Wow! have we been busy, let me fill you in. First, in March of 2017, I applied for our second ODOT grant for a new van, you may remember we were awarded our first grant in 2014, this is sounding a little like an Abbott and Costello skit, bear with me. So we were awarded our second grant and received our new van on May 8<sup>th</sup>. These grants are so important, they help us replace our aging vans and we don't have to spend \$50k on a modified van, all of our vans are handicapped accessible and these grants sure help the budget.

Many of you may remember or maybe this is the first you are hearing about it, but the center has been trying to purchase the lot next door for several years, we have been saving for it and waiting for the opportunity. Sadly, the opportunity came with the passing of Mrs. Mabe, but we are so grateful to the family for remembering how much the center has needed the additional space. Mrs. Mabe was always so gracious in allowing us to use it for parking when we needed it, now we will be able to utilize the space for other things as well as additional parking. Now mind you it won't all happen overnight, funds are tight and the most important use our funding is to help our seniors and add to our services so anything we do will take time and careful thought. We closed on the lot on June 8<sup>th</sup>.

Another project on our list, we have upgraded to LED lights throughout the building and all of the outside security lights. We received an incentive through the electric company to do this upgrade and it will save the center a lot of money on the electric bill. Not to mention the bulbs last longer, years, no changing out fluorescent bulbs all of the time, so we save on that supply expense as well.

Finally, and this is really just a huge thank you to a few members who in the last few months have really stepped up when the center needed them, you know who you are, with monetary donations or exercise equipment, all wishing to remain anonymous because they give for the right reasons and as a Rotarian since 1997, the motto being Service above Self, I completely understand, plus, I am really good at keeping secrets. You may remember back in February, I mentioned a big dream to pay-off the mortgage. Now we have a long way to go, but a very generous, altruistic member donated \$20,000 towards that goal, yes \$20K, not a typo. We are applying that money directly to the principal of our mortgage. There is still a rather large balance, if you would like to help the cause, it would be most appreciated. This center is an amazing place for so many reasons and for so many people and sometimes "thank you" just doesn't seem enough.

Join us on Friday's for a movie and popcorn, it looks to be a hot summer, come on in the air is cool.

Thank you to all the members for the laughter I hear every day and to everyone that helps at the center every day. Have a Safe 4<sup>th</sup> of July! God Bless our Country.



## **Diabetes Prevention Program**

Our Center has the opportunity to hold a **year long** class for those people that may be pre-diabetic. Prior to holding the class someone would come out and see who actually qualifies. Qualification is done by taking a short test. Once we have a list of qualifying individuals, we will then start the classes.

For the first 16 weeks classes are held once a week for 1 hour. After that classes are bi weekly for an hour and then go to monthly classes for an hour.

### **Qualifiers for the program included:**

Fasting Blood Glucose lever of 100-125

A1C: 5.7-6.4

Body Mass Index of 25+.

Self-Monitoring Weight and Food Intake Preventing Relapse

Healthy Eating Heart Health

Problem Solving Life with Type 2 diabetes

Strategies for Healthy Eating Out and many more

Dealing with Slips in Lifestyle Change

**Managing Stress** 

Again this is a year long course, so we are hoping those that sign up will attend most sessions. There is no charge to attend the program. We are planning to have classes on Thursday afternoons. If we get enough interest, we will schedule the qualification process.

## Holiday Craft Bazaar



1/2 cup Butterscotch Chips


Topping:

Keep cool! Use your air conditioning if you have it. If you don't, try to spend the hottest part of the day at a senior center, library, mall or the movies.


