

The Ranch Rodeo is for Kids young & old with wooden cows that give real milk, wooden horses everyone can ride, clowns, jokes and fun!





THE WILD COW MILKING involves teams of 4 (which we set up) who run down to the cow and catch her. While one member milks the cow in a little bucket, the "milker" gets on the back of the cow and the other 3 pull her back to the judge. The milk is then dumped into the judge's hand just like a real rodeo.

Another event we do is THE DUMMY ROPING event. We teach kids how to rope

and we furnish the miniature feed sack and ropes.

We have pygmy goats to do the THE GOAT TIE. Even the toddlers can get involved. We put the ribbon on the tail and they run down to the goat, take the ribbon off and bring it back to the judge. As the kids get older the events get tougher.

There are races and activities for parents and grandparents too! Get involved with your kids and have a time to remember!

These are only a few of the activities that we offer. Come on out for a good time.



A. Labeling - Labeling should include: name of product, processing method and style of pack.

B. Uniformity - Half pint jars may be used for jellies and preserves. The jars are not to be decorated by the exhibitor in any way. Exhibits must be in standard canning jars and sealed with two piece lids. Please show with rings on.

C. Current project - All canning must have been completed since the last Cherry County Fair.

D. Only one exhibit per class for each exhibitor, except for soft spread classes where two exhibits per exhibitor are allowed.

E. Processing Methods - Current USDA processing method must be followed for all food preservation. Jams, preserves, marmalades, fruit, tomatoes, and pickled vegetables must be processed in a boiling water bath. (Tomatoes may also be processed in a pressure canner.) All non-acid vegetables and meats must be processed in pressure canner. Spoilage disqualifies entry.

F. Jars and rings must be clean and show no signs of rust.







LEVEL 5: 15 – 20 of any of the following obstacles such as: bar jump which has one bar each, bar jump which has two bars each, tall dog walk, pause box or table, tunnel (open), chute (collapsed or closed tunnel), solid panel jump, A-frame short, A-frame tall, teeter totter (seesaw), weave poles (single set with 6 poles), weave poles (double set with 12 poles), and tire jump (hoop jump) broad jump, dump jump, triple bar jump, swing bridge, crawl, etc.... Number of obstacles used for a course will depend on ring size and available equipment at show site. Course layout may include more advanced handling techniques.






