# 65 Years of Service 1957-2022 Richmond Navy League Council of the United States

#### Not a Complete History

This timeline focuses on the major activities and accomplishments of the Richmond Navy League Council of the United States from its founding in 1958 to the end of 2022. Unfortunately, the Richmond Navy League records for most of the early years from 1958 to the early 80's are not available, so it is not a complete history. This history has been drawn from Richmond Navy League Council meeting minutes, annual reports, *The Lucky Bag Newsletter* and newspaper and journal articles

#### Navy League of the United States

The Navy League of the United States, founded in 1902 with the support of President Theodore Roosevelt, is a nonprofit civilian, educational and advocacy organization that supports America's sea services: the Navy, Marine Corps, Coast Guard and U.S.-flag Merchant Marine, their people, families, and Navy League-sponsored youth programs. The Navy League is dedicated to informing the American people and advocating that the United States of America is dependent upon strong sea services for its economic well-being and national defense. The Navy League is a worldwide organization with approximately 30,000 members and 220 councils; including more than 500 corporate and community affiliate members.

In 1957, a group of 20 World War II and Korean War veterans began laying the groundwork to establish the current Richmond Navy League Council. However, this was not the first Navy League organization in Richmond. Shortly after the Navy League's founding in 1902, many localities across the country formed local sections or chapters. The November 1906 *Navy League Journal* reported that were 78 Navy League sections across the country. On January 19, 1909, the Matthew F. Maury section of the Navy League of the United States was organized in Richmond at a meeting held at the Commonwealth Club. H. Theodore Ellyson was named President. His son, Theodore K. Ellyson, was in the Naval Academy class of 1905 and would later become the Navy's first pilot in 1911. At the Richmond meeting the following members were enrolled: E. R. Archer, W. C. Noland, W. A. Crenshaw, Levin Jones, Charles E. Smith, K. Tucker Harrison. John M. Trice, E. H. Fergusson, Captain John A. Curtis, Barton H. Grundy, Ashton Starke, and John Taylor Wood Curtis. Captain Curtis was elected vice president, W. A. Crenshaw secretary, and W C. Noland treasurer of the organization. (source: *The Richmond Journal*)

On the invitation on the officers of the Matthew F. Maury Section of the Navy League in Richmond the Corresponding Secretary of the Navy League of the United States attended a meeting of the Section at the Commonwealth Club, on April 20, 1911 and spoke on the work and objects of the Navy League. An interesting feature of the evening was an account by the presiding officer Captain Curtis, vice chairman of the Section, of his experience as a Confederate blockade runner during the Civil War. (source: *The Navy*, Navy League of the United States, May 1911)

Apparently the first Richmond Navy League branch failed because in 1915 the Navy League established a new branch in Richmond. H. Theodore Ellyson was again selected Chairman, with V. C. Noland Treasurer and A. B. Upshur Secretary. In December 1915, a woman's section of the Navy League sf the United States was been established in Washington and a branch of the society was formed in Richmond. (source: *Richmond News Leader*, 7/14/1915 and 12/15/1915)

On April 17, 1917 the Richmond branch of the Navy League of the United States, with the support of Governor Henry C. Stuart, Mayor George Ainslie and Lieutenant Commander John Grady organized a parade to recognize the United States Navy. The parade began at from Capitol Square and the line of march was Grace Street to Fifth, south to Franklin: Franklin and Monument Avenue to the Boulevard, and then to the ball park. (source: *Richmond Times Dispatch* 4/17/1917)

In June of 1917, the Women's Section of the Richmond Branch of the Navy League began knitting sweaters and other garments for Navy personnel, primarily for sailors on board the *USS Virginia*. From 1917 to 1919 the knitting club provided 2,956 sweaters, 52 pairs of socks, 350 pairs of wristlets and five convalescent rugs. (source: *Richmond Times Dispatch* 6/27/1917 and 01/19/1919)

After the end of World War I, the Richmond Navy League appears to have gone dormant. No records on Navy League activities in Richmond from 1919 to 1942 were found.

In 1942, as the United States prepared for full entry into World War II, League President Shelden Clark of New York City called for the formation of the Women's Councils as a war measure. The Richmond community responded with the formation of the Richmond Women's Council of the Navy League of the United States. The Women's Council chief activity was the establishment of a Club for Navy servicemen and their families at the Barrett House, located at Fifth and Cary streets. The Women's Council provided dormitory sleeping quarters, as well as evening and morning meals for Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard personnel.

Again, after the end of World War II, the Richmond Navy League appears to have gone dormant. No records of Navy League activities in Richmond from 1942 to 1957 were found.

The current Richmond Council was established on January 21, 1958 when the Navy League of the United States Council charter was presented to Alex W. Parker and Judge Moscoe Huntley, Co-Presidents of the Richmond Council by Richmond Council by RADM F. Massey Hughes, Commandant Fifth Naval District at a ceremony held at the Jefferson Hotel in in Richmond.

Virginia Representative J. Vaughan Gary recognized the Richmond Council in the Congressional Record on February 21, 1963 for being selected as the Council of the Month for February 1963 by the Navy League of the United States.

The Richmond Council membership grew to over 1,400 in the early 70's. The membership dipped for several years but grew back to 1,100 members in 1990. For many years the Richmond Council was in the top 10 of the largest Councils in the Navy league of the United States. Since 1990, the membership has declined with the increased passing of World War II veterans who comprised such a significant portion of the membership. In 2022, the membership stands at 200.

#### The Lucky Bag Newsletter

*The Lucky Bag* newsletter began publication in 1966 as a tool to provide regular updates and advisories to its members. In its early years of publications, the *Lucky Bag* was published about five to seven times a year. In 1986 it increased publication to 11 issues per year. *The Lucky Bag* also began recognizing sponsors whose ads were placed in the newsletter. In that first year 12 sponsor ads were placed.

#### Webpage and Facebook

The Richmond Navy League website was established in 2010, with a major revision and additions in 2016. In 2022 there were 1,156 visits to the webpage, an average of 3.2 visits per day. A Facebook page was established in 2011, which operated until 2014. The page went dormant for several years. A new Facebook page was established in March 2018. The Facebook page had 160 followers at the end of 2022.

#### **Moscoe Huntley Award**

Judge W. Moscoe Huntley was a founding member and first President of the Richmond Navy League. The prestigious W. Moscoe Huntley Award was established in 1964 to be a living tribute for his commitment to the Richmond Navy League. The award is given periodically to a member for their dedication and outstanding service to the Council over an extended period. The award is the Council's highest form of recognition. #### **BUDGET AND FUND RAISING**

#### **Anchor Club**

In February of 2008, Richmond Council Navy League's Past President and longest-standing active member, Ed Gibbons, founded the *Anchor Club*. Ed, himself a Marine, got the idea from the Marine Corps League's *Leatherneck Club* to which he also belonged. The idea was to offer Council members the opportunity to go above and beyond the call of duty by contributing additional financial support for the mission to support our Sea Services and Youth Programs. By the end of 2008, there were 104 members of the *Anchor Club*. Since that time, annual membership has exceeded over 100 members every year.

The history of donations to the Anchor Club demonstrates a continuing commitment of our members to support the sea services. From 2008 to 2022, members donated \$192,823 to the Anchor Club, an average of \$12,855 per year. In 2022, 128 members donated \$15,496. Though the minimum donation to the Anchor Club is \$100, many of our members donate more than \$100. There are 23 members who have donated \$100 or more every year from 2008-2022.

Our Anchor Club donations are our primary source for supporting our adopted ships and units, care packages, Sea Cadets and nine high school JROTC programs in the Richmond area. From 2012-2022 we provided \$87,804 in support to our adopted ships, units and mailed care packages to deployed personnel. We also provided \$50,830 in support to the America Division Sea Cadets and \$10,989 to our Navy and Marine Corps JROTC units.

#### **Golf Outings Fund Raisers**

The first golf fund raiser was held on 10/23/1991 at the Fort Lee Officer's Club golf course in the Petersburg area. Spring and Fall Golf events from 1991 to 1997 were held at Fort Lee. In 1998 the annual golf event was moved to The Hollows Golf Club in Montpelier and have continued at that location. Thirty-six golf fundraisers have been held with a total of 3,800 golfers participating, an average of 106 golfers per outing. No golf outing

has ever been canceled because of bad weather. Several were rescheduled because of rain. The only cancellation was in 2020 because of COVID.

#### Lucky Bag and Golf Sponsors

The Navy league Board of Directors decided on 2/10/1986 to begin offering sponsor ads in the *Lucky Bag* to generate funds to support the Sea Cadets and other activities. Since 1986, about 9,500 sponsor ads have been placed in the Lucky Bag and average of 24 ads per issue. The low was 10 ads per issue month in 2001 and the high was 33 ads per issue in 1990. In 2022, there were 19 ads per month placed in the *Lucky Bag*.

#### Virginia Commonwealth University

The Richmond Council operated a concession stand at Virginia Commonwealth University basketball games from 2000 to 2011. This concession stand typically generated about \$6,000 per year in net income to support the Council's activities and programs.

#### Luncheon-Dinners with Guest Speakers

The Richmond Council has hosted 74 Annual Membership and other dinner and luncheon meetings, 37 Navy Day Dinners and Luncheons and 11 Honor's Night and Sea Service Dinners and Luncheons.

#### **Events and Trips**

From its beginning, the Richmond Council has hosted and supported a great variety of events and trips. Available records show that members and friends have participated in 60 major ship cruises. One memorable cruise was on the aircraft carrier *USS George Washington*, with over 400 Richmond Council members on board. They were able to observe F-14 launches from the actual forward flight deck of the ship. In 2007 during a cruise on the frigate *USS Carr*, members were allowed to fire 50 caliber machine guns from the bow of the ship. The bucket list trip was a visit to the aircraft carrier *USS Theodore Roosevelt* in 2000 by 12 members. They arrived on the ship by a small boat but left by being catapulted from the ship aboard a Greyhound supply plane. One of the members on board was 93 years old and he became the oldest person ever to be catapulted from as US Navy warship.

Members have attended 14 Ship Commissionings; participated in 67 Base, Ship, Facility and Museum tours; visited 30 Blue Angels Airshows at NAS Oceana and NAS Norfolk; attended 15 Marine Corps Evening Parades at the Marine Barracks in Washington; participated in 8 tours the Naval Academy in Annapolis; attended 6 U.S. Naval Academy football games; participated in 20 White House tours; and held 7 Members and Family Picnics.

#### SUPPORT FOR THE SEA SERVICES

#### Adopted and Supported Ships and Units

The objective of adopting a ship, station, or other military unit or facility is to provide continuing support to a particular Sea Service Unit, its crew, and families. Adoption implies a commitment of continuing support. Plans for such support must consider a Council's financial resources as well as the probable cooperation and willingness of the Council's members.

The Richmond Council supported many different ships in the early years and in 1987 formalized the process by Adopting the cruiser *USS Virginia* (CGN-38) in 1987.

Other adopted ships include:

- 1994 (1) USS Yorktown which replaced the USS Virginia when it was decommissioned.
- 1995 (1) USS Normandy which replaced the USS Yorktown which was assigned to a new duty station.
- 1996 (2) USS Normandy and new adopted ship USS Carter Hall
- 1999 (3) USS Normandy, USS Carter Hall and new adopted ship USCGC Northland
- 2002 (4) USS Normandy, USS Carter Hall, USCGC Northland and new adopted ship USS Tornado
- 2004 (3) USS Normandy, USS Carter Hall and USCGC Northland, USS Tornado assigned to a new duty Station
- 2006 (4) USS Normandy, USS Carter Hall, USCGC Northland and new adopted ship USS Nassau
- 2011 (4) USS Normandy, USS Carter Hall, USCGC Northland and new ship USS Gravely which replaced the USS Nassau which was assigned to a new duty station

In 2017, the Council adopted and continues to support Strike Fighter Squadron VFA-213 Blacklions, Naval Air Station Oceana.

#### **Care Packages**

The Care Package program was established in 2009. Thru the Car Package the Council solicits forwarddeployed APO/FPO addresses of all branches of the service to which the care packages are mailed. We have no records available for the period 2002-2012 but for the period 2013 to 2022, the Council spent \$28,913 to prepare and ship Care Packages. The peak activity period was when military personnel were serving in Afghanistan and Iraq.

#### YOUTH PROGRAMS

#### America Division Sea Cadets supported since 1968

The Naval Sea Cadets Corps (NSCC) was founded in 1958 by the Navy League of the United States at the request of the Department of the Navy. In 1962, the USNSCC was chartered under Title 36 of the United States Code as a non-profit youth organization with an emphasis towards the sea-going services of the United States.

The mission of the United States Naval Sea Cadet Corps is to build leaders of character by imbuing in our cadets the highest ideals of honor, respect, commitment, and service. Sea Cadets are high school aged students who participate in our advanced program. There is no requirement to have been a League Cadet prior to joining Sea Cadets. Sea Cadets wear uniforms, learn about the maritime services and a wide variety of career fields, and advance through ranks that mirror the U.S. Navy and U.S. Coast Guard.

The Richmond Council established the America Division Sea Cadets program for the Richmond area in 1968 and has been in operation for 54 years. The typical participation has been 35 cadets per year, an estimated

1,855 cadets since 1968. For the period 2012 to 2021, the Richmond Council donated \$45,830 to support the America Division, an average of \$4,590 per year.

Major Achievements of the America Division

- America Division Sea Cadets recognized as the Second-Best Unit in the country by the National Navy Sea Cadets Corps in 1970.
- America Division Sea Cadets won the 1978 John J. Bergen Trophy for the Outstanding Naval Sea Cadet Corps Unit. The award was presented by Governor John Dalton 12/21/1978.
- America Division Sea Cadet Midshipman David L. Wilson won the 1978 Walter R. Radcliff Memorial Scholarship Award for the Outstanding Sea Cadet in the nation.
- America Division Sea Cadets won the 1998 John J. Bergen Trophy for the Outstanding Naval Sea Cadet Corps Unit in the country.
- America Division Sea Cadets received the 2009 Navy League of Canada Challenge Award for the most improved Naval Sea Cadet Corps unit finishing in the top ten of the National Sea Cadets Corps units in the nation.
- Cadet Chief Petty Officer Pellegrino received the 2013 Willis E. Reed Award for National Sea Cadet Corps Cadet of the Year.
   Warrant Officer Jennifer Weggen received the 2013 Nicholas Brango Officer of the Year Award for Inspirational Leadership while serving as Commanding Officer of the America Division.
- Warrant Officer Gary Riffle, Sr. received the 2014 Nicholas Brango Officer of the Year Award for Inspirational Leadership while serving as Executive Officer of the America Division.
- Chief Petty Officer Tamera Riffle received the 2018 Stockholm College scholarship. She sponsored by the National Navy Sea Cadets. The scholarship provided \$2,500 per year over four years.
- America Division Sea Cadets was runner-up out of 300 units in 2019 for the John J. Bergen trophy.
- America Division Sea Cadets was runner-up out of 300 units in 2019 for the Most improved Unit in the Nation.
- America Division Sea Cadets was ranked 12 out of 300 units in 2019 for the Recruiting and Retention award.

# Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps (JROTC) supported since 1985

The Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps (JROTC) program was established by Public Law in 1964 and may be found in Title 10, U.S. Code, Chapter 102. The JROTC program prepares high school students for leadership roles while making them aware of their rights, responsibilities, and privileges as American citizens. It is a stimulus for promoting graduation from high school, and it provides instruction and rewarding opportunities that will benefit the student, community, and Nation. JROTC teaches young men and women the kind of self-discipline, self-confidence, and leadership skills that can help them successfully meet the challenges of adulthood. This program is conducted at accredited secondary schools throughout the Nation, by instructors who are retired Navy, Army, Air Force, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard officers and enlisted personnel.

The Richmond Council supports nine Richmond area Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (JROTC) programs, five Navy and four Marine Corps. Our participation began with Highland Springs High School which implemented a Marine Corps JROTC program 1985. In 1993, Varina High School implemented the first Richmond area Navy JROTC program. The current Navy and Marine Corps JROTC programs supported by the Richmond Council and their start dates are:

1985 Highland Springs High School, Marine Corps 1993 Varina High School, Navy Hermitage High School, Marine Corps Henrico High School, Navy 1996 J.R. Tucker High School, Marine Corps 2001 Lee Davis (now Mechanicsville) High School, Navy 2002 Patrick Henry High School, Navy 2009 James River High School, Navy 2014 Goochland High School, Marine Corps

Currently about 700 cadets per year participate in these nine Richmond area JROTC programs. It is estimated that an average of 106 cadets per school per year have participated and that an estimated 22,785 cadets have participated since 1985. There is a Department of Defense requirement that JROTC programs must maintain at least 100 cadets to continue to be certified to operate.

For the period from 2012-2021 the Richmond Council provided \$9,289 to support the nine JROTC programs. That support includes \$100 scholarships awarded to the Cadet of the Year for each high school who is a senior. The Richmond Navy League also provides the Theodore Roosevelt Award to a student of any grade rank that has exhibited excellence as a cadet. The award includes a certificate, the Roosevelt Medal and Ribbon. This award is considered very prestigious in the JROTC community.
