Dear Catholic Daughters;

There is an increasing expectancy, in the hearts and minds of the servants of our Blessed Lord

for the celebration of Holy Week and Easter Sunday. Holy Week and Easter Sunday are the religious high point of the entire year. For each of us, Holy Week and Easter Sunday are a reliving of the mystery of the Lord's death and resurrection. "And he died for all, so that those who live might live no longer for themselves, but for him who died and was raised for them" (2 Cor 5:15).

"The wonderful works of God among the people of the Old Testament were but a prelude to the work of Christ the Lord in redeeming mankind and giving perfect glory to God. He accomplished this work principally by the Paschal mystery of his blessed Passion, Resurrection from the dead and glorious Ascension, whereby dying he destroyed our death, rising he restored our life" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1067).

The Church's lived expression of the practices of prayer, fasting, and service/almsgiving are indispensable for in our quest for holiness. Our Lord said; "be perfect, just as your heavenly Father is perfect". The practices of sacrifice are a means to selfgovernance, which leads to true freedom and therefore holiness. "For freedom Christ has set us free; stand firm and do not submit again to the yoke of slavery" (Gal. 5:1). Our Lord is asking us to die to self so that we may be of great service to our fellow Catholic Daughters. "... Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you drink?

When did we see you a stranger and welcome you, or naked and clothe you? When did we see you ill or in prison, and visit you? Due to the pervasiveness of the secularization of our society today, it is more important than ever to see the face of Christ with great clarity so that we can be truly faithful to our Lord and of service to one another. "Purity of heart is the precondition of the vision of God. Even now it enables us to see according to God. to accept others as "neighbors" (CCC, 2519). The willingness of service/almsgiving to others is at the heart of living as Catholic Daughters. "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends" (John 15:13).

This year's raffle calendar has definitely been a learning experience. Trying to follow all the postal regulations and the gaming regulations has led us to doing it this new way. The expense is greater but we do want to be rule followers. We are very fortunate that Choice Financial Group offered to pay the cost of the tickets this year.
