LETTER FROM THE BOARD

The hot topic around the world right now is COVID-19 and it's no different for Sunset Villa. We have been working hard over the past month to rework how we manage things at the park in light of this global pandemic. We have many senior citizens living on the park grounds year round and their health is a significant concern for us. We also understand the need and desire of those who have trailers and rent campsites to escape to Sunset Villa for some much needed respite. We have some snowbird campground tenants as well who use Sunset Villa as their Canadian residence during the summer - they have flown home and have nowhere else to stay. It's a challenging situation as we are completely volunteer run Board, and we run on a tight budget so communal spaces like the laundry rooms in the rental buildings and the biffy (campground washrooms), areas where a virus could easily be transmitted are of particular concern. For all of these reasons, and many more, we have had to close Sunset Villa until further notice.

We are hopeful that that with everyone's social distancing practices, this virus will subside soon and the government will start to release some of the restrictions around social gathering in public places. We are committed to opening the park as soon as we are able and allowed. HAPPY 70th SUNSET VILLA

On Mar 17th, 1950, a meeting of 16 Danes was held at the home of Mr & Mrs Frederik Nielsen in Toronto. For years the Nielsens crusaded to establish an 'old people's home', similar to the ones in Denmark. A committee was created that night.

On May 13, 1950, the Association was officially formed at Magnus Jensen's home in Toronto. The name Sunset Villa was chosen as a symbol for the peaceful rest one feels after a long and busy day. Magnus would be President for the first 9 years.

On Aug 23, 1950, Sunset Villa was incorporated as a non-profit with members without share capital.

On Oct 1954, the vision became a reality when Sunset Villa was purchased from the Maclean's estate (of Macleans Publishing).

On June 5, 1955, Sunset Villa was officially dedicated at the first Grundlovsdag (Constitution Day).

The Board enjoys celebrating milestones, and we had many plans this year, which are now shelved due to Covid-19. Until now, we have been calling this our 65th, because of the method adopted of counting Constitution Day years, which also coincides with the age of property as Sunset Villa.

However, it failed to recognize the preceding years of hard work that made this all possible. As such we have adapted our Constitution Day logo to say 70 years of Hygge.



To avoid confusion in the future, it might be a good idea to stick with one counting method. Afterall, when we become 100, do we celebrate twice - in 2050 AND 2055 to mark both occasions? That gets confusing and costly. Maybe next year could be "Constitution Day - 71 years of Hygge!" for instance. Then we can count our way up to 100! That delicate decision is for next years Board to decide. What do you think?

SUNSET VILLA NEEDS ONE PURPOSE

As a volunteer over the past couple of years it has become clear to me that Sunset Villa doesn't have much of a long-term purpose. Ask me what the goals and aspirations of Sunset Villa are, and I cannot answer you. Ask me if it has a future, and I will say I am not sure.

Our organization needs one purpose, and I would like to find out what our members think it should be.

The original purpose of Sunset Villa was written in 1950. The founders wanted to build a retirement home for people of Danish descent or intermarriage. They were concerned that the elders in their midst wouldn't manage without the kind of social security net they knew in Denmark.

By the time the first Sunset Villa residences were built in 1972, Canada's social security had changed, and you could argue that the original purpose of Sunset Villa had become redundant.

But the founders were on a roll; they had bought the 52-acre property, and members wanted to create a place where Danes could meet. It worked. Danes flocked to the events at Sunset Villa.

In 1967 we even had the future queen come and visit.

As years passed, attendance dropped off, Sunset Villa started to fray at the edges, and today there is barely enough money or

volunteers to run the place. At the moment, in my mind, Sunset Villa has two strengths: the restaurant and the cemetery, and they are both independent operations. Also, the Danish brand is strong – good food, beer, hygge, laughter, cooperation – and people who come to Sunset Villa are happy to be part of our Danish community.

LET'S BE REALISTIC

Our current mission is the establishment and maintenance of:

1. **Non-profit residential accommodation** primarily for people of Danish descent or inter-marriage for the purposes of establishing a retirement community for people retiring due to age and other reasons;
2. **A community for cultural activities** for people of Danish descent or inter-marriage;
3. **Recreation facilities and activities** for people of Danish descent or inter-marriage.

The mission doesn't work. First of all it's illegal to discriminate according to nationality. Second, the mission is too broad for a small, struggling volunteer-run

organization. We need to be realistic about what we can do. Is it number 1, number 2, number 3 or something completely different?

WHAT DO YOU THINK?

Everyone has thoughts about what is best for Sunset Villa. However, if we don't have a common purpose, fault will be found with whoever takes on a leadership role because the leaders aren't doing what others believe is right. This way no one wants to lead and then what? HOW THIS STARTED

Mr. & Mrs. Frederick Nielsen of Glencairn are credited with campaigning to get a Danish "Old People's Home" started, and so meetings began to form Sunset Villa Association.

1955

MACLEAN ESTATE

Sunset Villa was purchased from the Maclean's (of Macleans Publishing) for \$28,000 (equivalent to \$272,000 in today's dollars.)

1950

MEMBERSHIP COST

In 1950, a membership was \$1.50, and there were 36 members.

MORTGAGE BURNING

Sunset Villa celebrated the end of debt with a mortgage burning ceremony on Jan 29, 1983.

MEMBERS ONLY

For a long time the restaurant was for members only, (and guests). You had to sign a guest book to enter!

THE ASSOCIATION NAME

Decided in 1950, the names considered were:

**GREAT

Erik Jorgensen

was born in Haderslev, Denmark in 1921. He studied and worked in forestry in Denmark, and in 1955 the Department of Agriculture invited him to come to work here in Canada.

He had a long and distinguished career as a forest pathologist in Canada and was with the Forestry Division of the Department of Agriculture until 1959. Then he went to the University of Toronto and, while there, started a program to study and control Dutch Elm disease that was then ravaging elm trees all over Canada. Some in government considered it a 'weed tree' at that time, and were slow to deal with Dutch Elm disease. The lack of recognition of the importance of elm trees to the urban environment spurred Erik and the Forestry faculty to establish the Shade Tree Research Laboratory at the University, which later led to the Ontario Shade Tree Council.

Professor Jorgensen was the first to coin the term "urban forestry." In 1967 he defined it as "...a branch of forestry... for the cultivation and

management...of urban trees for their benefits to the urban environment and their recreational and general amenity value". With hindsight, we can see that he was a visionary, recognizing trees benefit for urban society as a whole. He always advocated planting native species to regenerate Canada's natural heritage as well. After a stint in Ottawa, heading up the Forest Management Institute and where he created a national Urban Forestry Program, he moved to Guelph to manage the Arboretum at the University. While at Guelph, he was instrumental in bringing a program in Agroforestry to the University. In other parts of the world, farmers had long included trees into their cropping systems, but agroforestry as a discipline was new to Canada in the 1980s.

THE FIRST URBAN FORESTER

Professor Jorgensen continued to inspire students until his retirement. As early as the 1960's and 1970's Erik spoke of the need for more graduate training in urban forestry. At that time, forestry education was mainly to do with forest harvesting, whereas in the urban environment, the emphasis is more likely to be on individual trees and urban planning.

Professor Jorgensen's advocacy for more training for foresters was finally fulfilled with the establishment of Canada's first Urban Forestry Program at the University of British Columbia. Eighteen students were the first to receive their Bachelor of Urban Forestry degrees in May 2018. He would surely have been delighted.

Jorgensen authored over sixty articles and scientific papers on tree diseases and urban forestry. He founded the Shade Tree Council. He received several awards and recognitions for his work including the Maple Leaf Award in 1975 and Trees for Tomorrow award in 1993. He passed away in 2012, five weeks after his wife Gitte died. They are both buried at Sunset Mindepark. Erik will long be remembered for his pioneering work in urban forestry in Canada. In fact, at their November 2019 conference, the Ontario Urban Forestry Council gave his two daughters, Marianne and Birthe, a special presentation from Trees Canada honouring his contributions to urban forestry in Canada.

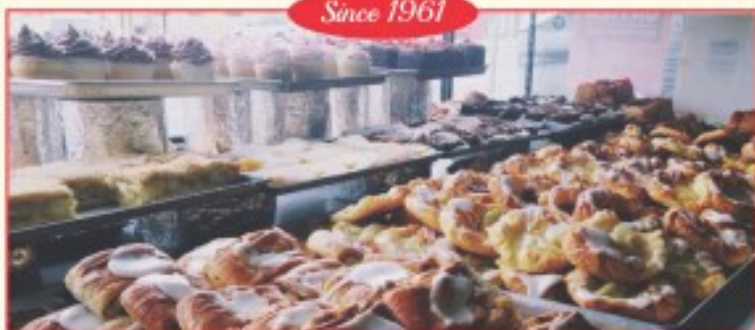

CAMPING - ON HOLD

Due to Covid-19, all seasonal campgrounds in Ontario were ordered to remain closed by law until further notice. Snow Birds returning to Canada were then left wondering where they would live if they could not reside in their usual RV campgrounds for the summer. In response to these concerns, authorities made an exception to open campgrounds only to returning Snow Birds. Upon receiving written confirmation of this from the government, Sunset Villa responded by taking the necessary steps to get the park open for them, allowing them to live here earlier than usual (Apr 20, not May 1 when the season begins). It was a difficult decision for the Board, as opening for a few campers would mean considerable expense to Sunset Villa if the rest of the campground does not open this summer (it is anyone's guess how this will play out due to Covid-19). Sunset Villa was not obligated to open for them, but the Board chose to do the right thing.

Unfortunately the closure has meant that all other campers are not able to use, let alone access, their trailers during the lockdown. Mandatory closure was put in place to "stop the spread", and although it is very inconvenient, staying home is the also right thing to do. Stay safe everyone!
