Considering the Cornstalks and Soybean Plants ------ With Pastor Eric

On July 16th we read the Matthew version of the parable of the sower (*Read Matthew 13:1-9*). I can't get my mind off that parable as I gaze out almost any window and see fields of corn and soybeans. Jesus speaks to us in this farming story about the *Words of the Kingdom*. What does he mean by that? For the purposes of this article let us consider "*Words of the Kingdom*" as a testimony to how the Kingdom of God breaks into our lives and impacts us with expressions of love, grace, and unexpected joy. This "*Word of the Kingdom*" is the seed which is scattered everywhere in expected and unexpected places – in both the wedding chapel and in the oncologist's office, and in churches, as well as in the stands at sporting events.

As I look out over the vast field of corn plants, I smile at the power of the seed. The seed wants to grow! The DNA of the seed contains all it needs to grow and flourish with amazing resilience and tenacity – from something small to a larger source of life in oxygen and nourishment. And even though maybe ¾ of the seeds we plant will fall on inhospitable soil, ¼ of them are likely to bear fruit. Some people get discouraged because ¾ attempts at planting seeds bear no fruit. And they stop trying – stop hoping, stop looking for the Kingdom of God. But I can find hope that ¼ of my seeds will bear fruit! It encourages me to plant all the more. If you dream of a 30-fold harvest, plant 120 seeds. When God's Word is the source of this seed, then we should remember what Isaiah 55 says, "my word be that goes out from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and succeed in the thing for which I sent it." We will never truly know what seed will flourish and rest in God to give the growth as needed and embrace every opportunity to continue to watch for the seed planted in our midst and share its fruit with others around us.

Questions to pray about:

- 1.) What seeds are being planted in your life and in your congregation?
- 2.) What seed are you planting in others around
- 3.) What do you see growing? Spiritually? Relationally?

Building Improvement/Repair Update

The roof repairs, soffit/facia replacement, and other exterior repairs were completed the first part of June. I have heard several compliments about how much better the exterior looks now and want to thank the Property Committee and anyone who helped with the process of getting this done! We were about \$10,000 short of having enough to pay for the bill from Hedrick Construction that was due the first part of July, so based on the congregational approval given at the special meeting in March, we borrowed \$10,000 from South Story bank. The terms are 5.25% interest and we will pay interest only on a monthly basis and pay the principal down as we receive additional funds designated to Building Improvement. We ask that you prayerfully consider giving to the Building Improvement fund for this project as we'd like to pay down the debt as quickly as possible.

Southeastern Iowa Synod Restructuring Proposal

Within both the Office of the Bishop and the leadership of the synod council, ongoing conversations have focused on "best practices" related to fostering a deeper sense of connection and partnership throughout the synod. Looking ahead to 2020 as a period of transition (election of a bishop), the time seems right to explore how best to position the synod for a continually changing landscape.

The Synod Council convened a task force to consider aspects of the "Synod Structural Revision" proposal in September 2016. A draft proposal was reviewed by the council in December 2016. In February 2017 the council voted to forward the *Southeastern Iowa Synod-Structural Revision* to the 2017 Southeastern Iowa Synod Assembly for consideration. After a year of conversation and gathering feedback, the Synod Council will then forward a proposal onto the 2018 Southeastern Iowa Synod Assembly for action.

Blog 1-Structural Revision-A Proposal for Revision

Participants at the 2017 assembly of the Southeastern lowa Synod caught the first glimpse of a proposal for changing some of the ways we organize for mission in this synod. The proposal was developed within the synod council and was forwarded to the assembly with an invitation to the whole synod: "Help us think and talk about this so that we can do what we do together both faithfully and well."

With that, we have set upon a yearlong period of discernment regarding the proposal itself and whether or not it can be improved upon.

While it appears that the proposed change involves a lot of "moving pieces," a careful look reveals the three components around which most of what is being offered revolves. The synod council, synod deans, and ministry cohorts. Each will be introduced in more detail in future installments of this blog. For now, it is important to know that with this approach:

- The synod council will be a bit smaller that it is now, will more accurately reflect the population distribution of the synod, and will incorporate a representational nominating process similar to what is used in electing the ELCA Church Council.
- The synod deans will be appointed or elected by the synod council upon the recommendation of the bishop, will function primarily as catalysts for collaborative ministry, and will seek to bring greater consistency to the way the office of dean is carried out across the synod.

 Ministry cohorts consists of the congregations and ministry partners in geographically defined areas that are larger than the current conferences, but are not intended to function like conferences have functioned, which relieves pressures that might seem apparent at first glance.

It is also important to note that this shift in structure is designed to be budget-neutral, in that it should not increase the costs of doing synod ministry.

The year-long period of conversation and shared discernment will include listening posts this fall, a number of web-based resources, and varied opportunities for people across the synod to "weigh in." The plan and hope is to take action on this or some revised version of a proposal at the 2018 synod assembly, including the necessary resolutions for implementation.

So, why now?

On the one hand, this synod will experience a shift in leadership in 2020 with the election of a new bishop. Our shared goal is to do our best to assure that this synod is in the best possible position for future-oriented ministry.

On the other hand - and more importantly - the proposed shifts seek to be responsive to current realities, including some of the significant challenges we face together today.

At the synod assembly, I encouraged people to begin the work of engaging the changes being proposed by the synod council by looking for what aspects of the proposal appear to be most promising. That is another way of saying, "First, be open to what is being proposed," which is a constructive way of setting the stage for understanding the "why" and the "hoped-for outcomes" inherent to the work. That encouragement still stands.

With your help, we will continue to improve on the way we carry out our shared mission. In the conversation ahead you will hear lots about collaboration and networking, creativity and increased vitality. I hope that this much remains clear: At the center of it all is the good news that in Christ Jesus, God so loves this world. All the things we do and the particular ways that we do them are geared toward experiencing and sharing that good news.

Fall 2017: "The Apostles' Creed"

This fall 2017, take part in a three-session Gather Bible study on the Apostles' Creed and what we together say we believe.

In "The Apostles' Creed," Bible study author Julia Seymour, pastor at Lutheran Church of Hope, Anchorage, Alaska, writes: "Beyond preferences or evenly deeply held convictions, the theological underpinnings of a religious community are the structure for teaching, preaching and action. For our life of faith together, creeds are more than just words. They are vessels for carrying one another through doubt, joy and sorrow."

Session titles are:

Session 1: I believe in God...

The Apostles' Creed is one of the oldest unifying symbols of Christianity. Groups of early Christians needed a tool for teaching and evangelism that explained the basics of the faith. The Apostles' Creed shaped their baptismal training, blessing in dying and how communities of faith defined themselves in faithful union. The creed has three parts or articles. The first article talks about God, the Holy Creator and Parent of all things. We'll explore what the Apostles' Creed says about God—and what it leaves undefined—as well as how this stirs our holy imagination.

Session 2: I believe in Jesus Christ...

In Scripture, Jesus is called the Messiah, the Son of God, a teacher, a healer, the pioneer of our faith, the rock of our salvation, Son of Man and other titles. In the Apostles' Creed, Jesus' life and ministry is briefly summed up. Jesus is described as God's only Son and our Lord—one who was conceived by the Holy Spirit and born by the Virgin, who suffered under Pilate, who was crucified, died and was buried. The creed is a definition of the work of the Father, Son and Spirit, yet there is also fullness to being followers in the Way of Christ that is not described in the creed. How does the creed encompass faithful living in imitation of Christ? In other words, what does it mean to believe even more about Jesus and following Jesus than we say in the words of the creed?

Session 3: I believe in the Holy Spirit....

In the Trinity, the Holy Spirit is revealed not through characterization, but through the power of the Spirit in action. How do we understand the communion of saints, forgiveness, resurrection, the church and all that will be, as the revelatory work of the Holy Spirit? As part of the Trinity, the Spirit carries the same weight as the Father and the Son, yet many of us are drawn to one part of the Trinity more than others. How can we use the creed to perceive and honor the Spirit and the Spirit's work?

Happier, healthier families

For years, Bia struggled with her daughter's behaviors. McKenna, 8, lashed out against authority, and tempers regularly flared at home.

"It took a little more time to work with her on anything," Bia said.

Bia couldn't find a way to help gain control of her child, & she became more and more frustrated. That's when her DHS social worker recommended LSI's Families Together program.

Through the program, Bia regularly meets with her Families Together worker, Gaylene. Together, they are working on what Bia calls a "three-step technique."

"Whenever a possible argument comes along, I start by telling McKenna to go take a break and reset herself. Then I can go calm down and eventually, we can talk it out," Bia says. "It's teaching both of us. My main goal right now is to learn how to better handle McKenna and better handle myself."

Bia is also practicing the technique with her younger daughter, Brynn, which she says is "working perfectly." It's drastically improving the way her family communicates, and Bia says she has recommended Families Together to any friends looking for guidance.

"I love the program," she says. "I love how it works and I know if I have questions, they can give me advice on how to go about things."
