In January I was delighted to announce to the parish that the members and friends of Augustus had met the \$100,000 Capital Campaign challenge made by Mike and Ruth Taylor. To date our Capital Campaign has received cash and outstanding pledges totaling over \$680,000. The architect's plans will soon be submitted to the Borough of Trappe for approval. The elevator installation and breezeway replacement will cost \$400,000. If you have not yet made a commitment to this needed improvement project, there is still time to be a part of our legacy for future generations of Augustinians. 

FROM THE BENCH - FEBRUARY 2016

Some news from the loft: Our bell choir welcomed new ringer, Sean McClain, last month – and we welcome BACK Alan Shunk! You will see the bell choir in worship on February 21.

In February, we begin the season of Lent. The word "Lent" (from the Old English word "lencten") refers to the lengthening of daylight hours that occurs in the northern hemisphere as spring approaches. At Augustus, we will worship on Ash Wednesday (February 10) at 7:30 pm.

The season of Lent is the perfect time for us to reflect on the portion of our liturgy known as the Agnus Dei (AHN-yoos DEH-ee), which means "Lamb of God." The following is from the website http://www.lcms.org/page.aspx?pid=1116

In the Revelation to St. John, John sees a scroll in the right hand of the One who was sitting on the throne. A "strong angel" challenges, "Who is worthy to open the scroll and break its seals?" Then the Lamb comes into view. Undoubtedly the most significant feature of this Lamb is that it appears to have been slain.

When we sing the Agnus Dei, "Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world, have mercy on us," we are preaching and praying all at once. With these very words, John the Baptist pointed his disciples to Jesus (John 1:29, 36). As we prepare to feast on the Lamb of our salvation, we proclaim him who gave his life for us. Here is the Lamb of God! Yet we also pray to him who is now present in his body and blood. We pray for mercy from the One who showed the true depths of mercy and compassion as he was silently led to slaughter, dying like a lamb shorn of all its honor.

[Later in Revelation,] we hear [John's] description of the saints in white robes. "These are the ones coming out of the great tribulation. They have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb" (Rev. 7:13-14). This is the blood of our redemption...foreshadowed at the first Passover when the blood of the year-old lambs was sprinkled on the doorpost.... In his Easter hymn, Martin Luther applies that incident to us: "See, his blood now marks our door; Faith points to it; Death passes o'er, And Satan cannot harm us."

So it is at every celebration of the Lord's Supper. The blood of the Lamb is poured out for our drinking and his flesh for our eating. Clearly, God's mercy is shown, and his peace rests on us.

Thanks be to God for his mercy on us. Peace be with you this Lenten season.

2017 is the 500th anniversary of Martin Luther nailing 95 Theses to the church doors in Wittenberg, thus catapulting the Lutheran reformation!

We will be visiting not only Wittenberg, but also great reformation sites like Leipzig (where Luther preached), Wartburg Castle (where Luther translated the New Testament into German), and Worms (which I believe Augustus has a stained-glass window dedicated to this memorable event). We will also be cruising on the Rhine River, traveling through the legendary Black Forest, visiting French Strasbourg, walking the famous Neushwanstein Castle (the castle that inspired Disney's movies), sing in Austrian Salzburg, and visit both cities Munich and Berlin.

The trip will be July 10-22, 2017 and will leave from and return to Philadelphia's international airport for those from this area (you will meet up with the rest of the group in Germany).

The cost for this event is \$4092.00 per person and includes breakfast and dinner every day, all tours, all hotels, air flight, and some gratuities.

A kick off event is scheduled for February 27th at 7:30 pm and we will try to get a skyping session together so you can learn about this trip and have the opportunity to ask any questions to the tour agency.



TWO PIECES OF WOOD THAT SPELL 'LOVE'


Imagine someone loving you so much that he or she would give up absolutely everything—even life itself—just to let you know how much you're loved! Sometimes people in our own families or special friends show us glimpses of that kind of love, but to love someone like that all the time is impossible for human beings. Only God can do that, and that's exactly what God did by sending Jesus.

Because Jesus died for us, life is different. For one thing, there are things we don't need to be so afraid of—like being alone. Jesus loves us and comes with us in our hearts wherever we go. He died on the cross to show that to us, and that's why there are crosses in churches now. Crosses remind us that Jesus' love is so big that nothing can stop it or change it. What kind of crosses are there in your church? Sometimes at the beginning of worship, a person walks in carrying a cross attached to a long pole. That cross is called a processional cross. Others often follow

that cross. It's like a little parade.

At home, make a cross from some tree branches—perhaps some from your Christmas tree if it's available. Hang the cross inside your front door to help you remember that Jesus loves you and is with you wherever you go. Then make one for someone in the hospital or nursing home, to let that person know the good news of Jesus' love!

Be ach household has its own routine. We go to work; we help the kids with their homework and attend their events; we make the meals, clean the house, and do the laundry. But God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners Christ died for us" (Romans 5:7-8). God loved and chose us, the unlovely, to shed his grace upon. We are reminded that, "since God so loved us, we also ought to love one another" (1 John 4:11).

"Love one another." Not just our close friends or those who agree with us, but "one another." We can't do it, can we? Some people are just too hard to love. Some people are not deserving of our gifts and our attention. Some people aren't interested in the love we have to offer. The command remains: "Love one another."

Now is a good time to read John 15. Here we find the secret of loving and serving. Here we find the source of love, of faith, of everything we need. That source is Jesus. He is the Vine. He sustains and nurtures us, the branches. He enables us to bear fruit, to *"love one another."* He calls those who obey him and tells us he will give us whatever we ask in his name. So we pray, Lord, let us *"love one another."*



Too often we fail to understand that Christian instruction about money is one of the best opportunities we have to teach our children about God's love for us, and his ownership of all things.

The way we use money is the extension of our personal characteristics.

By teaching our children the Christian use of money, affording them control of money and the need to make decisions about money, we also confront them with the meaning of discipleship and Christian stewardship.
