March 31, 2019 **Fourth Sunday of Lent** Lk 15:1-3, 11-32

Dear St Pius X and St Anthony Church,

"A man had two sons...." I wonder if you react the same way I do at times about Jesus' parables. Being so familiar with this story-The Prodigal Son, as soon as I hear the opening, I confess that I begin to zone out saying, "Oh, I know that old story", as if I don't have anything else to learn from it. Well, when I feel that way, that's when the story probably has the most to offer me. Like the old jokes that start out, "A man walked into a bar and said....." I had a friend that dressed that one up in a novel way by inserting, "and the man said ouch!" Well, that does <u>re-set</u> the joke for us so we hear it new. But my point is that certain scripture stories can have that effect on us too. They sound so familiar that we ignore them, thinking we already know their point. But God's word is 'living and active' (Hebrews 4:12). God's word always bears fruit. Isaiah 55:11 records God saying "So shall my word be (fruitful), that goes forth from my mouth; It shall not return to me empty..." So every time we read God's word, He has a new and fruitful message for us, if we give it time. It would be arrogant of me to think that I could exhaust the meaning of God's word, or that I can ignore it. Thinking that I know all I need to about God's word is a sinfully presumptive attitude toward what properly belongs to God. And that is the same sin of the older brother in the parable today. The older brother thought he should be master of the whole farm, authorizing who could be on the farm and what work or not could be conducted on it. So when he hears about a celebration he hasn't authorized, he is upset! Worse yet, the center of this party he doesn't approve of, turns out to be his 'wayward little brother'! So here is a new detail about this story to pray about: Luke 15:24-26 reads, "Coming in from the field, the elder son, heard the sound of music and dancing. He called one of the servants and asked what this might mean." What? The older brother did not know what music and dancing meant? He knew a lot about farming, and he knew how to manage business, but apparently he didn't understand or appreciate the sound of music and dancing. The elder son is too seriously focused on production and profit, to recognize the social value of celebration, especially the return of his brother to the farm. Properly, that would be the Father's call, to determine who is in the family and how to run the farm. Yet, the older brother usurps that place, presumptuously taking over for the Father. Why? Perhaps in his greed to claim the whole farm, he has been an overachieving workaholic building up his future fortune. When the Father interrupts the farming schedule, and welcomes the other brother back with a lavish celebration feast, the older brother's control scheme is threatened. So he rejects the invitation to celebrate, and stays in the field (the field is what he knows best!). Notice that the father had to go out to bring in both sons (verse 20 & 28). So, both sons sin against the Father, cutting off relationship to the Father, by presumptively claiming their early inheritance from him. The younger brother sins in a more publicly obvious way. But the older brother equally offends the Father. I suggest the older brother's selfishness and greed stem from his inability to appreciate his role as a son and brother. He doesn't understand 'his place' under God's providential care. God sustains creation; God sustains the farm. The older son's driving 'type-A' business personality over-estimates his own importance. Saying it in another way, the older brother does not understand his place in life and the restorative value of Sabbath Rest-the true enjoyment of God's creation. Sabbath rest provides us the refreshment and time to reflect upon God's work, to appreciate and thank God for everything. Such weekly renewal maintains our proper role with God and one another.

What is behind the elder brother's rejection of his brother, along with the music and dancing? Was it his overachieving workaholism? Was it an inner greed that made him eye the farm as his own? Was it jealousy or a past grudge that led him to miserly not allow any festive celebrating over the brother? Maybe if he was like a first century scrooge, the older brother even wondered why anyone would celebrate anything! I feel like he doesn't understand or utilize the function of Sabbath Rest. The Sabbath sets time aside to enjoy the creation of God with others; to rest from work, to thank God for gifts, and to consider all that God has done. The Sabbath and its mandatory stoppage of work, leads us to see the providential hand of God and our true place as dependent on his care/maintenance of us. Not only does the elder brother ignore his father, he also ignores God's direction over him. The elder brother has lost all balance over his life and relationships. The younger brother had done that too, but liberally in the opposite direction. Proper Sabbath Rest restores the balance in our relationship to God and others. Sabbath gives us time to enjoy each other's company leisurely and to enjoy God's work of creation. Can we stop and celebrate the Sabbath, and let God do the rest?
