Dear Mark,

Just a little note for the NCCKG newsletter.

International trade of wildlife and plants is regulated by the Convention on the International Trade in Endangered Species (C.I.T.E.S.). CITES is a multinational group formed in 1973 to control international trade of products, such as ivory and other animal parts, which come from endangered species. As of 1990 CITES consisted of 109 party nations. This group does not control commerce of these products within the United States or within any other nation. The individual nations elect whether or not they will participate in the proposed programs. The United States elected to participate in the programs and have installed exportation and importation laws. The United States created its own ban on the import and export of African elephant ivory June 9, 1989. CITES installed an international import and export ban on African elephant ivory January 18, 1990. Within the United States, trade of animal and plant products is regulated by the Department of Interior's U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and by the National Marine Fisheries Service.

As knifemakers and related craftsmen, we are specifically interested in these regulatory agencies because their rulings effect our business. They determine the availability of animal products we use for handle materials and govern the laws which may affect us in ways we do not wish to be affected. If we are not aware of the laws and/or are not careful, it is possible to be fined and/or imprisoned for dealing in animal parts which are restricted. As I hear of changes regarding these agencies and their rulings I will forward the information to the newsletter in hopes to keep everyone informed.

As for now, interstate trade of African elephant ivory is legal, as long as the ivory was in the United States prior to the June 9,

1989 cút off date.
