Pastor's Word

Dear Friends,

As many of you know, my father died on July 19. I'd like to share some of the words that I spoke at his funeral.

My dad was born in the middle of the depression. He was the youngest of 10 children. My grandfather never owned the land that he farmed, and in those years he didn't farm at all. He took a WPA job to try and support his family. My dad had just turned 14 when his father died. I can't imagine how tough life must have been for our family, as it was for a lot of families. But I think my dad was shaped by that experience, along with the faith and fortitude of his mother. He did not need a lot, and he was happy and grateful for what he had. Despite those tough times, he had great memories of growing up. He was the first one in his family and the only one of 10 children to graduate from high school.

At 5'8", he was the starting center on his high school basketball team. Dad was athletic, but that probably says more about Dahlgren High School than it does my dad.

When I was growing up, my dad and I listened to St. Louis Cardinals baseball and Evansville Aces basketball on an old tube radio. When the kids were older, mom and dad had season tickets to the Aces games for 40 years, but growing up we mostly listened on the radio, along with occasional televised games. I developed a love for sports with my dad and we would play horse and play pitch and catch in the backyard. Dad was very proud that I went to U of E. I had a scholarship and the academics were good, but the big bonus was continuing to share Aces basketball.

Dad was a lot of fun. He could be goofy, wearing dumb hats or making funny faces or breaking into a silly walk like John Cleese on Monty Python (which as a kid we watched religiously on Sunday nights after church). He was quiet about it, but he made these funny, witty comments and the best part is when he really knew he was funny. His health declined in recent years, but he had the same gentle demeanor and great sense of humor right to the end.

On Sunday morning I was driving to a conference in Wisconsin when I got the call that dad was in the hospital, and about an hour and a half later I received another call with news about how serious it was. I got to Cedar Rapids and turned right to go to Evansville instead of turning left to go to Green Lake. It was providential that I was already on the way even before knowing that Evansville was where I was going, because if not for that head start, I would not have been able to see him before he died. I mean, it was just miraculous. God was in it.

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I arrived at the hospital and went in to see him. He had a heart catheterization that morning and there were IVs and EKG leads and monitors and cables all around. It had been a terrible day for him. I asked him if he was tired. He said, "Not really... but I am RE-tired." He still had it!

Dad was a genuinely good and decent man. He was a person of kindness and deep integrity and I can't remember him saying a bad word about anybody. I mean, he had opinions and could be upset by things, but he did not speak ill of anyone. He professed faith in Christ and was baptized when I was in college. It was an amazing experience and rare for an adult, but the Spirit had clearly been present and at work in his life for a long time.

Dad was all about family. He was proud of his children, but he was really proud of his grandchildren. He was universally loved by his nieces and nephews and the extended family, many of whom are here today. It's the end of an era; he was the last of his generation. And then he deeply loved my mom. Because of her care, he was able to stay at home to the very end. The day he died was the first time in his life he went into the hospital.

Dad rarely spoke about his faith. (To be fair, he didn't talk a whole lot about a lot of things.) But the scripture says, "The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control." If that is the fruit of the Spirit – if that is evidence of the Spirit in one's life – then he was a deeply spiritual person. Jesus seemed completely unconcerned about how much a person talked. But he was very concerned about how we live our lives, and my dad's life spoke volumes.

I guess what I really want to say is that my dad hardly talked about faith and I literally talk about faith for a living. And yet, he has very much been a role model for me - and I am just beginning to realize how much. We will miss him. And we are so grateful to God.

Thank you for so many expressions of love and care since my dad's passing. The support of our church family means so much.

Church School News

Our classes are making plans for the fall, with classes beginning September 19. In response to COVID-19, each class is figuring out how it will meet this fall.

Library/Bible Study Class: We will be meeting in person and studying Women of the New Testament by Phyllis J. Le Peau. The class is a discussion-based class which will explore the following:

- Lydia shows us how to influence the people around us.
- Elizabeth's life challenges us to care for others.
- Other women like Herodias and Sapphira warn us against turning away from God toward bitterness and dishonesty.

In meeting each of these women, you will grow deeper in your understanding of what it means to be a disciple. Books will be ordered soon, so please indicate your interest by contacting Phyllis Schrag or the Church Office.

Youth: The Youth Class (K-12) will meet each week this fall using a hybrid format of in-person and Zoom. They will be considering themes of forgiveness, reconciliation, wonder and trust through stories from Genesis and Exodus, using a curriculum for all ages called "Celebrate Wonder." This class will be led by Jan Thompson, with assistance from the older youth and several adult volunteers.

Theology Class: The class will be meeting via Zoom at 11:15am (to give some participants time to get home.) This time may change if attendees find that start time adjustment is needed. To kick off the fall session, the class will study a series entitled "ProFuture Faith – The Prodigal Species Comes Home" featuring Rev. Michael Dowd. This series consists of eight 20-minute video sessions and discussion that bridges the gap between head and heart, science and faith.

College Students: Pastor Dave will meet with college students on September 19 to make plans for the semester. In past years we have met on Sunday mornings or Sunday evenings, with a mix of study, fellowship, activities, and food. The group will determine what will work best for this semester.

Beth Douglass Wins Blue Ribbon at Northcrest State Fair



Phyllis Schrag to Appear in Actors' Production


