Safety

Another member of our club made a trip to the hospital due to an accident in his shop. He was cutting a board on the band saw and it sounded like he was applying a good bit of force while pushing the wood through the cut. Unfortunately, a piece of the wood broke during the cut, which allowed his hand to go towards the blade which cut through a section of his finger. Luckily, it didn't cut the finger off, but he did get a pretty deep cut.

So as a reminder to all, please never force the wood into the cut, and use something to push the wood through instead of your hand.

Demo

The demo for the night was geared toward tips and techniques. Joe Wertner along with some other club members shared some tips throughout the night. Listed below are a few of them which you may need for the challenge this month. Our challenge is to bring in anything that you turned using one or more of the tips presented. So to my best recollection here are some of the tips.

- Attend club meetings, you always take home a little more information than you came with.
- Get involved with shop tours, see what others are doing in their shops which can give ideas on how to improve yours, and share some tips and techniques.
- Friends, it's always good to have a network of friends. They can give ideas on how to do something, wood connections, and so on.
- Binder clips, great way to hold things together, like sand paper.

- Is your tie down straps a tangled mess, roll them up and put them in a sock.
- Keep notes, saves a lot of time when you come back to a project that you haven't finished.
- Drill a hole for depth first, when you want to bore out a hole. This will keep you from boring down too far.
- Use washer to help remove glue top.
- Use shower curtain clips, to keep items together like chuck jaws.
- Cut skew chisel at angle needed for dove tails, makes it easier to get the angle you need to mount blank on chuck.
- Keep CA glue in refrigerator, keeps it longer, and if you store it with the cap open you don't have to worry about the cap getting glued shut.
- Use compressed air to help cool drill bit while drilling.
- Keep magnets in shop, great for holding metal items.
- If you have several chucks and different jaw sets, color code them to identify where they go.
- Want a place to put that item you just put finish on, take a board and put several staples in it, and lay the item on top of the staples.
- End grain problem, use mineral oil or water.
- If you don't like moving your tool rest up and down to find the center, use a precut piece of PVC pipe between tool rest and tool rest mount.
- Use drawer liner to hold wood in place while working on it.
- Drill a hole in a piece of wood as big around as your chisel and to the depth you need to attach your wolverine sharpening attachment. This will give you a consistent grind.

This list is not the same as being there, but it should give you some ideas. If you need more info on an item listed get with Joe Wertner, he'd be more than happy to help you out.

Club Officer Election
