

Northwoods Food Project Works Toward Food Sustainability

As we finish the canning, freezing and preserving of our summer garden bounty some of us have already begun to turn our thoughts to what we will grow next year. Talking and dreaming about new methods and new varieties of plants are what get many northlanders through the coming winter months, a pleasant way to look forward to another growing season.

The Northwood Food Project (NWFP) in Grand Marais is already looking ahead, and among their many projects they are hoping to add new farmers and growers to Cook county's ranks.

Diane Booth and Joan Farnam are the originators and mainstays of NWFP, and they say the future of sustainable food sources in the region rely on another generation joining the ranks in a committed way.

“We are setting up a special fund for scholarships for farmers in addition to the Co-op (Cook County Whole Foods Co-op) raising funds so that if a farmer needs a piece of equipment or another big expenditure like a greenhouse or season extender, we can help them get a start,” said Booth.

Farnam says that encouraging people who have never farmed before to take it on is part of their mission. “We are trying to really encourage people to take that step and start growing food, we need people who are just starting in the area, young people who need our help with financial resources who are going to take this seriously and invest in some infrastructure,” said Farnam.

The NWFP became official when Booth and Farnam, residents of Grand Marais, formed a nonprofit to create greater food self-sufficiency in the area. A monthly radio talk show, community garden development, children's gardening programs, farmer's market, and garden sharing are some of the other activities of the NWFP.

Despite the obvious challenges of weather and soil, the founders determined that Cook

County had once been food-sustainable, and could be once again.

Booth says that between 1900 and 1942 there were several farmsteads who were self-sustaining, and the county was once an exporter of potatoes. One important element missing from those bygone days is a critical one: fertilizer in the form of manure.

Without many active livestock operations in the area, NWFP says that importing compost from St. Louis County is the best option for now. However, they hope that in the near future someone will make the investment to create a composting business. According to their research, Cook County produces tons of organic and food waste that could be recovered as a valuable nitrogen source if the proper infrastructure was invested in.

“The problem is the half a million dollars it would take for someone to invest the equipment needed to start a compost recycling business,” Farnam stated.

Making an economic case for food sustainability led NWFP to complete the Green Dollar Survey, showing that about 38 percent of gross sales (\$78 million annually) in the county are tied to food, despite only one percent of the food consumed in the county being grown there.

“All this money is leaving the county to buy food and we knew we had to educate the people who have decision making power in the community that, yes, farming is possible here,” said Farnam.

NWFP board member and Cook County resident Melinda Spinlar is an excellent example of sustainable northland agriculture. She and her husband, Mark, have been growing at least 80 percent of their own food for over 36 years on just three acres of land. Literally building from the ground up, the Spinlars made their own soil by composting. “But we were one of the lucky ones with a whole six inches of topsoil here already!” Spinlar said.

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
