Meet Lauren Brown, Phlebotomist

As a phlebotomist I mostly draw blood. Sometimes I work all over the hospital but primarily in the ER where I respond to level 1 and 2 traumas. I sometimes operate the I-stat machine which gives nearly instantaneous results on blood tests necessary to guide treatment. Most of my shifts are at night. *Tell us about your education.* There is no particular type of degree required to be a phlebotomist but it helps to have a certification. I have four year degree in Biology from Baker University in Baldwin City, KS. Many of the people I work with are in or are planning to go to nursing school. At some point I may go to Physician Assistant (PA) school. PAs can make 80-120 K a year. I am interested in blood cord blood banking which involves collecting blood from a newborn baby’s umbilical cord for use or study later.

On June 19th, 1865 Union General Gordon Granger arrived in Galveston TX with the news that the pro-slavery forces had been defeated. The track scholarship paid for my degree. *Who are your heroes?* First, I look to the lord for guidance. My mom is a hard working single parent. She has been at her job for 30+ years. Although things were often hard, she always found time to go to my events.

Have you ever had to deal with racism? Certainly, but not too much in middle school (predominantly white) or high school (predominantly black). Most of the racism I have encountered has been at work. If my co-workers suspect someone will behave in a racist way towards me they usually step in and take care of that patient. Some of racism is from not knowing or understanding, most of it comes from hate. When I came to Springfield I had prepared my mind for the possibility I might have to deal with it. Have the conversation about race; prepare your heart. If you go into the conversation angry, you will have cloudy thoughts.

What advice do you have for young people? Stay focused, even when you don't know what you want to do. Do good in school. Network with people, communicate and take advantage of any opportunity. Apply for scholarships, use your talents, find ways to pay for school.
