevity today as before Jesus ascends into heaven to sit at the Father's right hand, he reiterates to his disciples his mission on earth.

The Messiah will suffer and rise from the dead and the repentance for the forgiveness of sins will be preached in his name to all the nations. The risen Christ and the love and mercy of God are teachings that underpin the missionary activity of the Church. After stating his purpose and his desire that his mission should continue through the work of the Holy Spirit, Jesus blesses them and is taken up into heaven. Of course, this moment is not marked by any sadness or loneliness on the disciples' part. They return to Jerusalem with great joy and stay in the temple to preach and teach everything they have heard.

On this solemnity of the Ascension of Jesus, it is important for us believers to acknowledge that the ascension is not the end, it is only the beginning. In today's first reading, the disciples are instructed not to stand around looking up into the sky wondering where Jesus could possibly have disappeared to? No! The work of discipleship truly begins after the ascension of Jesus for through the ministry of his followers, the Kingdom of God establishes itself more and more on earth. Remember the recurring theme from Christ's preaching on earth. Jesus will rise from the dead and God's love and mercy.

REFLECT

oday, the Catholic Church celebrates World Communications Day and most of us can proclaim to be experts in this field with the advent of smart phones and other devices that bring us into contact with a range of possibilities through the Internet. There are huge positives attached to being able to use the Internet, not least for people who live away from home and can keep in contact with family through whatsapp, facebook and other platforms. Pope Francis himself stated back in 2014 that the internet should be "an environment rich in humanity, a network not of wires but of people."

We not only celebrate today but we also reflect on the current state and nature of relationships on the Internet. Paolo Ruffini, Prefect of the Dicastery for Communication states that social media can nourish "true, beautiful, solid relationships but it can also fuel hatred." He goes on to state that Pope Francis wants people to view social media not as something that traps you, but something that frees you and that you make an instrument of freedom. On this 58th World Communications Day, the Church underlines the value of interaction understood as dialogue and as an opportunity to meet with others.

Today also confirms Pope Francis' attention to the new communications environment where he is present with his @Pontifex account on Twitter and @Franciscus account on Instagram,
