


A Message from the President


Building and Engineer Survey

to play and I am sure that I nearly exhausted my imagination a couple of times when we went on extended vacations. We should probably sue the folks now for the danger they put us in when we all slept in campgrounds in the family tent. How sick were our parents?

Come to think of school again, remember corporal punishment? Look at the teacher wrong (you get whipped), failed to do your homework (got whipped), tripped Peggy Lynn (got whipped really bad), etc. Don't know about you but corporal punishment definitely taught me what not to do!





Advice from "What Is It?" Picture

Charlie Mikolajczyk enjoys playing SAABE's "What Is It?" game each month on the SAABE web site. Last month's photo led him to share some advice:

"An extremely important thing regarding water valve caps (see www.saabe.org for last month's photo) is that 'an actual water valve turns counterclockwise to close.' The cap shown indicates this, but few engineers know this. If the valve under the cap turns clockwise to close, a cap with 'OPEN LEFT' should be installed. We have found on numerous occasions, especially with bypass valves on large water meters, that a mixture of open right and open left valves were used. This is a nightmare until you finally identify which direction is open and which is closed for each valve (a meter with a bypass can contain from 3 to 5 valves).

"The solution is simple. SAWS will change the caps to the correct ones once this has been identified. However, valve caps often get mixed up! The secret to keeping the correct caps on the correct valves is to paint the caps and the sockets so that the correct cap goes back on the correct valve!"


