*Bowling events offer the opportunity to bring together families, friends and co-workers.

*An example would be to charge \$15/person for a fun 9 pin no tap style tournament. Everyone would bowl 3 games. Your cost would be \$6/person for the use of the lanes and shoe rental. If you were to give back \$1 or \$2 per person in the form of prizes, your profit would be \$7 or \$8 per person.

*A tournament like that would keep everyone on the lanes for about 2 hours. This would give you ample time to run additional fundraising events like the 50/50 raffle, silent auctions, etc.

*Adding a buffet style meal would also add value to any fundraiser package you would put together. This would not only add value to your event but keep your potential donors here longer as well. The more time they are at your function, the more opportunity there is to run additional fundraising events.
