**Title** *Virtue Politics*

**Abstract** Political philosophy was once dominated by discussion of the virtues of character and their importance to the good life and the good society. Contemporary political philosophers, however, following the towering influence of John Rawls, have primarily focused on a single virtue of institutions: justice, while largely avoiding controversial claims about the good life. As a result, political philosophy lacks a unified account of the virtues of institutions and the virtues of character. More importantly, we lack an understanding of the connection between the just society and the good life. This dissertation begins to mend this broken seam, which, on reflection, lies at the heart of our deepest political problems. The central argument is that the virtues of character require institutions, while good institutions enable persons to live together virtuously. Political institutions are a necessary precondition for the moral agency exhibited by the virtues. But *good* institutions enable virtue to grow, while helping to constrain the excesses of vice. On this view, justice emerges primarily as a virtue of character, not institutions. The just person balances conformity to existing institutional norms with practically wise reforms. Ultimately, this dissertation concludes that the just society and the good life are linked through the common good of virtuous activity within the shared institutions of a political community.

## **COURSES TAUGHT**

### ***Instructor***

Bioethics (Fall and Spring 2019, California State University, East Bay)

Topics in medical ethics from a virtue ethics perspective, including informed consent, issues of life and death, abortion, euthanasia, and medical research/technology.

Critical Thinking (Fall 2018 and Spring 2019, California State University, East Bay)

Three-part course: 1) psychological obstacles to critical thinking, 2) deductive arguments, 3) inductive arguments. Topics include identifying arguments, validity, soundness, logical fallacies, inductive reasoning, and moral/legal reasoning.

Introduction to Philosophy (Fall 2018, California State University, Stanislaus)

Careful study of four classic texts: Plato’s Early Dialogues, Descartes’ *Meditations*, Mill’s *On Liberty*, and Hume’s *Dialogues Concerning Natural Religion*.

Contemporary Moral Issues (Fall 2018, California State University, Stanislaus)

Three-part course: 1) the ethical theories of Aristotle, Aquinas, Mill, and Kant, 2) the psychology of moral disagreement, 3) moral problems: abortion, immigration, racism, sexism, free speech, and gun control.

Introduction to Ethical Conflicts (Spring 2018, Iowa Central)

Topics in normative ethics and applied ethics including consequentialism, non-consequentialism, virtue ethics; euthanasia, abortion, sexual morality, and promising.

Introduction to Philosophy (Spring 2018, Iowa Central)

Survey of the major areas of philosophy from a historical perspective from the Pre-Socratics to 20<sup>th</sup> Century philosophy.

Law and Morality (Spring and Summer 2017, University of Arizona)
