PROPOSITION 1 INFORMATION

Our last informational meeting will be on October 17th at 6pm at the fire hall.

History – Skagit County Fire District 9 (FD9) aka The Big Lake Fire Department is and has been experiencing a critical budget shortfall. This has been the uppermost concern of the elected Fire Commissioners for the past several years. Part of this is due to the reluctance of the Board to increase the financial burden on our taxpayers. The other and more important component has to do with the system set up by the State Legislature regarding our funding. By law, we are allowed only a 1% increase in the budget per year, UNLESS there is a vote of the people. In 2019, FD9 proposed an increase to raise the rate back up to \$1.00 per thousand of property value. There were many misunderstandings and misinformation about the process and our need. Subsequently the ballot measure failed. The financial need did not disappear. Solution - Several months ago, the Board of Commissioners put together the chart below and approved a capital replacement plan. That plan put useful life on apparatus for planning purposes as well as eliminated the replacement of 4 current apparatus. The Fire Commissioners sought volunteers to form an advisory committee and assembled 11 citizens from various parts of the Big Lake Community to seek a resolution to our funding crisis. They held three open public meetings to learn about the problem and come up with recommendations. There are two funding mechanisms: A voter approved bond for a specific use, such as a truck - or a voter approved levy rate increase (lid lift) that can be used for expenses. The advisory committee's recommendation from those meetings was that the District should seek from the voters a levy rate increase. The amount of suggested increases varied but averaged out to \$0.79 per thousand of assessed valuation of property value. After consideration, the Board decided that the needs could be met with a slightly lower increase. At the August Commissioner's business meeting (which are open to the public), the Commissioners passed a unanimous resolution to put the proposition on the ballot to increase the levy rate to \$0.77, which is an increase of \$0.2837 per thousand over our current rate of \$0.4863 per thousand.

The most critical need is a new fire engine, to replace a current 38-year-old fire engine, which is well past its useful life. The chart below shows the projected needs and the cost estimates in today's dollars. Fire apparatus is predicted to increase 9 to 12 % annually and does not include financing costs associated with the purchase.

Our 2022 budget is \$333,755. Without the levy lid lift our budget for 2023 will be roughly \$337,093.

*This is exclusive of the bond for the station which is fixed and dedicated.

The Fire Commissioners have set up an easy calculator for you to see the impact of a proposed levy increase and how it may affect you. You can find this calculator on our website: http://www.biglakefire.org/home.html . For example, a \$600,000 property would have an increase of \$170.22 per year.
