

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Upstream surveys patients to ensure they are making their own decisions about choosing their birth control.






Across Delaware, Title X sites that provide care to low-income women who are at the highest risk for unplanned pregnancy have seen an increase in women leaving with an IUD or implant* since our work began.


A 2018 report by Child Trends, using their FamilyScape simulation model, estimates a 24% decrease in unplanned pregnancies among Title X patients in Delaware between 2014 and 2017 compared to a 3% decrease nationwide during the same period.




According to a 2019 Guttmacher Institute report, Delaware had the largest decline in abortion out of all 50 states and DC between 2014 to 2017. Upstream's baseline year in Delaware was 2014.



The impact of Upstream's work continues long after project completion.

Medicaid birth rates reflect the number of deliveries recorded in each quarter divided by the number of Medicaid members in that quarter, among women age 15-44. US Birth rates reflect the number of births in each quarter divided by the U.S population in the second month of each quarter, among women age 15-44. Quarterly birth rates will differ from those reported elsewhere as they are not annualized.
