Celebrating Mighty Gifts in Small Packages With Pastor Eric

One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people? Jesus said, "Make the people sit down." Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. John 6:8-11

In his book, <u>The Purpose-Driven Church</u>, Rick Warren writes: "Small ministries often make the greatest difference. The most important light in my home is not the large chandelier in our dining room, but the little nightlight that keeps me from stubbing my toe when I get up to use the bathroom at night. It's small, but it's more useful to me than the show-off light (My wife says that my favorite light is the one that comes on when I open the refrigerator!)." I suspect that I am not the only one to lose sight of this bit of wisdom. The reason that I am writing about this in February is because of an experience that I have been pondering since Christmas.

I received a gift from one of our Palestine families which consisted of several "sown cloth bags full of rice." At face value, they seemed a curiosity to me and I was not sure whether to play with them – as with bean bags – or use them as paper weights? Teri was quick to inform me that they are used as hand warmers. You put them in the microwave for 30 seconds and then stuff them in pockets, gloves, shoes, etc. And suddenly the weather turned arctic blast brrr...I have been using these rice bags for weeks with much appreciation! I considered how such a simple idea is profoundly useful and a timely gift. God brings salvation into people's troubled lives through the simplest gifts which are given in love, care and grace by each of us at the right time (that is in God's time).

As we move into the Lent season, I hope that we, as a church community, might prayerful regard all the gifts and ways that God works through us to bring love and care into the lives of those around us. We are not perfect and aware of the small differences that we can make because we tend to believe that we can do more and be more instead of letting God be all in all with it all. Jesus did not die for me so that I could be better or more than I am. He died so that who I am is enough, acceptable and blessed to be a blessing in big and small ways in Christ Jesus.

Let us pray. Gracious God, let me be a blessing to others in your hands and bring glory to you always in your time, in Jesus' name I pray. Amen.



Bhakti and Chhali studied hard in class to prepare for the
writing and reading component of their exam. They
supported and competed with each other, pushing
themselves to succeed.

Their work paid off, and Bhakti and Chhali recently passed their exam and are now U.S. Citizens.

"We appreciate the help our LSI volunteers gave us on the Citizenship Exam," Bhakti says. "They are so committed to seeing us meet our goals."





Library Book Review: Higher **Ground by Carolyn S. Briggs** This memoir is about Carolyn, a young woman who grew up in Iowa attending Sunday school but never developed a relationship with Jesus until she had gone through some difficult

times, started a family early in life and was approached by an old friend who had accepted Jesus while at college. Carolyn's husband, Eric, had questions and became eager to learn more about the Bible and Jesus which led the couple to devote their lives to the service of Christ. Eric switched from playing in a rock band to playing music at church and they both became fundamentalist Christians spending much of their time learning about God, praying, living a spartan lifestyle and encouraging other young Christians to do the same. Finally, after having three children and moving to Arkansas for Eric's promotion, Carolyn's strong faith begins to waver. She decides that her husband no longer makes her happy and that her life isn't fulfilling. She struggles with her faith and commitment to her husband and decides to earn a college degree. In the process of trying to find herself, Carolyn finds her old church unwelcoming and unforgiving and makes some major changes that leave her wondering if she grew up too fast and missed out on life. This book was an interesting look at someone's internal struggle with faith and fulfillment.



Library Movie Review: "The Case for Christ" based on the best-selling book of the same

This movie tells the true story of Lee Strobel, an award-winning investigative journalist, who is an atheist until he is challenged to

look into the details of Christ's death, burial and resurrection. Lee's daughter nearly choked to death but was saved by a nurse who claims she felt called to eat at that particular restaurant where the Strobel's were celebrating. After this event, Lee's wife, Leslie, accepts Christ, begins to attend church and gets baptized. Leslie continues to pray for Lee's conversion, but Lee refuses to believe God had anything to do with his daughter being spared. After discussing his increasing anger at his wife's change, Lee's co-workers challenge him to talk to some experts about Jesus' story. In the end, after gathering

information, Strobel can no longer deny Christ and welcomes the Lord into his heart. Lee Strobel went on to write several Christian books. This movie was both uplifting and informational about the details of Christ's sacrifice.



Library Movie Review: "The Young Messiah" This is a fictional story about what it might have been like for Jesus and his family when he was a

young boy. It is based on scripture and historical information,

however, there has been little written about Jesus as a boy from which to draw material. During the movie, Jesus, seemingly a normal boy, begins to notice he can do things that others can't and that Satan is often around him causing problems. Mary's brother encourages Joseph and Mary to begin to reveal the secret of Jesus' origin, but they feel he is too young to be told he is the son of God. Everywhere the Nazarenes go, Roman soldiers are sent to look for young Jesus and kill him throughout the movie since Herod the Great was unsuccessful in eliminating him when he was a baby. Finally, a Roman soldier sees that young Jesus has performed a miracle in Jerusalem and he has to decide what to do about this potential threat to the Romans.


