A Word from Rev. Jackson

Greetings in the name of Our Lord Jesus Christ:

As we enter the month of June, we find ourselves in a different place from anything we could have imagined. Fear and warnings about the coronavirus abound all around us. Yet, it is at a time like this that we need the words of Mark 4:35-41 most of all: ³⁵ that day when evening came, he said to his disciples, "Let us go over to the other side." ³⁶ Leaving the crowd behind, they took him along, just as he was, in the boat. There were also other boats with him. ³⁷ A furious squall came up, and the waves broke over the boat, so that it was nearly swamped. ³⁸ Jesus was in the stern, sleeping on a cushion. The disciples woke him and said to him, "Teacher, don't you care if we drown?" ³⁹ He got up, rebuked the wind and said to the waves, "Quiet! Be still!" Then the wind died down and it was completely calm. ⁴⁰ He said to his disciples, "Why are you so afraid? Do you still have no faith?" ⁴¹ They were terrified and asked each other, "Who is this? Even the wind and the waves obey him!"

The disciples in that boat were extremely afraid because their lives were literally on the line. Remember, it is pitch black at night, no light whatsoever, no life jackets, no coast guard, or radios or cell phones, and their boat is nearly underwater. Traveling in a boat at night, during a storm was an extremely risky thing to do. Only a madman would try something like this. But they left the safety of the shores in spite of their fears. They started out with faith. But when the storm swamped the boat and they were literally faced with impending death, they cried out to Jesus: "Teacher, don't you care if we drown?"

The answer is: of course He cared. As the disciples journeyed on through life, they would face other violent storms and life threatening situations – many times. Perhaps this was a test to see how they would respond in the future. They understandably failed.

Jesus stands up, rebukes the wind and waves, which He created, and the sea goes completely calm. I've been on the Sea of Galilee twice in my life. The tour guides showed us how high the storm waves can get on that 7 mile by 14 mile stretch of water. They showed us examples of the violence of the waves during a storm and how small the disciple's boat actually was. No wonder they feared for their life when death stared then in the face. Jesus asked them, "Why are you so afraid? Do you still have no faith?" The disciples were terrified at what they just witnessed and asked, "Who is this? Even the wind and waves obey Him.

In our current world situation we are asked the same question. How does our faith affect our outlook on this scurge that seems to be all around us? I would simply remind us of this: remember this story and <u>who</u> is really in charge of our life, our church, and the lives of those around us. Our church is in God's hands.... Jesus promised He would be with us in this life and the next. Our job is to claim the promise, hope and faith found only in Him.

As I write this to you, know that your church council is working out the details of how we can safely meet for worship. The details of when, how and where are being addressed now. We will be in touch with the plans by phone, letter and email when they are assimilated. Meanwhile, let us remain in prayer for one another and our church. The mission and the ministry continues.

I would also like to personally thank all of you who continue to support our church with your pledges and contributions to our deacon's fund. Thank you for your faith giving....we could never carry on this mission without you. Meanwhile, keep your eyes on the empty cross and the living Savior.
