Mr. Jordan was born in South College Park, Georgia on December 23, 1926. He graduated as valedictorian of North Clayton High School in 1944. His work habits exhibited his hard working nature. He was a World War II Veteran that served in Japan over foreign labor from 1945 to 1947. He worked for 14 years at National Biscuit and retired from Eastern Airlines in 1985 after 30 years of service. As a father of five, Mr. Jordan is survived by three daughters: Judy Alloway, Pamela

Strickland, and Sandra Denton. He is preceded in death by his daughter, Dessie Diane Rollins and son, Felton Don Jordan. 150 Years - by Larry Upthegrove

April 23, 1869: In Atlanta, GA, the circus has been in town this week, a bigger and better circus than most, but there are many circuses now, and shows are quite frequent.



April 26, 1869: In Atlanta, GA, yesterday's "Constitution" had this interesting article: "Joe Brown Pikes in Market.—A large Government sale of Confederate property took place at the Augusta arsenal on Wednesday. The 'Chronicle and Sentinel' gives a running inventory of the articles, closing with the following in reference to certain weapons of warfare

that have become historical. The wonderful inventions referred to would certainly secure the ex-Governor a seat on the Supreme Bench, or at the head of the Patent Office: But the most remarkable of all the articles was - 1,00 Joe Brown Pikes - gotten up expressly to defend the last ditch effort of State Rights under his Excellency's own eye and after models designed under his immediate supervision. The original model is after the fashion of the Roman dagger, placed upon a stout hickory staff, some seven feet long, properly polished and ferruled. The second model was a combination of the Roman dagger and the farmers brier hook—the design being in case the thrust of the dagger is parried, a backward pull of the pikeman would decapitate the infantry soldier or bisect a resisting cavalryman. The third model—was a double-barrel spring-acting dagger, which shot out from between two oval sections of hickory upon coming in contact with and unfortunate enemy. These terrible articles of warfare were brought by Mr. Morrison, of South Carolina. Rumor has it that they are intended to supply the wants of the loyal Governor, for supplying with the most approved arms his South Carolina militia, which is now being organized. We cannot say that this rumor is true or false by reason of the extreme reticence of the purchaser." These pikes probably, early in the war when enough rifles were not available for Georgia soldiers, were manufactured by J.C. Peck of Atlanta who had a planing mill and woodworking shop. The ironwork was produced by blacksmiths in the W&A RR shop, the grinding to sharpness and mounting on staffs done by Peck.

In Atlanta, as well as the rest of the South, it is a time of gathering Polk Salat, that wonderful wild weed that is the first fresh food of the Spring. Cooked three times, pouring off the water all three times, then frying the greens in lard, creates a delicious, nutritious dish. Just cooking it like regular greens will make you want to die.

May 1, 1869: In Washington, General Lee is in the city for the purpose of promoting railroad development in Virginia. Some time ago, he sent a letter to President Grant, inviting the President to visit him at Washington College. The President stated that he was too busy to make such a trip, but he invited the Confederate General to come to the White House for a meeting; the two have not spoken since Lee's surrender at Appomattox. Today, Lee visits the White House for a brief meeting that Grant wanted to be more substantial. Lee thanks Grant for the honor of the invitation but refuses to discuss much else, saying, "Mr. President, I would much prefer that you should not take my opinions and views

as representing those of the people of Virginia and the South, and I do not think I could give any useful information on that subject..." Later Lee will say that they talked about railroads.

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150 Years - by Larry Upthegrove

May 8, 1869: In Rome, Georgia, today's "Tri-Weekly Courier" has this from Italy: "Life Transferred.—A successful operation of the transfusion of blood was recently performed by Dr. Enrico Albanese, at the hospital of Palermo, Sicily. A youth aged seventeen, named Guiseppe Ginazzo, of Cinisi, was received at the establishment on the 29'th of September last, with a bad humor on his leg, which in the end rendered amputation necessary, the patient being very much emaciated and laboring under fever. The operation reduced him to a worse state than ever, and it became apparent that he was fast sinking, the pulse being imperceptible, the eyes dull, the body cold. In this emergency, Dr. Albanese had recourse to the transfusion of blood as the remedy that had not been tried. Two assistants of the hospital offered to have their veins opened for the purpose, and thus, at two different intervals, 220 grains of blood were introduced into patient's system. After the first time he recovered the faculty of speech, and stated before he could neither see nor hear, but felt as if he were flying in the air. He is now in a fair state of recovery."...It has been known since the 1660's that transfusions could be beneficial, but right now it is a hit-or-miss effort and only used when dire circumstances demand that a gamble is needed. The typing of blood will not be discovered until 1901 when Karl Landsteiner will discover the blood groups A,B and O, still 32 years from now. After that, transfusions can become common procedure.

May 9, 1869: In Atlanta, GA, today, the "Constitution" has this announcement: "Memorial Day—Decoration of Confederate Graves—Monday, May 10'th.....The ladies and citizens are generally expected to assemble in the Cemetery at 4 p.m., when, after prayer, and an address appropriate to the occasion, the graves will be decorated. The ladies engaged in preparing for the day have agreed upon observing the following sim order of exercise: Prayer, Address by Gen. W.S. Walker, Decoration of graves.....It is particularly requested that as many as can will carry bouquets and wreaths of flowers with them.....Mrs. J.B. Gordon, President M.A."

May 18, 1869: In Atlanta, Ga, today's "Constitution" has this about some fine work from a local gal: "Editor Constitution:--Dear Sir: The remains of nearly fifteen hundred of our gallant soldiers, whose lives were given as a sacrifice upon the alter of their country, who fell where brave men love to die—if die they must—have been carefully collected together from the bloody fields of Franklin, Tennessee, and now repose in peaceful graves in the cemetery of Franklin, while their silent dust is faithfully guarded from rudeness or desecration, by an elegant iron fence enclosure. All accomplished through the agency and personal efforts of the extraordinary lady, Miss Mary A.H. Gay, of Decatur, Georgia. This whole praiseworthy enterprise was conceived and executed under the immediate personal supervision of Miss Gay. First the necessary means was raised by her individual solicitation, and then the work of identifying and exhuming the gallant dead was done under her own eye."



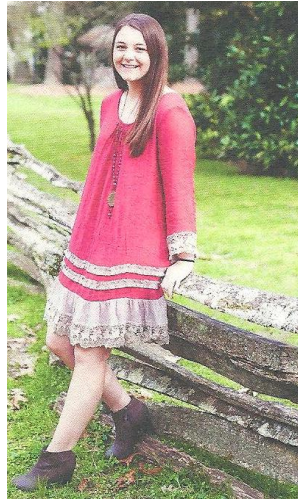

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

Politician James Clyburn recently called Confederate General Robert Edward Lee a "loser", retaliating to Lee's praise by the current U.S. President.

Other world leaders have paid Lee tribute. Winston Churchill: "Lee was the noblest American who had ever lived and one of the greatest commanders known to the annals of war."

Theodore Roosevelt: "The world has never seen better soldiers than those who followed Lee; and their leader will undoubtedly rank as without any exception the very greatest of all the great captains that the English-speaking peoples have brought forth."

Dwight Eisenhower defended Lee's portrait hanging in his office: "Lee was ... one of the supremely gifted men produced by our Nation. He believed unswervingly in the Constitutional validity of his cause ... a poised and inspiring leader, true to the high trust reposed in him by millions of his fellow citizens ... selfless almost to a fault and unflinching in his faith in God... He was noble as a leader and as a man, and unsullied ... a nation of men of Lee's caliber would be unconquerable in spirit and soul." Eisenhower believed that American youth should emulate Lee's qualities, including his efforts to heal the Nation's wounds.

Indeed, Lee knew military defeat. He sacrificed a peerless military career; lost was his U.S. citizenship, health and precious years with his beloved family - as was the case with those he commanded. Lee surrendered his pride to humility and his will was lost to God. Yes, some loser, Lee was. *Jwd*

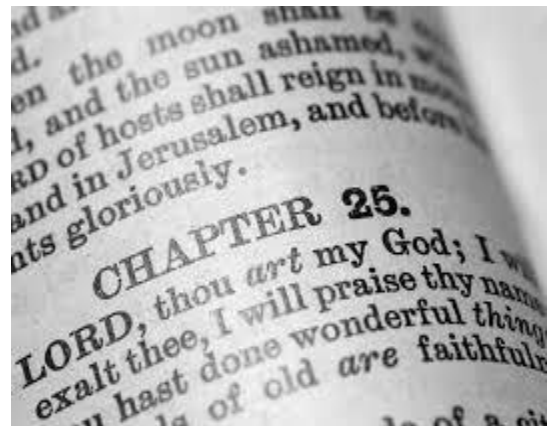


THERE'S ALL KINDS OF STUFF IN THAT BOOK!

"Now there cried a certain woman of the wives of the sons of the prophets unto Elisha, saying, Thy servant my husband is dead; and thou knowest that thy servant did fear the Lord: and the creditor is come to take unto him my two sons to be bondmen."

– 2 Kings 4:1

Often a chapter the Bible simply overflows with spiritual truths. That may happen more frequently in the New Testament – for example there is that magnificent 3rd chapter of John when Nicodemus came to JESUS by night or 2nd Timothy 4 when Paul is bidding to this ol' world goodbye or the priestly prayer of our LORD JESUS in John 17. Such chapters are like a *"good measure, pressed down, and shaken together, and running over"* (Luke 6:38) and we all have our favorites. Maybe we miss a lot in the Old Testament because there is a tendency to read less of it. Regardless of what we read, THERE'S ALL KINDS OF STUFF – *GOOD STUFF* - IN THAT BOOK!



In 2 Kings 4, Elisha has begun his earthly ministry after Elijah went home in a flaming chariot (2 Kings 2:11). In beginning of this portion of scripture, we find a woman who is in trouble. Her husband has died, she is in debt and her sons are about to be taken away. Mosaic Law allowed the enslavement of the debtor and his children as far as the Year of Jubilee in order to work off a debt (Patterson and Austel). The unnamed woman earnestly appeals to the prophet Elisha, reminding him that she "feared the LORD;" – now, she needed help. Today we would call her a believer, a Christian and a servant of GOD. She is not being irreverent but simply saying that she belongs to GOD and she expects *"grace to help in time of need"* (Hebrews 4:16). "...Elisha said unto her, *"What shall I do for thee? tell me, what [do you have] in [your] house?"* She said, *"a pot of oil"*. (2 Kings 4:2) Elisha tells her to go borrow all the pots she can from her neighbors, bring them back and start pouring the oil she had into the borrowed pots. She does so and soon has an abundance to sell which takes care of her debt and then some. Notice that GOD told the widow to gather vessels and pour the oil herself (2 Kings 4:1-7). HE is real good, for instance, at making money appear where there is none and often by the means of something we already have. By the way, there is some evidence

that the woman's jar of oil was not a large supply for cooking, but a small vessel for anointing. "You may have GOD in the measure in which you desire HIM but wishing is one thing; willing is quite another – one gets you nothing

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but the other gets all that GOD can bring (Maclaren)." Elisha made this woman commit herself in faith to GOD by borrowing vessels as commanded. Perhaps Elisha was tempted to gather the vessels and pour the oil himself, but he knew that she had to trust GOD herself. As with us the faith of our Mama or Daddy does not guarantee our own salvation.

Later, in the same 4th chapter, Elisha accepted the hospitality of a couple who had provided a place for this "*Holy man of GOD*" (2 Kings 4:9) to rest and eat during his travels. Elisha considered the kindness this woman and her husband had done for him. No one should ever forget kindness done for them – it is to be remembered. Elisha wanted to do something for her and his servant, mentioned that the woman was childless "*and her husband was old*" (2 Kings 4:14)". When Elisha told her she would have a son by this time next year, she did not quite believe him, but the boy was born and grew up. Years later, as the boy worked the fields with his father, he complained with a headache and by noon he was dead - "perhaps from sunstroke (Clarke)". The woman sent for Elisha, and laid her son on the bed of the man of GOD, shut the door and went out: This shows the faith of the woman. She prepared for the resurrection of the boy, not his burial.

In verse 38 of the same 4th chapter of 2 Kings, Elisha went to Gilgal where there was a famine. This may be may be the seven-year famine mentioned in 2 Kings 8:1-3 (Dillard)." Herbs and various plants were gathered for a meal. As the food was being eaten, someone noticed that one of the plants in the pot was poisonous. It was possibly "colocynth or wild cucumber (Dillard)." Elisha threw some meal into the pot and the contents were then safe to eat (2 Kings 4:41). If we experienced times of poisonous pleasures in the world, death was in our heart. The meal that Elisha put in the pot was not naturally purifying. As in our hearts and lives, the real purification was a miraculous work of GOD. The good, wholesome WORD of GOD was cast into the poison of sin and grace killed it.

And, finally, in verses 42-44: "*there came a man ... and brought the man of GOD ... twenty loaves of barley, and full ears of corn in the husk...*" Elisha, told the server to feed the people but the server said that this was not enough food for 100 men. Elisha said again, "*Give the people, that they may eat: for thus saith the Lord...*" So the food was served and everyone ate "*according to the word of the LORD.*" This certainly reminds us of the New Testament accounts when JESUS told HIS disciples to feed the multitudes with loaves and fishes (Matthew 14:13-21 & Matthew 15:29-39). GOD can multiply all our limited efforts. Do we think HE needs our resources? Do we think HE is dependent upon human strength? HE wants our faith and our obedience
